## Agreement Reached To Avert Santa Fe Strike

Atchinson Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company announced today that it has reached an agreement with the union of non-operating employees and new employees who otherwise would be required to become full members, but will be required to pay dues, fees and assessments.

Under the agreement, the decision of a neutral arbitrator as to facts shall be final and binding but under a new clause. The neutral arbitrator will not pass on questions in connection with the agreement under applicable law. This stipulation is directed to the question of possible use of dues for political purposes and in case of a dispute that question would be open for determination by the courts under applicable law, including pertinent court decisions.

"As in any other matter on which differences of opinion occur the Santa Fe and union representatives have found a common meeting ground and reached an agreement acceptable to both sides," Gurley declared.

"Now that this controversy is behind us and the public has been spared a costly transportation strike, or entire organization will be able to devote their full energies to providing necessary services for our shippers and passengers," he concluded.

Ernest L. Crane, president of the Santa Fe Railway Company, said today that the agreement reached after several conferences in Chicago under the auspices of the American Arbitration Association and Robert O. Boyd, members of the National Mediation Board, had been called for today.

Fred G. Gurley, chairman of the Board and chief executive officer for the company, said the agreement provides that all present non-union employees and new employees who otherwise would be required to become full members, but will be required to pay dues, fees and assessments.

**A NEED FOR PROTEST**

The Sukarno government in Indonesia has kept a writer and editor, Mochtar Lubis, under house arrest for a year or so, without having brought any charges against him. Lubis has been barred from communicating with his friends or leaving his home because he exposed corruption in the Indonesian government.

Each week, Lubis' paper carried a box reporting the number of days he had been detained under house arrest. Recently, and without legal action, the newspaper was unceremoniously shut down. This newspaper and its staff has been persecuted by the Sukarno regime because it has been honest.

The American press should give more publicity to the persecution of press and of writers abroad. The need for honest information is world-wide. A campaign beginning in this country could roll around the world and have its effect on governments and politicians which restrict the press, shut down newspapers, persecute staffs and jail editors and writers. The Indonesian embassy in Washington might not at all be insensitive to such a campaign or to letters of protest.

The American people are not protesting enough for the liberty of brave and honest men abroad who are being arrested because they try to write honestly and to tell the truth.

**BACK IN SERVICE**

Such dazzling achievements as moon rockets and the snorkel fountain pen should not be allowed entirely to obscure the less pretentious work of applied science in other fields. We call our readers' attention, by way of example, to the unbreakable plastic dish. This may do more for peace and tranquillity in the American home than a whole flock of fire-breathing missiles could do.

So-called unbreakable dishes have been around for some time now. The only trouble with most of them is that they break. Or if they don't break, they wilt in hot water and emerge from the dishpan resembling Salvador Dali's limp watches. But now something called melamine is going great guns as a material from which truly unbreakable, unwilting dishes may be molded.

There is only one sad note in all this. Many a husband found, in the past, that by being clumsy enough with the china he could get himself retired from the dishwashing chore. If the new lastic dishes become as popular as they seem destined to become, many a husband hitherto ousted from the kitchen is going to find himself right back in service. Oh well, at least he won't have to pay for a lot of breakage.

**THE MUSICAL GAMUT**

The platter-spinners are a breed apart. Sometimes they become so preoccupied with the so-called pop tunes and accompanying chatter that they seem to have lost all contact with the world outside their soundproof cubby-holes.

The other day, one of these glib fellows announced in all seriousness that he was about to favor his listeners with three selections "running the gamut of human emotions in musical form." At least one accidental (and unwary) listener pricked up his ears and wondered what works of musical genius—something by Beethoven, perhaps; a Chopin nocturne?—would be employed to make good on this rich promise.

It soon developed that the "gamut of human emotions" was to be demonstrated by examples of those three really basic types of music—rock 'n roll, country and Western, and the ballad. Our listener interrupted this noble song cycle by switching off his radio midway through the first number.

That listener may be something of a snob. Perhaps he should have given rock 'n roll, country and Western and the ballad a chance to speak their dulcet message. His retort to this notion might be that the platter-spinner was, in his ignorance, the real snob. It's all in the point of view.

