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## Self Service, Wing Ding Drive-In Hit By Burglars Monday Night

Burglars hit local firms for the second time in a week Monday night when they made entry to Self Service Station and the Wing Ding Drive-In.

At Self's they broke into the Coke machine and got about \$6 or \$7 in change, along with some cigarettes on the counter.

Entry was made through a window in the rear of the building. Apparently it was necessary for the thieves to scale the building, for the rear of the building is not accessible from either side.

A window was broken out at the rear two cartons of cigarettes.

Wing Ding, where Thieves took them left through the back door of the building.

Last week, burglars entered Slaton Pharmacy and Haddock Food Store by cutting holes in the roofs to gain entry.

Violations of the curfew law, drunkenness, and being drunk in a car were charged against 13 persons who were jailed here over the week end.

Traffic tickets were issued nine persons. Violations included speeding, running a red light, imprudent speeding, and driving without an operator's license.

Jackson Grocery in the flats was burglarized Friday night when thieves entered through the back door of the building. Two packages of cigarettes and \$4 in cash were missing.

## Sale of Water, Sewer Bonds Set; Change Requested on Highway Signs

Slaton City Commissioners this week requested the State Highway Department to change the population of Slaton on the City Limit Signs from 5,040 to an estimated population of 6,451.

The Commission was requested to make the change by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce. The estimated population is based on the number of water, light, and gas meter connections.

Commissioners also set Monday, June 24, as date of sale of bonds which were authorized in the recent city election. M. A. Hagberg, Dallas bondsman, was present at the meeting and advised commissioners that bonding representatives throughout the state would be notified of the sale.

Bids on bonds will be opened at 8 p. m. that date.

Spraying for flies and mosquitoes was begun Wednesday by city employees. Mayor O. N. Alcorn said that the spraying would be continued throughout the summer as deemed necessary.

## Request Sent Out for Blood Donations To Aid Long-Time Slaton Resident

A long-time Slaton resident is in need of blood.

D. S. Richardson, who has been suffering from a blood disease for quite some time, and requires a transfusion of one pint of blood every week or 10 days, owes about 50 pints of blood to the blood bank.

So far, 37 pints of blood have been used, with only 14 pints being donated to date as replacements.

Replacement of blood is made on a two-for-one basis, with the additional pint taking care of blood charges. Blood can be bought with replacement at the rate of \$20 per pint.

The Rev. W. T. Toles, pastor of the Church of God in Slaton, has made an appeal for blood donors for Richardson. Rev. Toles said this week that he would be happy to supply additional information concerning the donation of blood to persons interested. He can be contacted at VA 8-3498.

For donors who plan to give blood, he suggested that it be given before meals, or at least two hours after having eaten.

The blood bank in this area is located at 2318 19th street, Lubbock.

Rev. Toles stated that anyone who could donate a pint of blood, or aid in the purchase of a pint of blood, would be greatly appreciated.

## Evidence of the 'Big One'—They Have Plenty

The big fish didn't get away this time nor did about 150 smaller ones, according to reports brought in by B. W. West Tuesday afternoon.

Among their catch were two large yellow cat, one weighing 15 pounds and the other, 25. These were caught in the river just below the dam while the gates were open. There were 121 channel cat weighing from one and one-half to two and one half pounds each. They caught about 40 bass, one of which weighed five and one half pounds. The others ranged from one to three pounds.

**DIAMOND TROUBLE**

Is professional baseball in danger? The fans may not think so, but the club owners are alarmed over the falling off in attendance. In 1948 the professionals, both major league and minor, drew 62,815,925 spectators. In 1956 the figure was only 33,621,502.

The individual clubs, with only a few exceptions, are suffering seriously. In 1948 the Cleveland pennant winners had 2,602,627 cash customers. In 1956, with a second-place team that was a pennant contender until almost the end of the season, they drew only 865,467. The same tale is told of almost all the others.

The exceptions can be explained by novelty. The Boston Braves moved to Milwaukee, the St. Louis Browns to Baltimore, and the Philadelphia Athletics to Kansas City. All three new cities are far surpassing the patronage afforded by the old. But when the novelty wears off, these three may experience the same falling off.

The explanation is probably the growth of other attractions. Yet the real reason seems to be the spread of television. When a man can watch a sporting event in his own armchair, he is less apt to go out to find one. It all adds up to a tough problem for the baseball magnates.

**PICKING THE JUSTICES**

Who are the best judges of qualifications for the Supreme Court? Probably the Supreme Court justices themselves. One requirement often suggested is that they should have had previous judicial experience.

Justice Felix Frankfurter, who has served since 1939, does not think much of this idea. In a memorial address commemorating the late Justice Owen J. Roberts, he says that "the correlation between prior judicial experience and fitness for the functions of the Supreme Court is zero."

