PREPARING FOR SUMMER MILK



kind, is to be given a chance under natural conditions. New information which has recently been discovered at some of the state agricultural colleges indicates that green feed and sun-light combined make it possible for a cow to build up her system by storing minerals and other body reserves, provided she re-ceives a sufficient supply of good

A heavy milking cow, however, will need feed in addition to pasture if the milk flow is to be maintained. Milking heavily with pasture as the sole source of feed This loss of weight should be watched and extra feed given to prevent the cow from becoming thin, which will result in reduced milk production later.

With the coming of the sum-mer season, new and interesting problems present themselves which concern the care of milk. The first warm nights are apt to care is practiced. It is important to take precautions which will keep down the number of bacteria and prevent their growth. To do this milk must be produced under clean conditions, be kept in the coughly cleaned utensils, and be oughly cleaned utensils, and be cooled as soon as possible after it comes from the cow.

Summer is one of the easiest seasons in which to produce clean milk. There will be times, however, when a considerable amount of mud and dirt will collect on the udder and flanks of cows, and if a portion of this material drops into the milk it will injure its keeping quality. The dirt which collects on the flanks and udder should be removed before milking time by wiping with a damp cloth. If the half on the udder and understand the clother is already that the clother is alread line is clipped short the cleaning can be done effectively and quick-ly. Incidentally, the practice of clipping the cow all over before turning to pasture not only makes it easier to keep her clean, but it relieves the itchy condition that develops during the stabling

Much of the milk produced in the country is hauled long dis-tances in large trucks. In sum-mer if the cans of milk are not protected from the sun before leaving the farm, and again en-route, it will be difficult to keep the milk sweet until it is used. Every time a day's milk is returned to the farm, for whatever reason, there is a distinct finan-cial loss. Only by producing a sanitary milk and then taking care of it can satisfactory results be obtained to all concerned.

WAYS WITH VEGETABLES

The fall and late summer vegetables



is one that if cooked and well drained, then seasoned with plenty of butter, salt and white pepper makes a tasty dish. Summer seasoning is "flat, stale and unprofit-

Pepper Omelet.—Beat the yolks of three eggs until light, add a tenspoontul of flour, one-half tenspoonful of salt, three tablespoonfuls of cold waspoonful each of minced green and of that state. red pepper. Lastly, fold in the stiffly beaten whites and cook as any omelet. Slip folded onto a hot platter, surround with a little tomato sauce and sprinkle with a bit of the minced peppers. Serve hot with hot corn cakes.

Cream of Carrot Soup .- Cook until tender one plnt of diced carrots, drain and mash; put through a ricer. Scald a quart of milk with a slice of onlon and a pinch of nutmeg; remove the onion after fifteen minutes, aid the carrot and seasonings, a little sugar and seasonings, a little sugar and a dash of cayenne. 

When used it may be enriched by thickening slightly with one teaspoonful of butter and one-half teaspoonful of flour to a cupful of the sauce.

Peppers Brilliant .- Select large red peppers, cut into halves lengthwise, remove the seeds and parboil five misutes; drain, place in a buttered pan and fill with chopped fresh mushrooms which have been cooked five minutes in a little butter, added to half cupfuf of cooked rice which has been motetened with tomato or cream sauce. Bird's Nest .-Mash six cooked potatoes, season

to taste and add half a beaten egg; the mixture should be quite stiff. With buttered hands make into balls the size of an egg. Lay these in a shallow buttered tin quite far apart However, if one takes certain measand press into each the bottom of a small cup, thus making nests. Brush resorting to the extreme penalty. with the remainder of the egg and a little water added and set into a hot oven to brown. Keep hot. While the nests are browning, run a half-pound of broiled steak through the meat grinder and add enough seasoned temato sauce to moisten liberally; bring to a boil and with it fill the hot nests, laying on top two or three very small cooked and buttered onions. Serve ona hot platter with hot buttered toast on which is served buttered asparagus.

