## Abilene Swim Meet Third Place Won Slaton Swimming Team Saturday

The V.F.W. Invitational Swimming Meet last Saturday saw the Slaton team pitted against teams from El Paso, Midland, Abilene, and Odessa. The meet was held at the V.F.W. Pool in Abilene. Slaton's swimmers took third place in the 50-meter freestyle relay. First place winner was Midland. Slaton placed second in the 50-meter freestyle. The meet was sponsored by the V.F.W. post, which also presented trophies.

Betty McSween, Jeanette George, Judy Dunn and Patsy Pettigrew, won second. In the senior division, Jeanette George placed third in the 50-meter backstroke, and Judy Dunn took second place in the 50-meter breast stroke. Glenna Payne, Rita Pruitt, Marilyn McSween and Betty McSween placed second in the 200-meter freestyle relay. For midjet boys, Phil Goad placed first and Allen Reasoner second in the 25-meter freestyle. For midjet girls, Marilyn McSween took first place and Jan Scott fourth in the 25-meter freestyle.

## Charges Filed Against Three as Result Of Robbery, Stabbing Here Monday

### Howard Hoffman Reappointed To Water Board

All members of the Slaton City Commission were present for their regular meeting Monday night at City Hall.

Howard Hoffman was reappointed Slaton's director in the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority for a two-year term. Hoffman is presently serving as president of that organization.

Approval was given a request by the Fire Department to send the department's oldest truck, an American-La France, to Post to take part in the golden anniversary parade to be held there next month. Fire Department representatives pointed out that having the truck out of town would not affect protection against fires here. Two trucks would be here, and normally are the only trucks used.

Melvin Kunkel of Slaton, representing Southwestern Public Service Company, appeared before the council to explain a rate simplification program which will go into effect in the near future in the Southern Division, which includes Slaton.

It was explained that the change would not affect local residential users of electricity, but that in a few instances there would be a slight increase in cost for commercial users. The change will not result in any added revenue for the company, division-wise, the council was told, but will simplify bookkeeping, give a neater installation of meters for the consumers, and enable the company to render better service.

### Slatonites at Tech Receive Degrees Wednesday

Three Slaton students at Texas Tech received their degrees at commencement exercises held Wednesday evening at Lubbock Municipal Auditorium.

They were among the 325 candidates for degrees at the summer commencement. Dorrance D. Roderick, El Paso newspaper publisher was principal speaker.

Jesse G. Dabilla received his bachelor of arts degree in Spanish. Patricia Ann Stansell received her bachelor of arts degree in English, and Thomas Clifton Martin Jr. received his bachelor of science in education.

Smith notified local officers when he escaped from the trio. Hatch was found lying in a ditch beside his car. The Negroes were riding in the car with Hatch and Smith before the robbery, according to local officers.

### Eligible Veterans Urged To Look Into Advantages of Legion Membership

Commander Claude Wingo of Luther Powers Post 438, American Legion, said this week that all eligible service persons in this area should contact the American Legion to find out the advantages of membership in the organization.

Wingo pointed out that according to the constitution of the Legion, any person "shall be eligible for membership in the American Legion who was regularly enlisted, drafted, or inducted or commissioned, and who was accepted for and assigned to active duty in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Corps, or Coast Guard of the United States at some time during the period from April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive or during the period between December 7, 1941 and September 2, 1945, all dates inclusive, or who being citizens of the United States at the time of service and having honorable discharge."

The American Legion is concerned about the welfare of all disabled veterans and their families, Wingo said, as well as families of veterans who died in service or since their discharge.

## Swiss Yodlers Termed Scarce as Texas Cowboys Before Rotarians Here Thus.

Hans Irniger, 22-year old student at Zurich University, Switzerland, was speaker at the Slaton Rotary Club last week. Irniger is the foreign student guest of the Rotary Club of Tahoka for the summer.

In describing his native country, Irniger said that yodlers were scarce in Switzerland as cowboys are here. Switzerland is a land of mountains, with fertile valleys; about half the size of the Texas panhandle.

Four official national languages are recognized there. They include

German, French, Italian, and Greek. Telephones, television, and the railroads are owned by the state.

He said that the most important crop there was grass for the animals. Others include dairy products, manufacturing of cloth and machinery.

About 60 per cent of the Swiss people are protestant, with the remainder being Roman Catholic faith, he said.

Irniger described the Swiss government as being much like that of the United States. The Swiss President is elected by the national assembly.

