

## Area Bank Deposits Show Slaton Sixth

Slaton's bank deposits on June 30 ranked sixth among towns of comparable size including 23 South Plains banks, according to a survey of bank deposits released last Sunday in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The local deposits totalled \$2,643,728.88. The figure given last week for Slatonite, to rank below T. Hoka, Spur, Post, Muleshoe and Floydada.

Deposits throughout the area included in the survey showed a sharp drop in total assets, with Levelland the only exception. The two banks there showed an approximate increase of \$400,000.

Levelland, Littlefield, Lubbock, Plainview, Lamesa and Brownfield are not included in the list of banks rated above Slaton, due to difference in the size of these towns and this city.

Floydada, county seat of Floyd county, showed the most deposits of any bank in towns of this size, with \$4,747,876.82 on deposit there.

Tahoka, Lynn county's capitol city, was second with \$3,927,860.02. Muleshoe, county seat of Bailey county, was a close third behind Tahoka with deposits totalling \$3,643,728.88.

Ranking fourth and fifth, and just ahead of Slaton, were Spur with \$2,957,152.88 in deposits; and Post with \$2,770,100.37. Post is county seat of Garza county, while Spur is the largest town, and the shopping center of Dickens county.

Slaton was the only town listed among these six leaders not a county seat, being forced to compete with this section's largest city, Lubbock, in bank services.

Other towns included in the 23-bank survey, in the order in which they rank according to deposits, were Matador, Amherst, Ralls, Hale Center, Seminole, Crosbyton, Morton, Abertathy, Lorenzo, Lockney, Olton, Petersburg, O'Donnell, Sudan, Seagraves, Anton and Wilson.

Wilson, the lowest total, had \$769,234. Anton had \$769,320.03 in deposits. There were the only two banks listed with deposits below a million dollars.

Area bankers attributed the decline to the enormous amount of money farmers are spending in the growing of this year's crops, and to the fact that 1948 was a relatively poor year agriculturally on the South Plains.

Loans and discounts also showed a sharp increase over last year at this time.

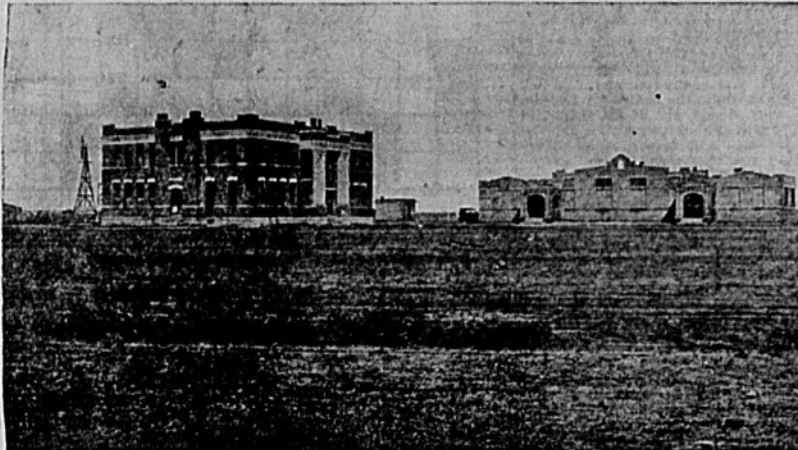

## Touchdown Club To Hold First Meeting; Will Hear Pattison

## Huckabay Returns From Washington; Hearing A Success

Moving rapidly, the proposed construction of a Canadian River reservoir north of Amarillo to supply water to several Panhandle and South Plains cities, including Slaton, was one step nearer completion this week after approval by the House of Representatives Public Lands committee.

Last Friday a sub-committee of this group gave approval to the project after hearing a group of South Plains and Panhandle businessmen and civic leaders, including Slaton's representative, J. B. Huckabay.

Huckabay left here last Thursday by plane to attend the hearing as a witness for the group, and representing the city of Slaton, and the city commissioners. This body had, earlier in the week, passed a resolution to the effect that they would buy water from such a reservoir, if it were constructed, providing the quality and price were satisfactory.

Upon his return to Slaton Sunday, Huckabay was very enthusiastic about the progress made in getting approval from both House and Senate, and eventual construction of the dam and reservoir.

"We have accomplished as much in this short time as would normally take two years," Huckabay said. "The final approval of this project should come without a hitch, unless some unforeseen event arises, far above what we have anticipated," he added.

Approval by the House and the Senate, however, will not mean the dam will be built, as it might not, even then, become a reality, he cautioned.

Four hurdles have already been passed with the Reclamation engineers recommending the project, as well as approving it; then, came approval by the Department of Interior, followed by the two committee groups.

