Strawberry Chiffon Pie
1 pint strawberries
¾ cup sugar
1 envelope unflavored gelatine
¾ cup cold water
¾ cup hot water
1 tablespoon lemon juice
¾ teaspoon salt
¾ cup heavy whipping cream (whipped)

2 stiffly beaten egg whites
Crush strawberries and cover with sugar. Let this mixture stand 30 minutes. Soften gelatine in cold water. Dissolve it in hot water. Cool. Add strawberry mixture, lemon juice and salt and chill until partially set. Fold in whipped cream and egg whites. Pour in cooled pie shell and decorate with nuts.

And here is another purpose the different kinds of laws may serve. You may look upon each as a sort of experiment. Some turn out badly, and some well.

But in the give and take of public discussion, these efforts may yet bring us more nearly to the "one best way"—if any such thing exists.

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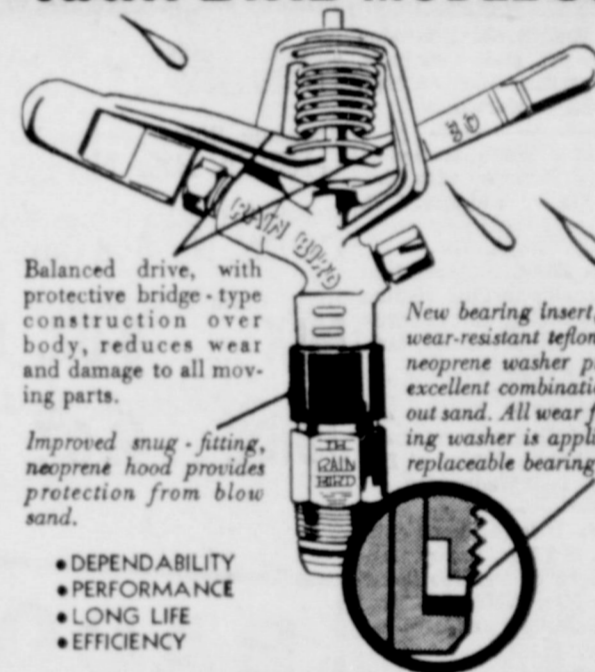
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"Campus Corner"