A question and answer period followed his talk.

**UNSELFISH SERVICE**

Even those who disagree with Charles E. Wilson as secretary of defense credit him with great integrity and intense dedication to his duties. He gave to his tasks in government the same drive and energy that brought him to prominence in the automobile industry. He never spared himself, nor was he deterred by criticism.

Wilson is an outspoken man; sometimes he is undiplomatic. As secretary of defense he occasionally irritated large segments of the population and even some members of his own political party. Yet he never courted public favor at the expense of his duty.

The years Wilson spent in Washington must have given him considerable satisfaction. He earned that satisfaction at great financial sacrifice. His salary was a fraction of that he had received as president of General Motors. In order to take the cabinet post he also had to dispose of stocks that later increased in value.

Men in high government posts are subject to constant criticism. That is as it should be, since officials must be responsive to the wishes of the people. It is, however, the good fortune of the republic that it can still attract able men to its service despite the criticism and despite the financial loss such service can entail. The country owes deep gratitude to men like Charles E. Wilson.

**SCHOOLS AND TAXES**

Before long, schools will open again all over the country. Some of us are fortunate enough to live in communities where schools are still adequate. But what of the many schools that are less than adequate? What of the youngsters who will have to try to learn in overcrowded classrooms, from teachers who are overburdened and, in many instances, underpaid?

Even communities where schools are now satisfactory may have troubles in years to come. Population increases will strain existing facilities in most areas. The shortage of teachers will grow more acute as young people who might ordinarily enter the profession of teaching are lured away by jobs that pay better.

As a nation, we will soon have to decide just how important education is to us. We will have to face the fact that good schools and good teachers are going to cost money and that, in one form or another, this money will have to come from taxes.

Paying taxes is not ordinarily a pleasant duty, especially tax levels are higher than ever before. But the future greatness of America depends on the children who are in school and who will be in school in the years to come. We owe them the best education possible. It takes more money to give it to them we must spend that money ungrudgingly. Whatever we spend on education, as long as there are proper safeguards against waste and extravagance, is money well spent.

**ANCIENT MYSTERY**

The speakeasy is an institution not necessarily limited to liquor. The police of Rome have discovered a secret museum where Greek, Roman and Etruscan works of art were sold, contrary to the Italian law which forbids the sale of art objects for shipment out of the country.

The greatest prizes in this museum are reported to be the Etruscan objects. In ancient times central Italy was long ruled by the Etruscans, a mysterious people thought to have migrated from Asia Minor. They had a high civilization. This is shown by their pottery and mirrors, to name only two types.

One great obstacle still keeps us from knowing much about the Etruscans. We cannot read their language, though many examples of it have been found. Nor do we know even to what group of languages Etruscan belongs.

It is curious that languages such as Egyptian and Babylonian, where the characters were strange, have been deciphered, while Etruscan, whose inscriptions are written in our own alphabet, cannot be interpreted. This is a challenge which should tempt the experts.

**THE LAST BATTLESHIP**

The last of the battleships, the Iowa, is to be retired. While this is partly an economy measure, the Navy feels that battleships can be dispensed with more easily than almost any other type of vessel.

Their huge size makes them vulnerable, particularly to guided missiles. The Iowa will therefore join her sister ships, the Wisconsin, the Missouri and the New Jersey. They have either been retired or, in accordance with previously announced decisions, are about to be.

The fleets of the future will be composed of conventional and nuclear-powered submarines, destroyers and aircraft carriers. The Ranger 60,000-ton carrier of the same class as the Forrestal, has just been commissioned.

Our old-time naval heroes, men such as John Paul Jones and Farragut, would hardly know what to make of such vessels. But they would doubtless find that the fundamental principles of naval warfare have not greatly changed.

Well, now that we're past the Fourth of July we can expect the stores to start decorating for Christmas any time.

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## Lionism Discussed by District Governor Of Lions Clubs at Official Visit Here

District Governor W. L. "Bill" Smith of Ralls was speaker at the Slaton Lions Club Tuesday. It was the Lions Club official's visit to the local club.

Guests at the luncheon included Archie Huckabee, zone chairman; Pete Chaney, president of the Hub Lions Club, and Bob Wilson, all of Lubbock. Other guests were Trines Starnes of Waco and Earl Williams of Lubbock.

Smith spoke on Lionism, what it could do for an individual and what it could do for a community. He pointed out that Texas Lions' greatest contribution lies in the

Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville.