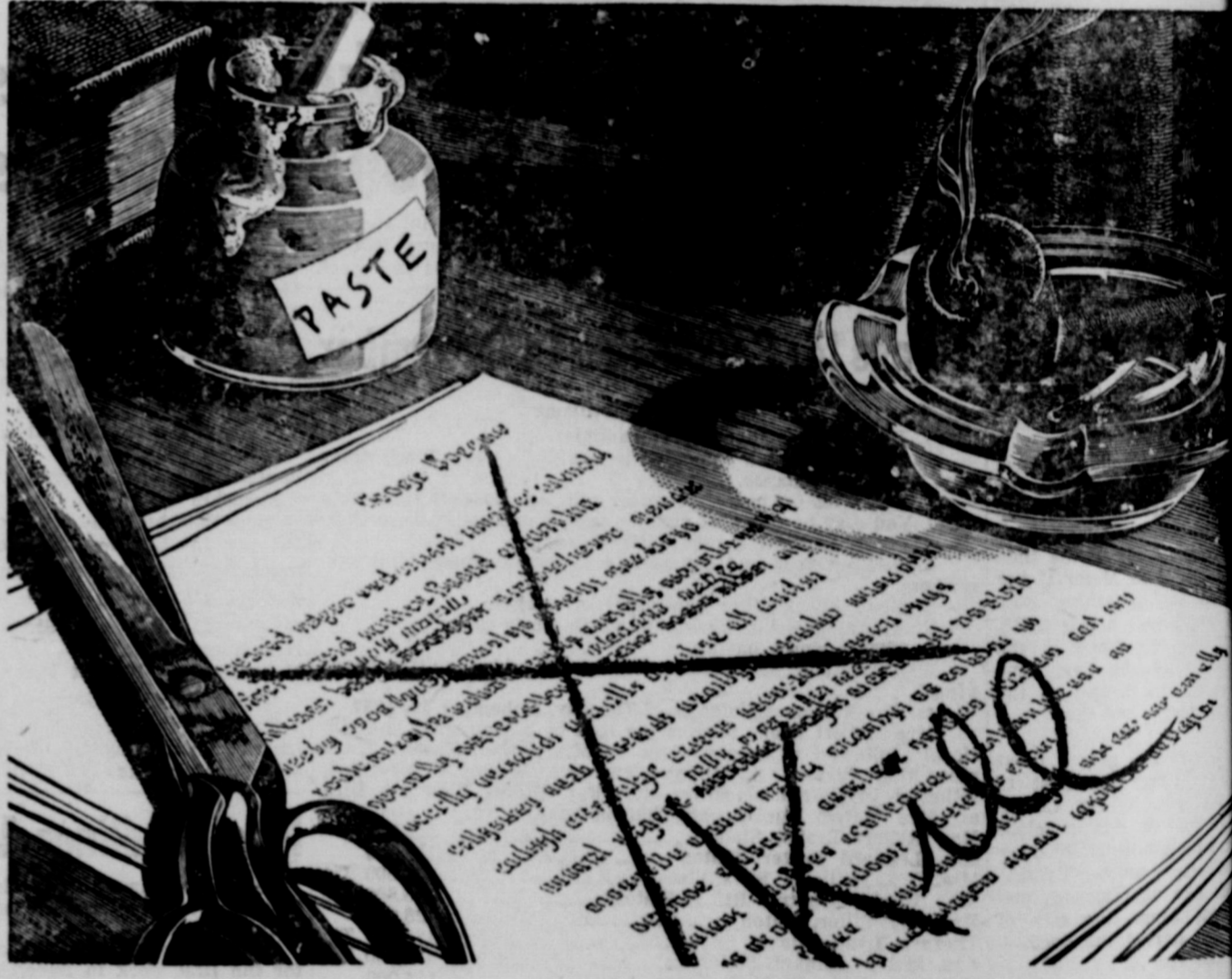

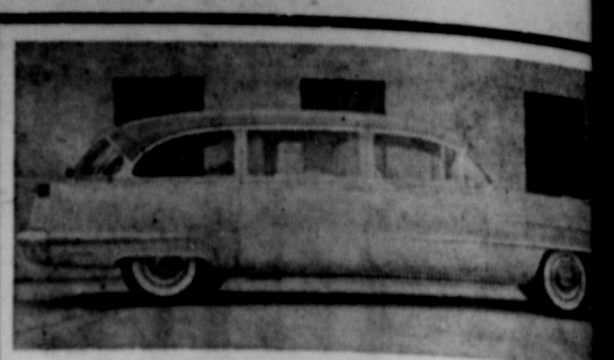


**A FREE PRESS . . . and CENSORSHIP**

## Deer Hides Asked for TB Patient Therapy

Mr. Hunter, when you bag that buck, tag the hide for a TB patient!

