# "Creepy" Cattle **Reduce** Supplies

"Creepy" cows, with stunted, thin calves, are a "bottle-neck" in the nation's beef-producing industry say livestock leaders who are pointing out the need for, and advantages of, adequate supplies of minerals for range and farm cattle this spring and summer. Lowered reproduction of breeding animals, loss in flesh, stunted calves, slower gains and lack of finish of fattening animals are some of the costly losses caused by mineral deficiencies in many areas.

That cottonseed meal, or cake, is an excellent source of phosphor-us as well as a good protein supplement, was pointed out recently by Dr. H. Schmidt, chief of the division of veterinary medicine, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, who said: "Vegetation low in phosphorus will result in areas where soil is poor in phosphoric acid. In such areas, we can expect many animals to become creepy, especially in the latter part of the summer ,and this results in heavy not so much a direct loss by death as a loss in flesh of the mother and the decreased rapidity of growth and stunted condition of the offspring. The mother can be saved when this condition develops

Ladies-take a bow. Lexicographically speaking, you've done it again. Not only are you responsible for a great many words in our modern dictionaries, hut according to Dr. Charles E. Funk, editor of Funk & Wagnall's dictionary and famed lexicographer.

Funk, editor of Funk & Wagnan's dictionary and famed lexicographer, you put more words in the Ameri-can language than any other group. For instance, "glassed" will ap-pear for the first time in new edi-tions of leading dictionaries. Be-cause women have been purchasing more and more fruits veretables cause women have been purchasing more and more fruits, vegetables and other food commodities in glassed foods when shopping. Hence a new definition of the verb "to glass-to put up in a glass jar or jars, as to glass fruit or vege-tables."

Dr. Funk explains that words find their way into the dictionary only after they have been tried and test-

after they have been tried and test-ed. Once they have been found to be accurate and deserving addi-tions to our daily speech, lexicog-raphers simply record them as per-manent fixtures in our language. Other new words to be inserted in 1942 dictionaries are "jeep." 



# **More Teachers To Be Needed**

The greatest demand for Texas school teachers today is for men trained to direct band, coach ath-letics, or assist with athletics, the University of Texas Teachers Appointment Committee reports. For several years it has been difficult to please a man who has not had some ability in these fields the committee said.

Women qualified to teach high school commerce or business administration, mathematics and science are urgently needed in the Texas school system, the Univer-sity of Texas Teachers Appointment Committee reports. The short age is due to the facts that (1) en usually teach these subjects and they are leaving the teaching the for realitary or other de-dense activity, and (2) the women normally qualified to teach these subjects are entering the business world.

### TOO MUCH WHEAT AND MORE IN PROSPECT

Nearly 100 million bushels more than last year, or the greatest supply on record, describes the present wheat situation, according to Charlie L. Thomas, state AAA committeeman and wheat grower from Pampa.

"We'll go to the polls, Saturday, May 2, to vote democratically and cooperatively on whether we want to continue marketing quotas, and that's more than other farmers in the world can do," he said.

To be in effect, quotas must be approved by two-thirds of the farmers voting. Last year ,in the first referendum, wheat farmers approved quotas by an 81 percent majority. "Our wheat market is limited.

quotas simply divide this market fairly among all of us," Thomas said.

Farmers who overplant their acreage allotments are asked to make the same adjustment in marketings as AAA cooperators make at seeding time. Under AAA regulations, volun-

teer wheat may be substituted for seed wheat, Thomas explained. To be in effect, however, total wheat acreage on a farm cannot exceed the wheat acreage allotment.

"Quotas will direct farm pro duction into foods and feeds needed in the Food for Victory program and will smooth the flow of wheat to market, preventing harvest tieup of railroads which already are loaded to capacity with war mater-ials," the AAA official said.