Roast Pig.-The pig should not be over six or eight weeks old. Wash and wipe dry after it is cleaned and prepared for roasting. RATIONS IN SUMMER

Thousands of hers are practicalfy forced to stop laying because of the fact that many farmers stop feeding mash and increase the grain feed of their flocks. To get the most eggs from the flock, it is just as necessary that the hens have dry mash in the summer as it is in the winter,

Laying hens should be forced to eat more dry mash than they do grain in summer. A good way to do this is to give the hens a supply of mash and keep them penned up until ten o'clock in the morning without any grain. If the hens cannot be confined they can still be forced to eat enough mash, if grain is fed only at night and the dry mash kept before them at all times in self-feeders or hoppers.

One of the main reasons for keep ing up the feeding of mash during the summer is to insure the best result when the flock is culled in the fall. All flocks should be culled sometim between the middle of July and the first of September, but if the hens are not properly fed during the summer they will all stop laying, thereby making it impossible to tell the good layers from the poor ones at culling

A good dry mash can be made from 150 pounds of bran, 150 pounds of shorts, 100 pounds of cornmeal and 100 pounds of tankage containing at least 60 per cent protein. Some grain should be fed along with this mash Corn alone will do, but if oats or wheat are available it is best to add 80 pounds of one of these grains to every 70 pounds of corn, to give variety in the ration. Oyster shells o ground limestone should be before the hens at all times, as they need this material in making the egg shell.

If as much milk as one gallon for every 30 hens is available, the dry mash can be omitted from the feed of the hens and only the grain and the milk tedes

Doctoring of Chickens Not to Be Recommended

The doctoring of poultry is not to be recommended except in case of a few diseases such as chicken pox, colds and cases of intestinal worms. There are two very good reasons for this belief: First, the unit of production of the individual bird is so small on the commercial plant that if a man's time is worth anything it is too valuable to spend treating sick chickens individually unless they are show specimens of great individual value. Second, the cured chicken is always a menace to the health of the flock. because its identity is likely to be overlooked or forgotten, and it goes into the breeding pen and may perpetuate through the offspring that constitutional weakness that was one of the primary causes of its being ill. The opinion of practically all poultrymen who rear large numbers of fowls is that in a large proportion of cases of disease the birds ought to be killed. Egg-Eating Habit Quite Difficult to Overcome

One should arrange all nests so that they will be quite dark by placing under dropping boards or by having entrance from back of nest. Catch birds that show egg stains about head and file or clip front of bill till quite

Feed birds plenty of oyster shell or lime and include some animal feed like milk, meat scrap, or tankage in the ration. A craving for substances in meat often leads to the habit.

The hens should be kept busy and interested by providing deep litter to scratch in. Let birds run out of doors whenever weather conditions permit.

Finish Broiler Cockerels

Finish the broller cockerels by milk feeding, ten days or two weeks. While carrying on this feeding, take time to look up the best market outlet. This is best done by getting in touch with If the skin cracks during the last of several poultry buyers in pear-by fittes. Tell them just what you have, and if you fit the brollers for market you can, as a rule, get top quotations.

Sunshine Hurts Chicks

Too much hot sunshine is not good for baby chicks and causes many inexplicable losses among birds that are apparently perfectly healthy in every way and ought to thrive but do not. For the first two or three days the little fellows should be skeltered from the sun entirely and given conditions of semi-shade thereafter. They should at all times have cool shade that they can run to whenever they want it. This, of course, applies to all classes



Points on Tree Planting in City Given in Bulletin

Trees for Town and City Streets,' by F. L. Mulford, horticulturist, issued by the United States Department of Agriculture, describes in detail the various oaks for street use in different regions, as well as about 100 other trees or varieties. Elms are given second place in desirability for city streets, and sycamores third. Maples are considered less desirable than has been generally supposed. Except the Lombardy poplar most varieties of poplar are not recommended.

Before ornamental tree-planting for town or city streets is undertaken, a number of important points must be given attention. Trees native to one art of the United States may not thrive in another region. Some trees are objectionable because their roots penetrate defective sewers, while others grow their roots so near the surface that they have a tendency to heave or crack sidewalks.

Only vigorous trees that will withstand the dust and smoke of a city should be planted to ornament the streets. The root system should be hardy, not easily affected by unusual soil conditions, by restricted feeding areas, or by root pruning in case street improvements are made, of the top of the tree when full-grown should be suited to the width of the Ed Walker of Garza county, charged street. The foliage should not be too dense, and should be of a pleasing tex-

Where there is a lack of sunshine in winter it is desirable to admit all the light possible by using only deciduous trees. The bulletin gives a table showing the differences in fall coloring and the date of dropping of all foliage. Narrow streets, it is pointed out, should be planted with tall, slender trees like the Lombardy popers-the jury in each case gave them, lar or small trees. Broad streets may be planted with spreading trees.

