## SLATON BEATS RED CROSS QUOTA

### THIS WEEK'S WAR MOVES

The victory of American air forces in the battle of the Bismarck sea carried implications almost as great as the victory itself. In reporting our complete success against the Japanese convoy, General MacArthur said it could not fail to have "most important results" on the enemy's strategic and tactical plans—because, in addition to losing 10 warships, 12 transports, 55 planes, an estimated 15,000 troops and unknown numbers of naval personnel, the Japanese failed in their attempt to reinforce their hard-pressed forces in Northeast New Guinea. As a result of this major disaster, the Jap garrisons at Lae and Salamaua must now face the Allies' New Guinea drive without the supplies and reinforcements they so badly need.

Under Secretary of War Patterson said the Japanese loss of 55 planes, as compared to our loss of four, was proportionately very high, and showed the excellent work that American aircraft of both Army and Navy are doing in the Pacific.

News from Tunisia continued favorable last week, as Allied forces

reoccupied Kasserine, Feriana and Sbeitla. German concern over the vigor and extent of our counterattacks, said Under Secretary Patterson, was evidenced by their employment of mines and booby traps in their retreat in the central sector, as well as by their own attacks against the British in the north.

The battle for Tunisia is divided into three fronts. In the central sector, Allied forces are pressing the withdrawing Axis troops back along the same roads they followed in their original advance, driving on south and southwest of Sbeitla to retake territories lost in the German drive a few weeks ago. In the north, the British first Army has repulsed several enemy attacks in setbacks that cost the Axis heavily in casualties and losses. South, in the area of the Mareth Line, Allied armored forces pushed ahead to engage the Germans in infantry and tank fighting. And supporting this three-fold offensive, Allied planes have been active over the entire front, bombing enemy targets from Tunisia and Bizerte in the north to Gabes and the Mareth Line in the south, and carrying devastating attacks against the enemy's equipment and forces in all three battle areas.

Mr. Patterson told the press that British and American planes have been striking successfully in the Mediterranean, against Italy, Sardinia, Sicily and Tunisia, and, cit-

### Plant A Garden Says O. P. A.

LUBBOCK, March 8.—Encouraging the planting of victory gardens and farms, the Office of Price Administration has made provisions for purchase of rationed beans and peas for planting, through use of a certificate from the County War Price and Rationing Board, district OPA officials said.

Certificates for quantities needed for planting are to be presented to grocers and seed merchants. They will be good for the specified number of points at the rationed rate of eight points per pound, thus saving point coupons in ration book two for food purchases.

The provision for use of certificates was made in a new regulation replacing the temporary arrangement under which purchasers could obtain beans or peas for planting by stating to the grocer or seed merchant they were being purchased for that purpose. The merchant will use the seed certificate to replenish his stocks, just as he uses point coupons from ration book two.

Point values of beans and peas are: up to 2 ounces, 1 point; over 2 and up to 4 ounces, 2 points; over 4 and up to 6 ounces, 3 points; over 6 and up to 8 ounces, 4 points; over 8 and up to 10 ounces, 5 points; over 10 and up to 14 ounces, 7 points; and over 15 and up to 16 ounces, 8 points.

District OPA officials have encouraged West Texans to plant victory gardens and farms in order to increase the food supply.

### MARCH 31, DEADLINE FOR TIRE INSPECTION ON "A" RATION HOLDERS

Briggs Robertson, who has charge of the issuing of the Gasoline Rationing Books here in Slaton, reports that a number of motorists do not seem to be familiar with the regulations on tire inspections and warns all holders of A Books that all the tires on their cars must be inspected by Mar. 31st, or it will be impossible to secure another book.

The requirements on inspections are every 6 months for holders of A Books, every 4 months for holders of B Books, every 3 months for C Book holders and every 2 months for T Book holders.

### Schools Open Drive To Buy 10,000 Jeeps

THE little jeep which is serving so nobly from Guadalcanal to Africa has become the symbol of the gigantic efforts of millions of American school children in their War Savings program.

Thousands of public, private and parochial schools soon will be displaying a certificate of honor from Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., signifying that they have paid for at least one jeep by buying \$900 in War Stamps and Bonds.

Countless others will be flying the Schools At War banner awarded to schools with 90 percent pupil participation in War Savings.

Ten thousand jeeps and a hundred bombers! This is the new goal of America's schools as 39,000,000 children continue their Schools At War program under the auspices of the Treasury Department and the U. S. Office of Education.

ing a recent engagement in which Allied planes destroyed 25 enemy planes with a loss of four, he said the score in aerial combat continues favorable.

During February, in nine previously reported American air raids on Klaka in the Alucians, at least 1,000 bombs were dropped and 10 enemy planes shot down. The Navy communique that estimated this damage to the enemy-held base said no U. S. planes were lost during these operations.

Secretary of the Navy Knox, discussing the submarine situation, told reporters that the Germans have between 300 and 400 submarines available for operations in the Atlantic. He pointed out, however, that a considerable portion of these are not active, as

a large percentage of their time is consumed in going to and from selected areas of operations. As for the recent RAF and USAAF bombings of Nazi submarine bases on the coast of France, Mr. Knox said the attacks are proving effective but just how effective in terms of direct hits he could not say.