Of the 90 who have served on our highest court since its organization, 28 had no previous judicial service whatever. The 28 included seven of our 13 chief justices. Marshall, Taney, Chase, Waite, Fuller, Vinson and Warren. Justice Frankfurter lists also the 16 justices whom he considers pre-eminent. Only six had ever served on a bench. Such a notable justice as Louis D. Brandeis had no previous judicial experience.

Further, Justice Frankfurter thinks that the Supreme Court has special needs which may not be familiar to judges promoted from the lower courts. Evidently there is no simple formula to show whether an appointee to the Supreme Court will make a good judge.

**CONFUSED CONGRESS**

The 85th Congress is not one which is likely to go down in history for notable achievements. Its main concern is now the budget, and this has exposed confusions, divisions and a change of roles. The Democrats are being turned into the party of economy and the Republicans into that of spending. This is threatening to produce a division in Republican ranks as wide and possibly even as bitter as the civil rights issue among the Democrats.

The press is beginning to report the wisecracks Republicans are passing about "modern Republicanism," and if legislators in the President's own party vote for the budget, many of them will do so with misgivings. The budget is both a divisive and confusing issue to Republicans. It is so also to Democrats with strong New Deal attitudes. To find themselves on the side of economy is strange.

Other issues sleep. Civil right, Taft-Hartley, revision of the McCarran-Walter Act, the serious Senate debate on foreign policy which seemed likely during the height of the Middle Eastern crisis last fall—these issues are not likely to be handled by the 85th Congress. One gets the impression that there are many jumbled ideas on Capitol Hill today and that positive, constructive thinking is in the shade.

The beating President Eisenhower's budget is taking from both sides makes one wonder whether the old soldier might not long for the day when all he had to worry about was the German army.

Television continues to prevent life around the family hearth from becoming dull and monotonous. For instance, a Chicago man fired a shotgun blast into the home set when his wife refused to turn it off.

A 102-year-old retired Wisconsin farmer who has two homes in different communities prefers the larger town because he finds life more exciting there. If the Chamber of Commerce fails to use that for a publicity plug, it needs reorganizing.

Now that five outstanding senators of the past have been proposed for the U. S. Senate hall of fame, present members should make a conscientious appraisal of themselves and their statesmanship to determine how they measure up.

One thing about these television movies; they give the youngsters a chance to see what it was like in the good old days—before television.

# Disability Insurance Checks Due Disabled Persons During August

More than 100,000 severely disabled people in communities all over the Nation will receive their first social security disability insurance checks in August, John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock Social Security office announced recently.

But many other eligible disabled workers 50 to 65 years of age, some of them no doubt living in Texas, have so far failed to make application to their social security offices. Those who have been disabled for work for a long time must apply before June 30, Hutton pointed out, or they will lose their rights to these new benefit payments.

**Worked Under Program**  
Any severely disabled person who has worked under social security for at least five years and who has been disabled for six months or more should get in touch with his social security office right away, the social security district manager said.

If he is between 50 and 65 years of age, he may be eligible to have his social security record frozen to protect his future right to disability payments, and also his and his family's rights to old age and survivors benefits.

"Unfortunately there is a lot of misunderstanding," Hutton said, "as to how disabled a worker has to be to get social security disability insurance benefits or to have his social security record frozen. The rules in the social security law for deciding whether a person is 'disabled' are different from the rules in some other Government and private disability programs."

**'Disabled' Defined**  
To be found "disabled" under the social security law, he said, a worker must have a disability which in the words of the law, makes him unable "to engage in any substantial gainful activity." It must be the kind of physical or mental condition which shows up in medical evidence, including his doctor's report, hospital reports, or special tests. It must have lasted for at least six months and be expected to continue for a long and indefinite time.

In general, he said, "substantial gainful activity" means the performance of a substantial amount of work with reasonable regularity in employment or self-employment. A person does not have to be completely helpless to qualify under the social security disability provisions, Hutton emphasized. Consideration is given to all of the facts in the individual's situation both medical and non-medical.

**How Severe**  
First consideration is, of course, given to the severity of his condition as shown by the medical evidence. This evidence must show that the person has a condition which makes him unable to perform significant functions such as moving about, handling objects, hearing, speaking, understanding, or reasoning, so that he cannot with his training, education and work experience engage in any kind of substantial gainful activity.

Hutton said most individuals with such serious disabilities are unable to work. There are cases, however, where a person with such a severe disability is working, or able to work, because of his special knowledge and skills. He would not be entitled to benefits, the district manager said, because he would be able to engage in substantial activity.

**Occasional Work**  
A person might work occasionally or intermittently and this would not necessarily mean that he was able to engage in substantial gainful activity. Both the nature of the work and the amount of money he earned would have to be considered.
