## PREMIUM FOR FIRST BALE TO BE PRESENTED TODAY

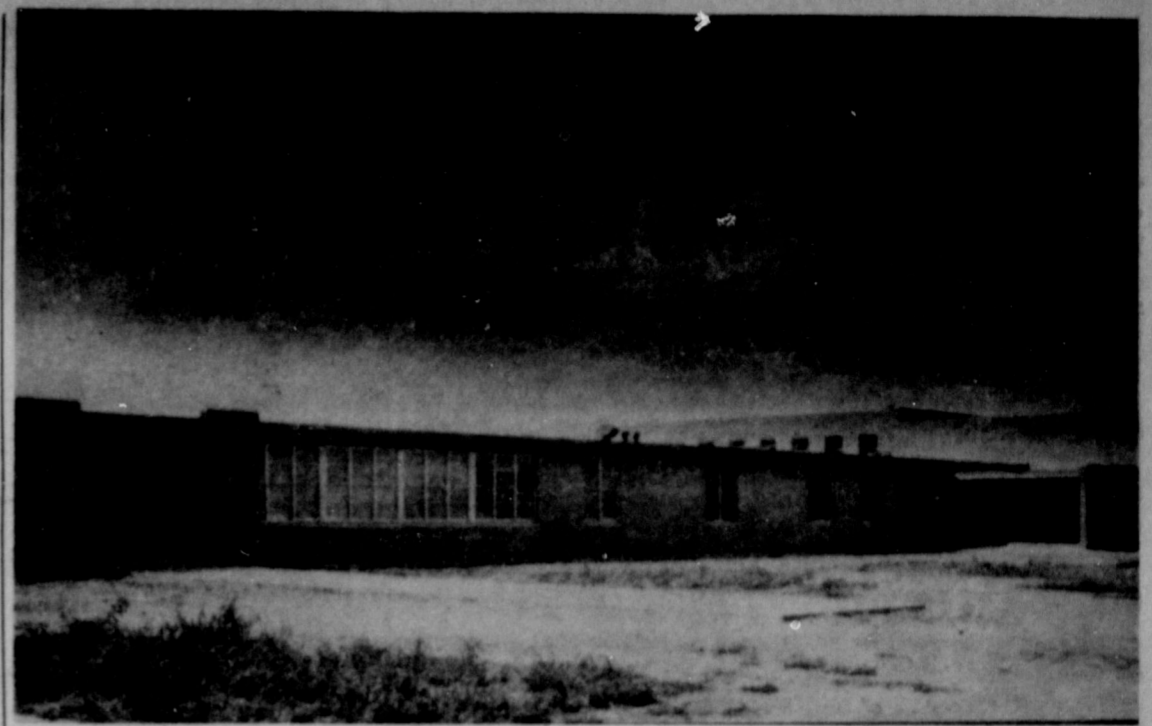

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**NICE COOL OUTPOST**

Though a few men have flown over the Antarctic and skinned across to snowy wastes with sleds and skis, little is yet known about this frozen continent. It can safely be said, however, that the most will be known three years hence.

In the interim, expeditions launched as part of the so-called International Geophysical Year will have made extensive tests and explorations in this remote area. Several countries, including the United States, plan to establish outposts. Now the Soviet Union has announced that it, too, will set up an Antarctic base—its first.

The interest of the various countries involved is ostensibly scientific. But there is more to it than that. Antarctica has potential strategic value in an air age. It may also contain hidden mineral treasures.

Back in 1946 when the United States proposed joint use of the Antarctic by all interested nations, the Soviet hastened to declare its interest. Now it is going to establish its outposts alongside those of the other nations—strictly in the interests of science, as it says.

**USO IN TROUBLE**

Civilians often find it difficult to realize that thousands of young men are still in uniform in the service of their country. One reason is that while off duty service men can wear civilian clothes and are inconspicuous.

Yet these young men cannot be ignored. They need entertainment while off duty, and as often as not they need a home away from home. That's the function of the USO, which started during World War I and is still operating. But there's a difference. During World War I it commanded adequate funds and volunteers. Today the USO is faced with a shortage of both.

