Americans Eating Much More Meat

Amounts of meat eaten per person reached a high in 1944, despite so-called war-time shortages, an analysis of meat consumption in the United States shows. The average American in 1945 ate 10 per cent more meat than he did during the 1935-39 period.
High production and higher incomes explain the paradox—how this country could eat more meat and at the same time ship quantities to its armed services and to its war-time allies, according to Tyrus R. Timm, economist in farm management for the A. and M. College Extension Service, who compiled the report from U.S.D.A. reports.
One trend in the report of importance to Texas farm families is the increase in the amount of poultry products eaten by the average person. Per capita consumption of turkey in 1945 was 65 per cent above the figure for 1935-39. Consumption of chicken was up 41 per cent and of eggs 31 per cent.
The average person ate about 137 pounds of "red meat," nearly 30 pounds of chicken and turkey, and 390 eggs, last year, the Timm report shows. During the last year consumption of veal had increased about 45 per cent over the 1935-39 period. Consumption of beef, pork, lamb, and mutton per person went up seven per cent for each of those meat products.

He carefully files all requests for information and location of buddies, taking and indexing names, outfits, and all other information which might help. He has located several hundred boys this way, and "he mail to his "Exchange," which is only two months old, is getting heavier each day. Here he and his secretary Helen Perkus go over one of the files in search for somebody's buddy.

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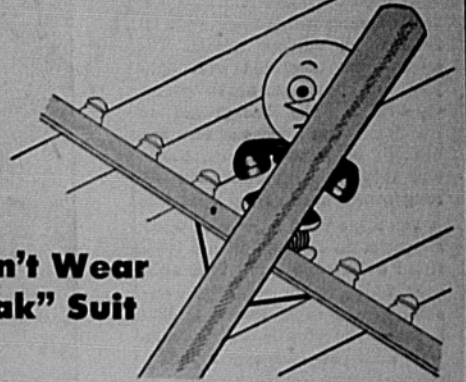

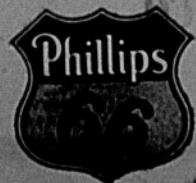

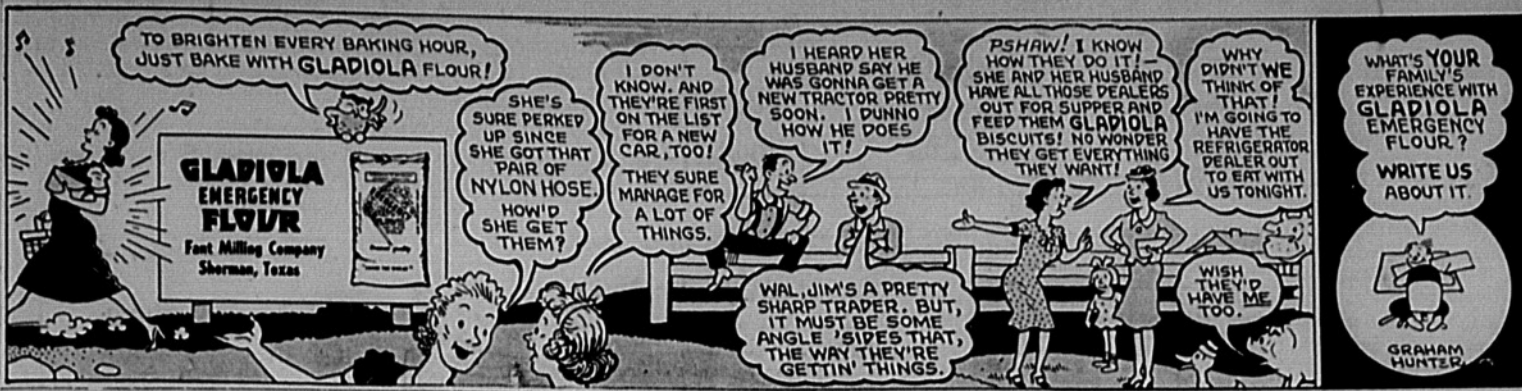

STRAWBERRIES MAKE GOOD CROP ON PLAINS

God! Mrs. N. G. Elliston of the community in Deaf Smith County set out 250 strawberry plants in 1938, she figures she's given away nearly 100,000 plants. And she's never sold a plant or a berry. Mastodon Gem is the variety which has proved so successful for Mrs. Elliston and which she has distributed so widely. Until two years ago, Mrs. Elliston kept a record of the number of plants given away on the back of a calendar. At that time the number totaled 75,000, and since Mrs. Elliston has continued generously sharing her plants. Several months ago for example, 22 members of her home demonstration club came and dug about 300 plants apiece. One, however, came back and got another 300. The plants have been given to

visitors from California, Colorado, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, and Oklahoma as well as Texas. Numbers of Randall County home demonstration club women "got their start" from Mrs. Elliston, and a man from Nazareth, Castro County; took home a load in a pick-up truck. Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, Deaf Smith County home demonstration agent, says Mrs. Elliston and her family have demonstrated that many other kind of fruits can be grown successfully under Plains conditions. They have peaches (including Elberta, Halehaven, J. H. Hale and Indian Red varieties), gooseberries, currants, raspberries, Montmorancy cherries, blue damson and yellow plums, quinces, apples, pears, and rhubarb. The blue damsons are a sure crop, Mrs. Elliston says, and she finds Bartlett ears do well, too.