In the committee hearing Friday Congressman Eugene A. Worley of Amarillo, and George Mahon of Colorado City—who represent the territory involved, appeared first before the sub-group. Clarence Whiteside, of Lubbock, chairman of the water project group in West Texas, spoke next, before witnesses were scheduled to appear.

Following his abbreviated speech, cut short so that committee members might attend an important House session, testimony of the witness from the towns interested was taken, in writing. Huckabay's testimony was in this data, representing Slaton.

On Monday the full committee met, and approved the measure, from the testimony presented. Supporters of the measure say the "big jobs" are ahead. The next step is for approval by the House Rules committee, where it will be decided if the measure will be presented to the House of Representatives.

Huckabay returned here Sunday night, flying a private plane for one of the area distributors of aircraft.

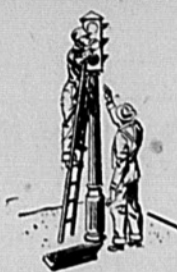
From the Sidewalk—

Mayor Lee Woolton — Yes sir! We'll get water, I think they say an 84 inch line will carry water from the proposed dam site to Lubbock, and a 12 inch pipe will bring it to us from there. It will take about six years to get the water done. It might be a little late, but we expect it to be done. But, when it is done, it will be the best thing in the world for us.

## West Texas Roundup



Lorenzo and its trade territory could use 500 cotton choppers and field hands the next ten days if they could be secured according to a leading farmer we were talking to Wednesday. All the fields need hands to hoe and we notice hundreds of negroes coming out from Lubbock each morning to assist in the hoeing. The crops are looking better than they have for years at this time of the year and if no hail falls within the next week Lorenzo gins should gin 25,000 bales of cotton if they can handle it. The acreage is the largest in the history of the county and Crosby county should produce from ninety to one hundred thousand bales under ordinary weather conditions. —The Lorenzo Tribune.

A continued shortage of cotton choppers is being felt by Hockley farmers this week according to Fred Presley, Texas Employment Commission representative in Levelland.

Presley said Wednesday that jobs were available for between six and seven hundred additional choppers with no immediate relief in sight. — Hockley County Herald.

Success marked Abernathy's 40th Anniversary Celebration held Saturday. This was the opinion of visitors and local residents who observed the event from the morning parade to the conclusion of the evening's entertainment.

An estimated crowd of near 7,000 people attended the celebration during the day and night. — Abernathy Review.

The increase in deposits almost parallels the increase in the number of loans made however, with \$334,573.07 more out on loans than the same period last year. Figures were in July 1948, \$2,485,481.83 compared to the current loans and discounts of \$2,810,054.91. — Hockley County Herald.

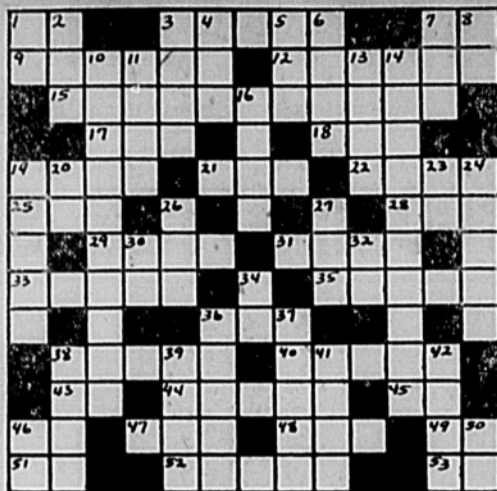
There's less money in the bank these days.

A quarterly statement of the condition of the First National Bank, published elsewhere in today's issue of the Post Dispatch, gives total bank deposits of \$3,552,937.43 — a decrease of \$782,837.06 under the total deposits in the bank a year ago. The report published today is as of the close of business June 30, 1949. — The Post Dispatch.

Total deposits in Hereford banks through the first six months of 1949 showed a decrease of \$1,248,924.59 from the December 31, 1948 total of \$7,800,388.32, according to statements released this week by The First National Banks and Hereford State Bank.

Deposits have slumped \$727,956.50 since the April 11 report. The decline only reflects the continuing trend reported at the end of 1948 when deposits were down \$950,000 from the preceding year, which is a nation-wide trend as

