## Wreckless Driving, Speeding 90 mph, Failure To Stop Charges Bring \$35 Fine to Driver in Corporation Court

A fine of \$20 for wreckless driving and speeding at 90 m.p.h. and a \$15 fine for failure to obey an officer's audible signal were assessed against Frank Perez this week in Corporation Court. Perez was apprehended after a chase through town, and after warning shots had been fired at him by local police officers.

Tickets were issued two persons this week for failure to grant right of way; to two persons for driving without an operator's license, one for driving without an operator's license on the driver's person, and

one for backing without proper clearance.

Twenty-two persons were jailed, on charges of drunkenness, being drunk in a car, disturbance, use of abusive language, and traffic violations.

## Tigers, Stamford Meet Tonight in Bulldog Territory; Seagraves Wins Over Slaton Last Week by 14-7

At the kickoff tonight at 8 p.m. in Stamford, the Tigers from Slaton will go against the defending state champions, the Stamford Bulldogs.

For the Tigers it will be their third try at chalking up a win for this season. The two previous games saw the Tigers on the short end of the score. They bowed to Canyon 26-13 and to Seagraves 14-7.

This year's Bulldogs were rated third in their district before the season began. Only four lettermen and two reserve lettermen were on hand from last year's team.

Last week saw five regulars out with injuries. Phillip Savage, Stanley Hill, and Robert Hardin were all out of the backfield for the Bulldogs last week. Reports indicated that Hill was improving, but that Hardin would be out for most of the season with a knee injury.

Larry Dipple and Andy Swenson were also out last week. Swenson is expected to be ready to go for this week's game.

The Tigers have been pretty well free from injuries thus far in the season. End Tommy McClanahan is out for the season with a broken collar bone, and Wayne Banks will be out for another game or two with a hair-line fracture of the shoulder.

Mackie Klattenhoff is out, and is hospitalized in Plainview. He entered the local hospital on Sunday, and was transferred to Plainview Wednesday morning. His illness had not been diagnosed late Wednesday, and he was considered to be in critical condition.

About six minutes later the Eagle fullback, R. E. Duggan crossed the goal line into pay dirt, and the run for extra point added up to a 7-7 tie.

Heavy rain during the second half held back scoring, and contributed to fumbles.

Three members of the Tiger eleven were sidelined. They included Tommy McClanahan, Wayne Banks and Bill Berry.

Higley is president and publisher of the Childress Index, a position he has held for about 22 years. He is a past president of the Childress Club, in which he has a 22-year perfect attendance record.

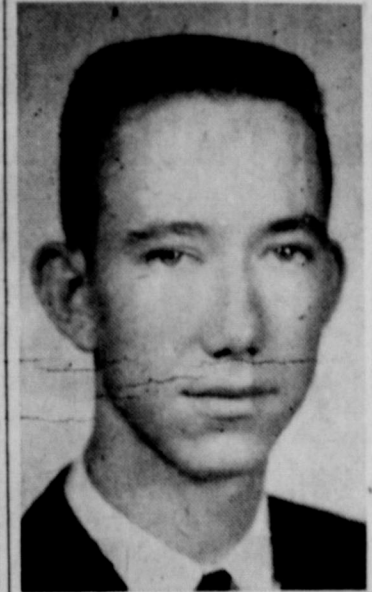

## Possibility of Railroad Freight Car Repair, Building Shop Told

Directors of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night discussed possibilities of Slaton's obtaining a repair shop and car building unit here with the Santa Fe division headquarters.

Facts were brought out that the facilities for such a factory were available here, including location, and some of the buildings which might be used successfully.

Reports are that some 700 cars go through here to other sites for repair each year. It was pointed out that the building of new freight cars could also be successfully accomplished. Ordinary labor supply is available here, but skilled labor

would have to be imported, the directors said.

## Cotton's 'Troubles' Discussed By Cotton Growers Assn. Official

"Cotton is in trouble," a South Plains cotton farmer told members of the Slaton Rotary Club last week, and then went on to discuss some of the troubles.