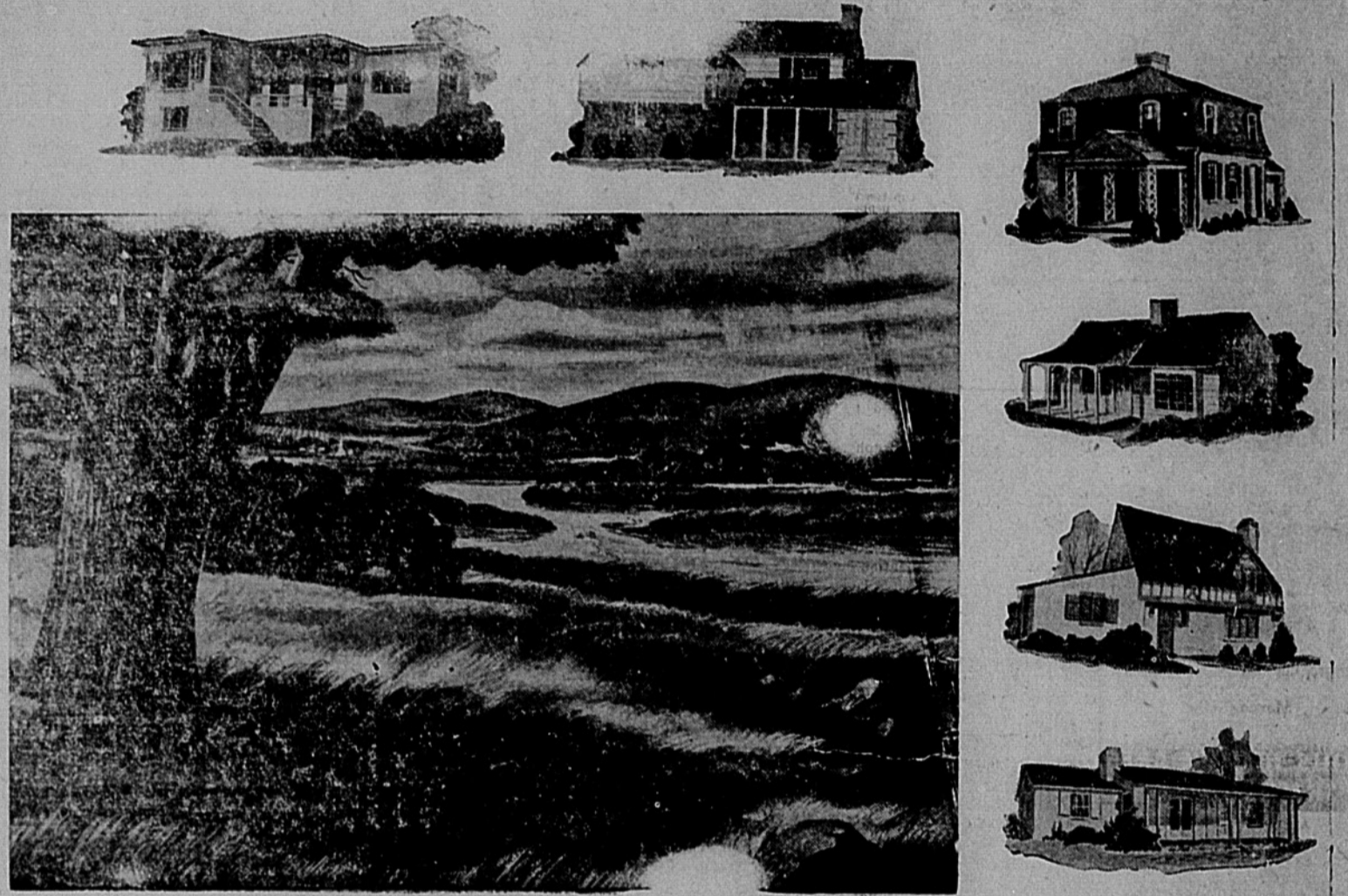

**Tomato Jelly Cottage Cheese Salad** is delicious both in taste and appearance. It's colorful on the dining or buffet table, and a good recipe to keep in mind to pep up Lenten menus. Cottage cheese from a practical, reusable tumbler is combined with finely cut chives for the center filling. To make the jelly ring for six people use:

5 cups tomato juice	2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
2 bay leaves	2 teaspoons lemon juice
Medium onion, sliced	

Soak gelatin in one half cup tomato juice. Add bay leaves, onion, peppercorns and salt to remaining juice. Simmer about 15 minutes. Strain. Add softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Then add Worcestershire Sauce and lemon juice. Chill. Pour into wet ring mold and chill until firm. Unmold on large salad plate and fill center with combination of 2 cups cottage cheese, salt and pepper and 1-1/2 cup finely cut chives. Decorate top of cottage cheese with more chives.