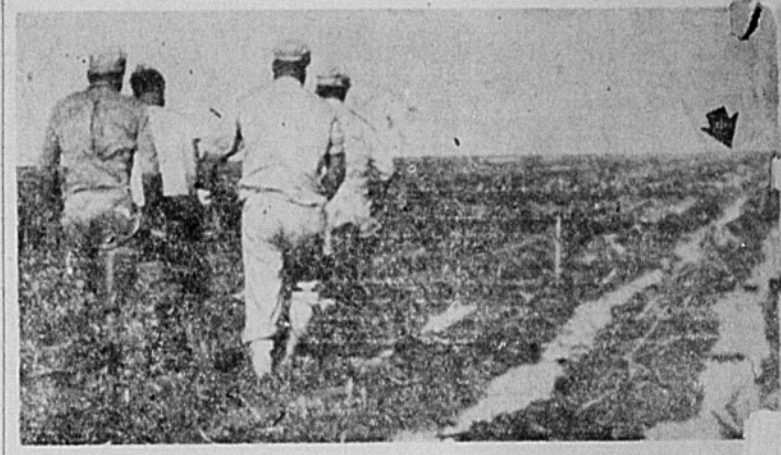

The only thing that has worried me is how such meek little dames develop into such commanding women later on in life and take over the management of so many homes, and what I'd like to know is where the father of the bride is, and whether he ever gets up enough spunk to ask his wife to make him a cold sandwich from the time the groom has consented to get married and the time the wedding takes place.

It is not often I get an opportunity like this and I want to make the most of it.

There is something wrong folks and I'd like for some of the good farmers around here to tell me what it is. It seems to me that after all of the rain we have had this spring and summer that crops are far behind what they should be. Not only is the cotton growing slow but so is everything else. Out in our back yard the peaches on our two anemic peach trees, are about half the size that they usually are at this season of the year and if they ripen at the time of the year this year that they did last, then there is going to be nothing but seed and peeling to them. Our tomato plants are the same size now that they were three weeks ago and look as if they have given up all interest in the future. The grass is turning yellow and some of our most prolific weeds

About once each year along about this time Charley Whalen comes down to the office with a specimen of the things he is specializing on in his yard or garden.

gladioli and he presented them to my wife with a flourish like a Knight at King Arthur's Court, this year he had specialized in strawberries and my wife and I had a real treat. There is a lot of difference between strawberries that are picked green in Arkansas, or Louisiana, and shipped into this part of the country and the kind like Charley raises. The Arkansas kind that look so good are real close kin to a pickle and the kind Charley raises are twin sisters to ambrosia.

There are a lot of things that could be raised in this country if truck growers should take a notion to do it. Sweet corn for the market would grow here just as prolifically with irrigation, as it does in South Texas and in Colorado. I have raised yellow bantam sweet corn in our garden every year for several years and it is just as good as any I have paid a fancy price for in the stores in Colorado or any where else. One seldom finds anything in our food stores here in West Texas except horse corn and while it is a tasty when boiled it cannot compare in flavor and tenderness with the yellow bantam sweet corn.

The caution of the brown trout is developed to a greater degree than it is with most trout and it is a habitual nocturnal feeder.

## Paint Stucco House

Rain, snow, ice and sleet are natural enemies of stucco. In the winter, rain or snow settles in the cracks in the surface, freezes and enlarges the cracks. As this continues, sooner or later bits of the stucco are forced off and the house becomes unsightly. Proper painting with suitable colors and materials keeps the cracks sealed, the rain, snow and sleet out, and gives character to the house at the same time.

Wall feed bins in the poultry house can cut down the work needed to care for the laying flock. A protected opening in the wall permits filling the bin from the outside, and feed can be taken from sliding doors at the bottom of the bin inside.

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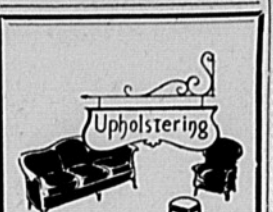

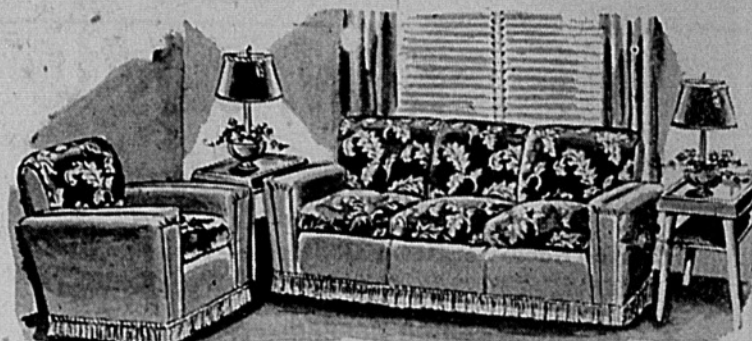

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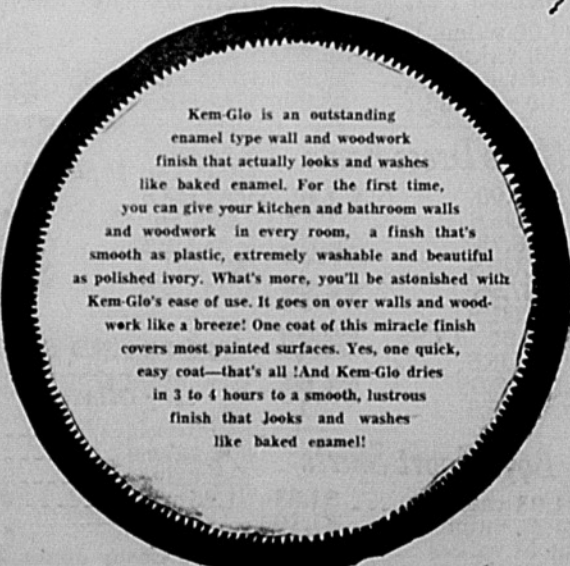

Choc Hutcheson has been assigned to area sports coverage by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal publications. He has been covering sports, and other special happenings, for our neighborhood daily for some time.