Wilmer Smith, vice president of the Plains Cotton Growers Association, said that farmers buy things at other people's prices, but they also sell their cotton at someone else's prices.

He cited instances where the Secretary of Agriculture was critical of farmers prices, and pointed out that Secretary Benson had testified before the sub-committee on appropriations in a manner not favorable to farmers.

"Lowering the price of cotton \$16 per bale did not increase the consumption of cotton," Smith said, "and it did not reduce cotton goods."

In looking toward the future of cotton, Smith pointed out that the export of five million bales annually is in danger of being lost. He continued that cotton is losing its place on the fabric market to synthetic materials.

Even though uses for cotton have increased tremendously, cotton has barely held its place on the market, he said.

"So far this has not been true."

Describing the work of the Plains Cotton Growers Association, Smith said that it was now affiliated with the American Cotton Growers Association, and oil mills and gins. He showed that for the first time in history there was some semblance of national organization for furthering the interest of cotton.

Smith said that in general cotton farmers in the Slaton area were not supporters of the Plains Cotton Growers Association.

George W. Pfeiffenberger, executive vice president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., attended the meeting with Smith.

Otis Hood, representing the Lubbock Rotary Club, announced that the annual Inter-City meeting would be held at 7 p.m. Tuesday, October 1, at the Fair Park Coliseum in Lubbock. Governor Price Daniel is to be speaker.

**Applications for Vacancies Over State Accepted by State Police**

Higher pay, better training and more opportunities were featured items in the Texas Department of Public Safety's bid this week for more than a hundred new patrolmen.

The state police openings were announced by Col Homer Garrison Jr., department director, as the first drive for additional manpower under the new regional operational system, and since departmental pay raises went into effect.

The patrolmen jobs will find vacancies in four functions of the department—Driver License, Highway Patrol, Motor Vehicle Inspection and License and Weight. Applicants may indicate the job they prefer. Garrison said many favorable

features are now available to new members of the DPS that were not enjoyed previously.

Under the new system, trainees will draw \$300 per month while attending school at the DPS Training Academy in Austin. They will get automatic pay raises at the completion of their training period. New employees will receive thorough training in most every function conducted by the Texas DPS, qualifying them for immediate transfers and promotions to other positions outside their regular function.

Length of training has been extended for personnel and additional subjects have been included in the training program. Graduates will be among the best trained law enforcement officers in the nation. Applications from qualified men between 21 and 35 years of age will be accepted until October 10 at the Texas Department of Public Safety's Personnel and Training section.

Entrance examinations will be given October 15 at points throughout the state. Persons selected by the examination and other qualifications will receive training in Austin starting November 15 for a period of eight weeks. Following this, they will train on the job one month before returning to the Training Academy for an additional month of specialized training.

Physical requirements for applicants now compare with the best. The male applicants must be between 63 and 76 inches in height, not less than 20/30 vision in each eye without correcting lenses.

Applicants must have a high school education and be a resident of the State of Texas at least one year immediately preceding the date of application. They must be of good moral character and habits.

Many advantages are given DPS employees in the form of holidays, vacation, sick leave, travel expense, uniforms, insurance, retirement and other items. Complete information concerning the new positions, training and benefits, may be obtained by writing the Department of Public Safety, Austin.

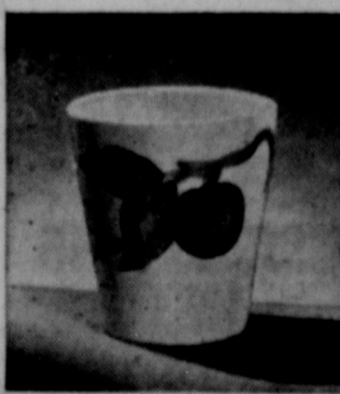

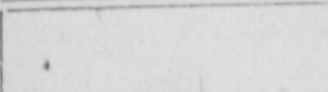

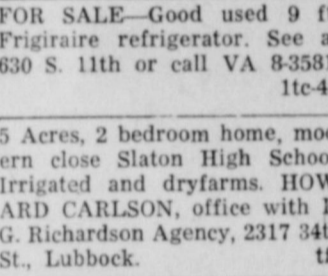

## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.—For the 72nd time in Texas, the Legislature will convene in special session Oct. 14.