Some 726 children attended sessions at the camp this summer, Smith said. Of that number, 459 were attending for the first time this year.

Applications were received from 998 children for attendance at the camp. Sixty-five were rejected for physical reasons, etc., and 74 applications were cancelled.

Lions in District 2-T-1, of which Smith is Governor, annually pay \$12,204 to the camp—or \$3 per member, in dues. Additional gifts last year totalled \$1,179, bringing a total of \$23,283 sent by Lions in this area to the camp.

Following the meeting, a business session was conducted by Smith with the officers and directors of the club.

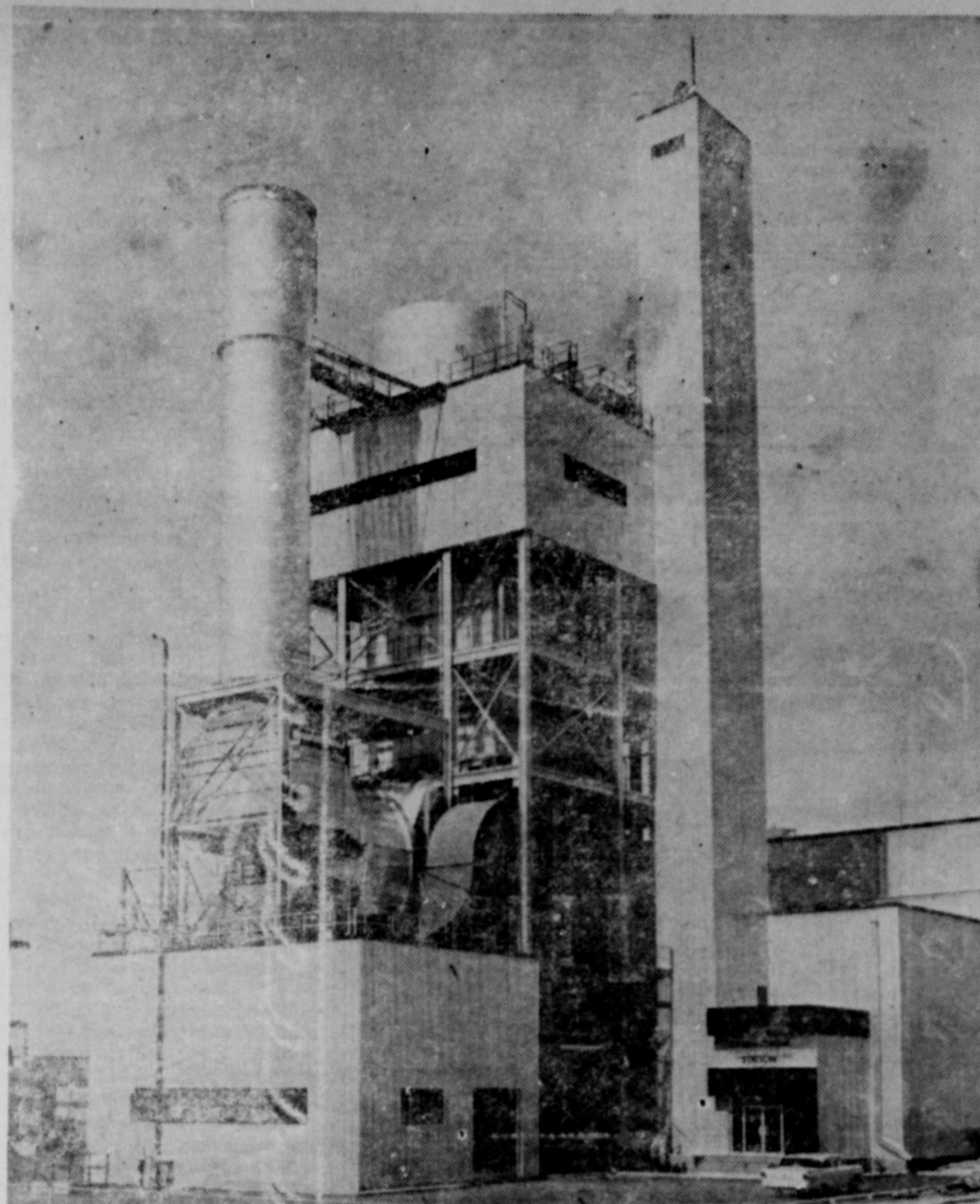

# Sale Forfeited Land Through Veterans Land Program Scheduled September 27

A high bond market was making it impossible last week to sell any part of the \$100,000,000 Veterans' Land Program bond issue approved by voters last November.