We are cheered that prospects of Slaton getting some athletic publicity in the Avalanche are improving. They like so many other businesses, have been short of good sports writer. Choc was down for the Denver City - Lions baseball game rained out last Thursday.

We extend a cordial invitation to him to return any time for baseball, football or marble games. We welcome the chance at getting the town some free publicity. A good athletic setup never hurt the growth of a town yet.

Roy Kahlich keeps the baseball fans talking with his throwing arm. The Wilson boy—an outfielder for the Lions—caught a fly against Levelland, then threw a perfect strike to home plate, with no bounce before it got there—to catch a runner trying to score from third. And he caught the runner by three steps.

Then, while playing third base for Hoyt Furniture's softball team, we watched him turn First Baseman Alton Perry all the way round with a throw the other night. He caught a slow roller about pitcher's box, and had to hurry to throw the runner out. He did it, by one step, but Perry's hand certainly suffered the consequences.

If he had a left arm as strong as his right, he could certainly fly like a bird. (We hear—hint, hint—that he's a good baseball pitcher—if anyone needs one.)

It is only two weeks until the annual Texas High School Coaches association holds its annual school. This year the clinic will be held in Beaumont. Slaton will be represented by Coach Clarence Tillery.

The school features top ranking college coaches who lecture for five days, along with demonstrations on the finer points of football, basketball, baseball and track. The school is climaxed by basketball and football games between last year's high school stars.

This year's school promises more top-quality lectures and action. Carl Snavely of North Carolina will teach high school mentors the higher points of the single wing formation. Don Faurot of Missouri will lecture and demonstrate the

split T formation, of which he is a recognized master.

We wish that West Texas could get a chance, annually, to be host to a school of this type. Over 1,000 Texas coaches attend regularly each year and a school in this section of the country, though not drawing this number, would certainly pull in all of the mentors in this section.

It would also give the fans a chance to see some of the top-flight school-boy stars in action, as well as get an idea of the type of football taught by the nation's leading coaches.

Speaking of football—and the time is nearing that Slaton's grid prospects begin practice—the Tigers will have new dressing quarters this season.

A surplus barracks has been moved onto the grounds just north of the football stadium, and will be remodeled to afford the local eleven a half-time gathering place away from the milling crowd. It will afford Coach Tillery a place to hold half-time lectures, as well as affording dressing space at some time in the future. It will not be ready by August 15 for use as a dressing room, but future plans call for its completion as a full-time dressing room.

Prospects for the immediate future are not too bright for Slaton High's athletic records. The present crop of boys is small—in number and in brawn—but with a little luck the future may hold some successes for the oncoming athletic teams.

The sixth, seventh and eighth grades of last year have a good many boys, and they seem to be fairly adept at all sports. Especially is this true of football and

baseball.

Last fall the junior football team lost but one game, and the younger crop of boys at the Slaton Boys Club this summer seem just as good at softball and baseball as they were on the gridiron.

Last week they went down to Post and beat the Garza County boys in two games. They won the first, for the smaller boys, 19-0 and took the final tilt 19-1.

Coach Clarence Tillery used 33 boys in the two games, part of the number with whom he works daily at the old softball field. If they keep learning, and loving to play as they do now, Slaton's athletic fortunes are due to become a little more enriched.

After this was completed they began another new school building for use by grammar school students. It too, was of the finest construction and contains all the modern conveniences.

Then, just last week, they voted to issue \$130,000 worth of new school bonds. They have traded some building lots down there, and plan to build a new negro school very soon. The bonds just passed will go for "school improvements."

The county commissioners will receive bids soon on a \$100,000 addition to their hospital. A new street lighting system is also being installed at the present.

County road machinery is blading out right-of-way for a paved road to the edge of Dawson county, giving a direct route to Lamesa.

The county plans to call for bids soon on a county library, plus some community buildings. The town is also discussing a bond issue to furnish money for a street paving project.

That is pretty good progress for a town that only had about 800 people in it some four or five years ago. Their high school has no more enrollment than does Slaton.

It would certainly be wonderful to have that much at our disposal. We wonder if we couldn't grow some of those iron "trees" that pump black "sap" out of the ground.
