## Formal Opening for Quality Cleaners Scheduled 1-7 p.m. Saturday, April 27

Formal opening for Quality Cleaners new building will be held from 1 until 7 p.m. Saturday, April 27. Paul Melton and Curtis Dowell, owners-operators of the establishment, located at 227 West Lubbock St., Slaton, the new building has a polarized cold storage vault and a 2-bath Mycel controlled dry cleaning machine to the equipment available to the cleaners patrons.

**Storage Vault**  
The vault has a capacity of 2,000 cubic feet for coats, Melton said. Year-round temperature of 45 degrees Fahrenheit, maintained, along with a controlled humidity. The vault is fumigated once every two weeks for 72 hours, in order to do away with the possibility of clothes damage. The new Mycel process cleaning equipment gives better cleaning results, and has a sizing process for clothes which normally would come out limp, according to Melton.

**Slick Rail**  
For faster processing of clothes, a "slick rail" system has been incorporated in the new quarters. In the time clothes are taken to the dryers, they can be routed to the proper finishing department. Use of the rail system also permits more accurate inspection of the clothing prior to delivery to the customer.

**Automatic Conveyor**  
Automatic conveyor service is in effect for quicker sorting and delivery of patrons who come to the new location. Drive-in service, along with car wash, add the finishing touches to the service available.

In addition to cleaning and pressing, Quality Cleaners also features dry cleaning service for leather goods, all types alterations and repairs, and low rate storage for clothing. Drawings will be held for free certificates during the opening hours Saturday. One certificate will be given each hour. In addition, balloons and bubble gum will be given the children; each sewing rules and Kordite bags will be given the ladies; cigars and yard sticks will be given to the men.

## Local Railroaders Attend Santa Fe Loss, Damage Meeting In Amarillo

Santa Fe Railway Western lines supervisors and employees were in Amarillo Wednesday and Thursday, April 24 and 25 for a loss and damage meeting. Some 50 men attended the sessions, held in the Santa Fe Building auditorium.

O. H. Osborn, assistant to Santa Fe's operating vice president, Chicago, presided. The Amarillo meeting was the second in a series of four Osborn is holding to apprise the railway's 56,000 employees of loss and damage problems involved in handling freight.

During 1956, Santa Fe was able to reduce its average claim payment five cents per car handled, but the increased value of commodities shipped resulted in a slightly higher loss and damage

percentage in relation to freight revenue, Osborn pointed out.

**Styling Affects**  
He said that new styling in products and commodities has had its effect on packaging and transportation. For example, in the field of automobile manufacturing the curved windshield has caused complications in packaging and shipping.

Osborn pointed out that shipment of food products has brought about many transportation improvements. Santa Fe's new mechanical refrigerator cars have been a big factor in reducing losses on frozen food shipments. Claim payment on frozen food shipments handled on the Santa Fe last year were reduced by 58 per cent.

Following the four major staff meetings, which will conclude early in May, each of the grand divisions will hold numerous smaller group sessions in an attempt to present the loss and damage story to all Santa Fe employees.

Free chest X-rays for Slaton area residents will be available at the Southwestern Public Service Co. office, 145 W. Lubbock, on May 1, 2 and 3.

Furnished by the State Department of Public Health, and sponsored locally by the Slaton Lions Club, the X-ray unit will be in operation from 8 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, and

from 8:30 until 1 p.m. on Friday. Transportation to and from the X-ray site will be furnished by members of the Lions Club. By calling the Slatonite office, VA 8-4201, cars will be dispatched.

Health Department officials have stressed that even though persons think they are in perfect health, they should have the X-rays made. Even more important, is for persons who have not been X-rayed every year to have the check made. Replies concerning the findings are kept confidential; only the individual and their physician are notified as to the results.

Having the X-ray made takes only a very short time, and no disturbing is necessary.

The X-rays are available to all persons 15 years old and older.

## Science Student Talks About 'Heart' At Rotary Meeting

A discussion of the human heart and how it works was presented to local Rotarians Thursday by George Privett Jr., a local high school student.

The Rev. Henry Treptow was in charge of the program, which featured Privett and his science instructor, Jim Mallard.

In his discussion of heart diseases and how they affect the heart, Privett used a model heart. In the recent Science Fair held at Texas Tech, Privett took third place with his display of the heart and the role it plays as a pump for the circulatory system.

Mallard told of the work of the Dunamis Science Club in the local school. The group, he said, is affiliated with a national science club organization, and was instrumental in the organization of District 4 of Texas Science Clubs. Some 283 schools are included in the district, composed of 27 counties.

Members of the local group compiled handbooks for entries in the Science Fair, and also prepared a unit on the heart and distributed it to the member schools. For this work a grant of \$50 was received from the Heart Association.

Mallard pointed out that work of this type is done on the student's own time, and not on school time. Visitors at Thursday's meeting included B. E. Adair of Lubbock, Mr. Christians of Dallas, and Richard Perry of Slaton.

**Welcome Rains Bring Sharp Drop in Local Water Consumption**

Water consumption in Slaton dropped sharply as a result of recent rains.