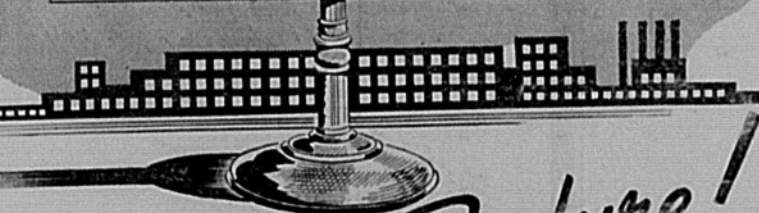

A Strike-Out By GEORGE S. BENSON President of Harding College Searcy, Arkansas



WORK stoppages are always bad news. Farmers hate to read about strikes because farms can prosper only when industrial workers are happy with their jobs and setting good tables. Farmers take sides in labor squabbles less than most city people think. Without much prejudice they wish mainly that whoever is on the wrong side of the argument will get right so business may go ahead.

Not many weeks ago, when a world-famous strike ended, I overheard a stranger say, "Strikes just can't go on forever. Finally men have to go back to work, whether they get all they struck for or not." The only trouble with such a philosophy is that it's not so. The fearful truth is that somebody, some day, might call a third strike . . . one you might call a strike-out.

Need EVERY big industrial Both concern is in league with two different kinds of people — both classes out for money, but in different ways. One group is its employees, the other its stockholders. Both alliances are necessary. There's no use wondering which is most important because it is not possible for an industrial organization to get along unless it has both. They are mutually essential.

It is safe to consider these two groups about the same size. Numerically, the country over, one crowd is about as big as the other. Individual companies differ; some have more employees than stockholders, others have

more investors than workers. In 1940, the General Motors Corp. had nearly twice as many investors as employees and several other big concerns were so situated.

A Little QUITE a few employees Overlap in certain corporations are stockholders too. They call themselves employees however, because their wages usually amount to more than their dividends. Payrolls have been running 10 to 20 times dividends for years. Generally, a company's stockholders and its employees are two entirely different crowds, and the firm can't manage without either group.

One point of most striking similarity between investors and employees is that they both are independent. Either crowd is free to walk right out and leave a company. Either bunch might strike a firm dead with that very weapon. Usually it's the workers who quit, because they are organized. Likewise, being organized, they can arrange to return to their jobs before it is too late.

Investors are not organized and accordingly don't strike. There's nobody to call a strike. But if strikes of employees kill the profit for investors, and dividends quit coming entirely, investors will finally quit. They will leave one at a time and nobody will tell them to come back. The final strike of employees that drives stockholders to quit, that's the strike that will be called "Out."

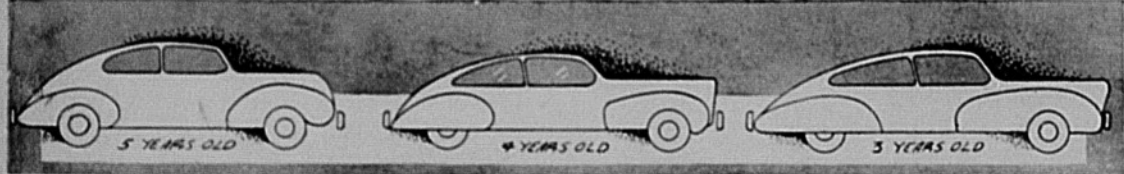

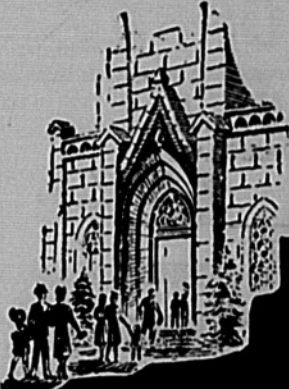

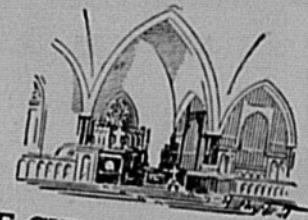