The net effect is that the only way most veterans can participate in the program now is to purchase forfeited land. The next sale of forfeited land is scheduled for September 27.

"Until we can sell our bonds, our regular program has money to buy only about 200 tracts of land a year," Land Commissioner Earl Rudder, who is also chairman of the Veterans' Land Board, said.

About 21,000 Texas veterans are on the program's waiting list.

The board cannot by the Constitution pay more than three per

cent interest on money obtained through the sale of bonds. Average interest rates on governmental bonds during the week ending August 10 were 3.54 per cent.

"While we're trying to get our interest rates on governmental bonds down, we suggest that veterans avail themselves of the possibility of buying forfeited land tracts," Rudder said.

Fifty-one tracts of land will be offered in the September sale. Most of the tracts are located in central and southwest Texas. A few are in northeast Texas counties.

Counties in which forfeited tracts are being offered for sale include: Panhandle: Deaf Smith, Northeast Texas: Grayson, Fannin, Lamar, Cass. Central Texas: Bell, Lampasas, McCullough, Coleman, Brown, Comanche, Erath, Hood, Eastland, Jones. Southwest Texas: De Witt, Guadalupe, Wilson, Bexar, Medina, Atascosa, Maverick, Zavalla, Dimmitt, LaSalle. Valley: Hidalgo, Cameron.

Texas veterans who desire information about the sale of forfeited land should write or call Commissioner Rudder at the Gen-

eral Land Office in Austin.

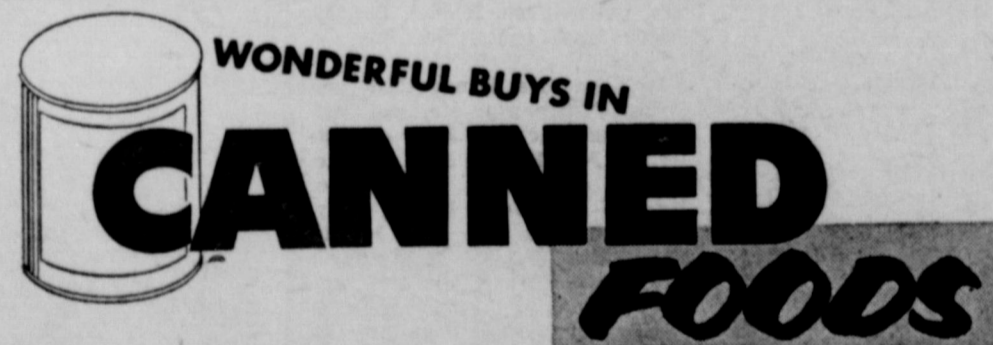

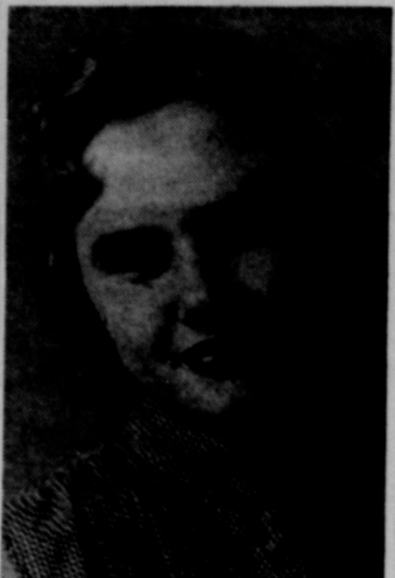

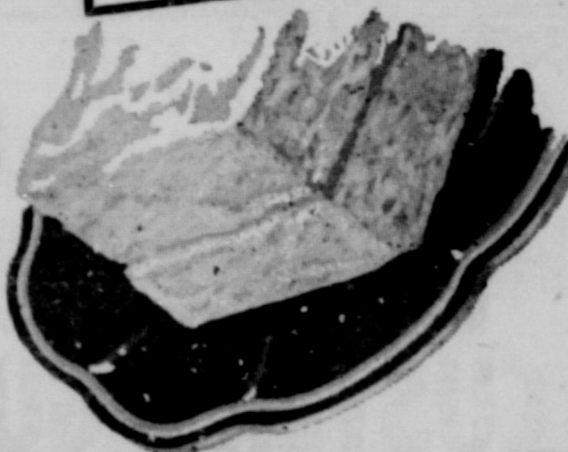