Throughout the summer there was lively debate as to whether such a step should be taken. Gov. Price Daniel put an end to speculation by setting the date. Purpose: to enact laws in regard to lobby control, representation before state agencies, crime study and water development.

Calling special sessions has been more the custom of Texas governors than not. Of the 71 previously called since Texas became a state, 41 have fallen in the 46-year period since 1911—almost one a year.

Almost all Governor Daniel's predecessors in the past 30 years called lawmakers back at least once. (exceptions: Buford Jester and W. Lee O'Daniel.) Gov. Dan Moody holds the record for keeping the Legislature busy. In 10 months of 1929 and 1930 he called five special sessions.

Runners-up are Gov. Miriam Ferguson, who called four in 1933 and 1934, and Gov. Ross Sterling, who called four in 1931 and '32. Gov. James V. Allred called three in 1935-'36 and two more in 1936 and '37. In those days a legislator had to keep his bag packed.

What were the issues that kept the lawmakers so busy in those days? Mostly, the same ones they're working on today.

In the 'day of Governor Moody's five calls, regular sessions were only 60 days, so a lot of routine business overflowed. But he also called their attention to special problems. Many sound familiar—improvement of the Prison System "along modern and scientific lines," regulation of securities sales, investigation of charges against a state official. At one time Governor Moody vetoed all the appropriation bills and told the Legislature to try again—within the budget.

Governor Sterling asked legislators to enact a program to conserve natural resources, particularly oil and gas, and to help farmers, hard hit by sagging cotton prices. Sterling also had a states rights vs. federal courts problem in that the U. S. Supreme Court had negated Texas' oil proration laws.

Mrs. Ferguson had to call lawmakers back again and again to wrestle with the "hard times" of the thirties. Relief bonds to help the unemployed and destitute were passed. In one of her calls, Mrs. Ferguson, with an eye for housewifely problems, called on lawmakers "to make needed appropriation for refrigeration in the Governor's Mansion."

Governor Allred's special sessions dealt with some of the

most stirring issues of the thirties. He asked for liquor selling regulations following the repeal of Prohibition and for a law banning pari-mutuel betting at race tracks. He also asked for money for old age pensions (\$15 a month in those days) and for more taxes to get the general revenue fund out of the red.

In most cases, the governors got the laws they wanted passed—sometimes by calling one session on the end of another, sometimes in a session as short as nine days.

**WATER PROGRAM OKAYED**—in one area—water development—legislators have their work cut out for them.

A 150-member statewide water committee approved a three-point program proposed by the governor. It calls for:

1. Appropriating \$1,024,000 to set up a planning division under the State Water Board.

2. Laws enabling the state to contract for water space in federal reservoirs.

3. An all-out push to rally support for passage of the \$200,000,000 water bond amendment to be voted on Nov. 5. Harry Provenza, Waco editor, is chairman of the campaign committee. Lon C. Hill, Corpus Christi businessman, is co-chairman.

**WINDOW-JUMPING DEFERRED**—Several people in Austin have suggested forming an "I'm bored with BenJack" Club. Their attitude stems from Promoter BenJack Cage's refusal to testify about his part in ICT affairs during his appearances in Austin. During his flamboyant return to Texas several weeks ago Cage promised to tell things about the bank "would have people jumping out of windows."

Cage stayed only 10 minutes when he appeared before the Travis County grand jury. When called by the House investigating committee, he invoked the Texas brand of the Fifth Amendment and refused to testify.

If sensational information is to be revealed, it apparently will not come until Cage comes to trial in Dallas on charges of embezzling ICT funds.