Despite these handicaps, the USO still functions, and it's very popular among servicemen. The USO in Hollywood, California, serves 25,000 service men and women a month. Whenever branches of this unique organization exist, their facilities are strained if anything. Their hospitality programs are more vital today than ever before, since peacetime military service, essential though it may be, is dull and lacks the morale-building excitement of war.

As civilians it is important to us and to our military forces to support the United Service Organizations. They need funds and volunteer workers, whether in their libraries, doughnut stands or any other good works. People in towns near enough to a USO branch can offer their own services.

**NOTE AS CITIZENS**

A union official recently advised union members to forget party labels and vote as "union men." The part about forgetting party labels is good advice. But it would be better to let the unionists vote as "union men" go unheeded. The idea of thinking and behaving as a class would be unfortunate for the American worker.

All citizens have special interests. But good citizenship requires the subordination of special interests to the general good. A working man is more than a member of a union. He is a parent interested in good schools, an amiable owner interested in good roads, a home owner interested in property taxes. He is an American interested in proving to the world that the system of government by the people can work. None of these interests need conflict. But if Americans start to vote and think as members of particular groups there is a possibility that their more important role as citizens will be forgotten.

It is natural that personal interests influence how we vote to some extent. But when self interest becomes the only guide to how we vote the democratic system is in peril of falling. Certainly it is endangered by voting by groups.

The American Red Cross estimates it will spend \$1,000,000 on emergency aid and long-term rehabilitation assistance to the hundreds of families affected by the tornadoes which struck Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Texas in late May.

### In Summer Exercise

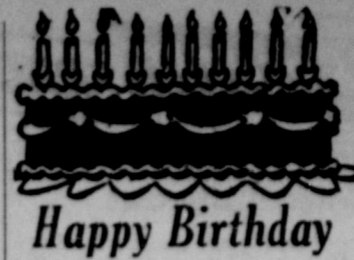

# Triumphs and Sidelights of Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.—Many Texas public schools are holding integration plans in abeyance pending action by the State Supreme Court.

But there is no indication the high court will rush to consider the Big Spring test case ahead of its normal schedule.

District court there ruled invalid that part of Texas law which requires public schools to be segregated. Appeal is being made by the Texas Citizens Council in an effort to prevent payment of state money to non-segregated schools.

Both sides had expressed hope for an early decision before the Supreme Court's October term. Meanwhile, towns such as Waco and Laredo, which had planned to begin desegregation this fall, backed off rather than take a "legal risk." Others, like San Antonio, decided to go ahead, but reserved the right to review the policy in the light of new state-level decisions.

### Charter Request Studied

Application of the anti-integration Texas Citizens Council for a state charter bumped into a delay in the Secretary of State's office.

Sec. of State A. M. Muldrow, questioned whether the council's organization is for a "lawful purpose" in view of the Supreme Court decision outlawing segregation.

Muldrow said he might ask the

attorney general's department for a ruling.

### White Distrusts Red Visitors

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White took a dim view of the visiting Russian farm delegation.

Farming methods are America's greatest strength, White said, but Russia's weakest. "We might as well sell them guns," he declared. In Washington officials were undecided whether the Texans who sold some 65 head of Santa Gertrudis cattle to the visitors would be allowed to export them to Russia.

Touring Soviets expressed a desire to buy farm machinery seen in other parts of the country, but the Texas cattle deal was the only actual purchase. At present there is only a trickle of trade between the two countries.

State, Commerce and Foreign Agriculture officials pondered the decision, suggested that public opinion would be a strong factor.

### Record Employment Expected

Harvest and reopening of schools are expected to bring Texas new employment records during September.

Public school cafeteria workers will add thousands to the payrolls, said the Texas Employment Commission. A continued rise is forecast through the fall.

A new high in the average paycheck was hit in July, according to TEC. Holiday overtime plus wage increases brought the boost.