In the heart of a city, where the greatest difficulty is experienced in getting trees to grow, the allanthus will probably thrive when nearly all other kinds fall. The sycamore and the London plane are also good. The Carolina poplar will frequently grow in such places, and its use may sometimes be warranted. Consultation with the nearest state agricultural experiment station or with the United States Department of Agriculture would be advisable before deciding upon extensive tree-planting.

Tenants' Basement Garage

No American moto, ist who has driven in the busy district of any big city has falled to realize the seriousness of the parking problem which the tremendous popularity of the motor car has created in recent years. Streets, laid out before motor vehicles were dreamed of, prove utterly inadequate for accommodating the cars which the public would like to park in the business district. That some solution must be found at an early day is manlfest. Of peculiar interest, therefore, been worked out by the management of a new office building in Los Angeles housing thousands of persons, a large number of whom use motor cars. Not only has provision been made for tenants of the building, but for patrons of these tenants as well, thereby giving occupants of this big structure a decided advantage over those in oth-

In the construction of this skyscraper an underground garage was built at the rear of the lot and adjoining the office building. This fireproof storage space accommodates nearly 200 cars and is reached from the street by broad ramps. Stalls in the garage rent for \$20 per month. Here a moderate temperature obtains at all times and a car and its contents are safe from exposure to the elements and also from thieves.-Popular Me-

How to Figure Repair Costs

One of the most complete and co rise paragraphs ever printed for the advice of the prospective home owner regarding maintenance costs and expenses of home ownership appears in the recently issued pamphlet titled "How to Own Your Own Home," prepared by the division of building and housing, Department of Commerce. It

"In addition to payments on principal and interest on a home, allowance must be made for some or all of the following expenses: (a) Renewals and repairs, (b) property tax and special assessments, (c) insurance, (d) water tax or rent, (e) accessories and (f) improvements. In addition to the above, some owners add in the interest which they would otherwise receive on the amount of their cash payment or equity."





SEASONABLE GOOD THINGS

While the blueberries or huckleber ries are in the market stir in a cupful into the griddle-cake bat-



clous cakes they make. It is best to cut meat from the menu entirely or serve it but once or twice a week. With eggs, milk and cheese in abundance, with all the seasonable fruits and vegetables it will not be missed or needed.

Luncheon Eggs.-Wash and one-quarter pound of fresh mushrooms; melt one tablespoonful of butter in a saucepan and add the mushrooms, stirring until the moisture is evaporated; add one tablespoonful of flour, blend well, add one-half cupful of chicken stock, one-fourth tenspoon ful of salt and a dash of pepper. Cook two minutes. Cut six hard-cooked eggs into halves, remove the yolks an mix with the mushroom sauce. Fil the eggs with this mixture and set them into a baking dish, surround with tomato sauce and serve when well heated through. Just before serving place a fillet of sardine on each egg.

String Beans With Cheese.-Prepare the beans, cutting them length wise in two or three strips. Cook in boiling water until tender. Drain and season with salt and cayenne. For each two cupfuls of beans add onehalf cupful of grated cheese, onefourth cupful of top milk and one tablespoonful of butter. Stir until well heated and serve at once.

Sauted Cucumbers .- Cut peeled -cucumbers into slices lengthwise, roll in seasoned flour and fry in butter. Serve with drawn butter sauce.

Summer Squash With Tomatoes and Corn .- Cook one small onion chopped in four tablespoonfuls of butter until the onion is yellow. Add corn cut from four ears, three tomatoes cut into cubes and one small summer squash cut into small pieces. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and simmer covered thirty minutes.

Rice and Apples.-Cook cored peeled apples in sirup until tender. Arrange in a serving dish with cooked rice. Fill the cavities of the apple with brightcolored jelly, arrange the rice and ap

SABBATH-DAY MEALS

The average family expects food a bit nicer and more out of the ordinary on the Sabbath, With the overworked mother this is often an added burden. In many homes the children are taught to be thankful and as Saturday is usually a free day for the school-age child, part of the time