Forrest Davis, water superintendent, said this week that prior to the rain last week end about 1,200,000 gallons of water per day were being pumped to take care of local users.

Saturday, April 20th, 350,000 gallons were pumped. On Sunday, only 319,000 gallons were pumped.

Consumption on Monday resulted in pumping some 324,000 gallons of water.

**TO FILL A VACANCY**

A number of prominent Americans, among them former President Truman and Speaker of the House Rayburn, have expressed disapproval of President Eisenhower's proposal that a Constitutional amendment be passed to make it possible for the president to declare himself incapable of carrying out his duties.

President Truman particularly objected to the suggestion that the Cabinet be given some power to act if the president should become incapable and refuse to acknowledge it. Mr. Truman declared that this would be "government by Cabinet."

There are valid reasons for objections to the plan proposed by President Eisenhower. But he has at least offered a suggestion for solving a problem that has existed and been ignored far too long. He has demonstrated an awareness of the danger that would result should the country be burdened with a president unable to function but also unable or unwilling to step aside.

There is no easy solution to the succession problem; something is wrong with just about every suggestion advanced so far. Yet this does not excuse turning our backs on the problem. Let Congress and President continue to seek an answer. The office of the presidency is far too important to take any chance that it will some day, perhaps at a moment of crisis, be technically occupied but in fact vacant.

**MISS OR MRS?**

In Sweden, if the Ministry of Justice's new proposal goes through, no adult woman will be called Miss. All will be Mrs. The change is inspired by the fact that all men are Mr., whether married or not. Why, the argument runs, should not this practice be applied to women?

In a number of countries a married woman engaged in a business or profession often does so under her maiden name, indicates that whether she is married or not is of little interest to the outsiders who deal with her. The Ministry of Justice would carry this precedent to its logical conclusion.

Yet many wives are proud of their status, and like to identify themselves with their husbands. The proposed change would be greeted by them very coolly. So far the project has gone no further than the distribution of circulars to find out what people generally think about it. It may be guessed that it will not go beyond that. But you never can tell.

**TIME TO PREPARE**

The nation is expected to have a labor force of 79 million by 1965, an increase of 10 million in eight years. The main growing demand, according to Secretary of Labor Mitchell, will be for skilled technical and professional manpower.

This should tend to change the plans of any boys who had decided against using up several years getting educations or serving low-pay apprenticeships. The incentive to become well trained is now greater than ever.

**BLOW TO OUR PRESTIGE**

How long will it take us, here in the United States, to recognize the plain fact that we are administering blows to our own prestige and reducing our moral position in the world? In the agreement with Saudi Arabia for the use of Dhahran air base, the U. S. accepted a clause barring certain American citizens (those of Jewish origin) from employment in Saudi Arabia.

This will only win disrespect for America in the world of the Afro-Asian bloc, not to mention Europe. Men such as Nasser will quickly assume that if King Saud can get his terms, then they can.

It is known in the Afro-Asian world that King Saud is a slave owner. Those who believe in freedom will be disheartened and suspicious of us; those who do not care will be contemptuous and cynical, and if they deal with us they will demand more. How can we propagandize about our Constitution and expect to gain results if we agree to restrictions because of religions or race?

This should give us more than a quick pause. For the results of this clause will hurt us and our moral position. That is especially bad at a time when we must maintain a moral position as part of a big effort to prevent the Russians from tipping the world strategic balance against us.

There is reported to be a shortage of high grade third basemen in the American league. For that matter, there is never an over-supply of men qualified to star at the hot spots in business, politics or any other field of competition.

Among possibilities credited to a modern car is that it can "stop on a dime." This is commendable, provided the dime is not in a pedestrian's pocket.

A panel of Japanese business and professional men has decided that American women are the unhappiest in the world but concedes they are trying hard to be attractive to American men. So that's why they are the world's most beautiful!

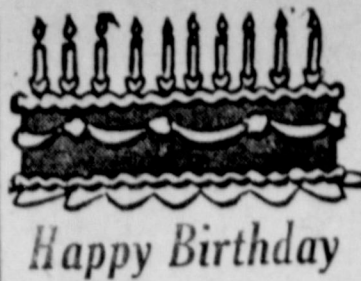

**MOTHER'S DAY CUSTOM**

Telephones will be ringing all over the country Sunday, May 12, when the annual custom of Mother's Day Long Distance calling is observed once again.

Nowadays, it seems almost every family has at least a "branch" separated from the rest by hundreds or even thousands of miles. A call home on Mother's Day is always a special event — even though reunions by Long Distance may be pretty frequent throughout the rest of the year, too.

If you're planning a call on Mother's Day this year, don't forget the money-saving way to do it: call station-to-station. Rates are approximately 1-3 lower than on person-to-person calls.

And as usual — to save time, call by number. Your Long Distance calls will go through twice as fast if you can give the operator the out-of-town number you're calling.

**GIVE HER A TELEPHONE**

While I'm on the subject, I'd like to offer another Mother's Day suggestion.