That is the word from volunteers who work in the state tuberculosis hospitals and who will have the hides tanned into buckskin for use in occupational therapy.

Joseph Hennessy of San Antonio, chairman of the State Volunteer Council for the TB Hospitals, says the hides should be salted, drained, tied and turned over to the motor freight lines for shipment to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 Fredericksburg Road, Austin, where the owner, L. M. Rathbone will handle them for consignment to the tannery.

The salt is necessary to help the drainage and to prevent spoilage, Rathbone says. The tag should read "for TB patients," so the motor freight lines can haul them without charge. The volunteers will take it from there.

"That buckskin can mean a lot to a guy in the TB hospital who won't be going hunting for some time to come," Hennessy said.

The deer hide collection has the endorsement of the Game and Fish Commission and the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas.

Last year Air Force Reserve members took training mission time to fly the hides to the California tannery. It is hoped they will again be able to provide this service, Hennessy said.

## 'Deer Plentiful and Fat' According to Game-Fish Commission Statement

Conditions are ideal for the Texas deer season, according to the Chief of Law Enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. In reports from wardens throughout the state all say the deer are plentiful and fat.

"It has been many years since the range has been in the fine condition reported now," the Chief said.

"There also is a great deal of activity among the deer.

Bucks already are beginning to run."

Prospects in the Hill country are especially promising, according to the reports. Grass is high on all the ranches. There also is a good crop of acorns. The same is true of the East Texas and North East Texas area.

In the Trans-Pecos area conditions are better than usual, although rains there didn't

come until after cool weather set in, slowing the growth. The Trans-Pecos season on mule deer runs from November 20 through 27.

In South Texas, where bucks grow big, grass throughout the year has been in fair shape. As a result, wardens in that area report that shooting should be good. They do warn, however, that rattlesnakes are more plentiful than bucks and every care should be used.

In far northeast Texas, Possum Kingdom area, and the Panhandle the reports are all the same—good range and the deer are fat.

### Acreage Cut in Cotton Allotment In Sight Without Change in Laws

Texas High Plains cotton producers face a drastic cut in acreage in 1959 of more than 30 percent if present laws remain unchanged, W. O. Fortenberry, president of the Plains Cotton

Growers, Inc., said this week in commenting on cotton acreage allotments.

Fortenberry explained that the national cotton acreage allotment for 1958 is 17,584,528 acres, practically the same as in 1956 and 1957. The Agricultural Act which froze the 1957 and 1958 allotment at approximately 17.5 million acres and provided 100,000 additional acres to meet minimum allotment requirements for small growers, does not apply to 1959, Fortenberry explained.

In 1959, under present law, the national allotment will be the acreage necessary to produce 10 million bales. Based upon the 1953-57 average yield, this would mean a 1959 allotment of about 13 million acres.

After apportionment of the national allotment to the states, each state sets aside a reserve for hardship cases, new grower allotments, trends, inequities, etc. Out of the remainder, the first acreage is applied against minimum allotments—4 acres or the highest acreage planted during the previous 3 years, if that is less than 4 acres. Larger growers share in the remainder, in effect, absorbing the full reduction. Texas small grower requirements is 768,181 acres. With a 1959 allotment of 13

million acres, the minimum allotment requirements would leave only 9.5 million acres to growers planting more than 4 acres, Fortenberry pointed out. For such growers, this would represent an average cut of 32 percent from 1957 and 1958 allotments.

Actually the percentage reduction taken by the larger growers will vary widely from state to state as some states require a much greater acreage to meet minimum requirements. The 13 million acres of cotton in 1959 does not take into consideration the Soil Bank acreage reserve. The present Soil Bank Act was applicable for 1957, 1958 and 1959 seasons. Appropriations to finance the program, however, are made annually. Should appropriations be made to extend this program to 1959, cotton acreage planted might be reduced another 2 to 3 million acres.

"Under these circumstances, the passage of corrective legislation in 1958 is unquestionably essential if the cotton industry is to have a future in the United States. That is why the Plains Cotton Growers are supporting the proposed ACPA cotton bill and why we think every cotton producer should support," Fortenberry concluded.