### Druggists Receive Vaccine

Texas druggists are having their first experience in dispensing Salk polio vaccine.

State Health Department officials reported 50,000 doses sent to Texas last week by Wyeth Laboratories of Pennsylvania. Of these, 42,000 go to drug stores, 8,000 to the Health Department for public agencies.

Some stores had already received vaccine; others were still awaiting their shipments.

Patients have been asked to contact their doctors who will buy through the retail outlets.

Texas free immunization program for first and second grade school children is expected to be complete by Oct. 1. Eli Lilly Company of Indiana sent 144,603 more shots to Texas for that purpose.

Health Department statistics showed polio coming to its seasonal slackening-off period. Only 80 new cases were reported last week, compared to 98 the week before. Total for the year is now 1195.

### Business Peak Passed

Texas business expansion has apparently passed a peak, but no severe decline is expected.

Contending that he would receive a fairer trial in Laredo than in Austin, Parr seeks to have the case moved to the southern federal district. He was originally indicted in Houston on charges of failing to pay some \$85,000 in income taxes. This indictment was dismissed and an identical one entered in Austin.

Appealed by Parr, the change was upheld by Circuit Court in New Orleans. A continuance was granted in Austin when Parr's attorneys filed appeals in the supreme court.

**Meat Loaf**

- 2 lbs. ground beef
- 1/2 cup oatmeal (dry)
- 2 eggs
- 1 small can tomato sauce
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1 large onion (chopped)
- 1/2 green pepper (finely chopped)
- 2 tsp. garlic juice
- 1/4 cup worcestershire sauce
- dash tabasco sauce
- 1/2 tsp. cayenne pepper
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tsp. sugar
- 1/3 cup flour

Method: work all ingredients together well and place over the bottom of a baking dish. Cover with water about 1/2 inch over the top. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 1 hour. Mrs. Faulkner said she very often placed bacon strips or catsup on the top of it is baked. She also uses it for meat balls with spaghetti.

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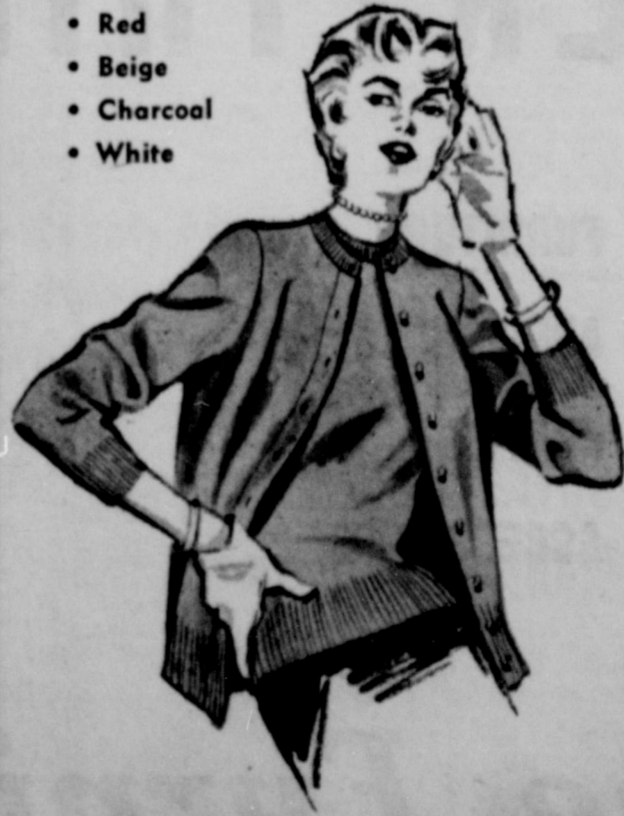

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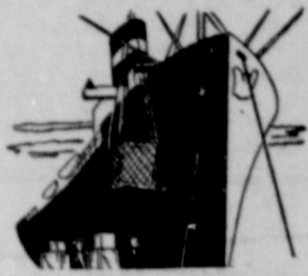
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
