

Austin, Texas, June 2.—Local au-thorities at Galveston were notified by Governor W. P. Hobby late today that "unless police protection is given and the laws enforced by local authorities insuring free and uninterrupted movement of freight at Galveston" he "will take charge of the situation no later than 9 o'clock Saturday morn-ing, June 5."

"The congestion in the movement of commerce through the port of Gal-veston is preventing the receipt of goods by Texas merchants and threat-ening the outward shipment of Texas crops ready for market," said the governor in the ultimatum. "It has reached proportions affect-ing the business interests and mater-ial welfare of Texas and the property rights of citizens to such an extent.

ial welfare of Texas and the property rights of citizens to such an extent that I feel it my duty to advise you that unless police protection is given and the peace laws of the state en-forced by local authorities, insuring the free and uninterrupted movement of freight and the absolute safety of any and all workeers employed in the loading, unloading, transfer or transportation of same, I shall under the constitution and laws of Texas, assume control.

"If therefore, the present condition continues, I shall deem it necessary to exercise the authority reposed in me by the laws of the state and take tharge of the situation not later than nine o'clock Saturday morning, June



Origin of Names of States. In 1800 on the first of October the Spanish government by the treaty of St. Ildefonso, ceded the territory known as Louisiana to France. The territory had been a Spanish possession for 38 years, originally ceded to Spain by Louis XV. The return of Louisiana to France was effected by Napoleon, who contemplated forming a colonial empire in America. After three years he abandoned the scheme and sold the territory to the United States.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN.

Washington, D. C., June 7.--Warm waves will reach Vancouver, B. C. about June 10, 16, 21, 26 and temper-atures will rise on all the Pacific slope. They will cross crest of Rock-ies by close of June 11, 17, 22, 27, plains section 12, 18, 23, 28; meridian 90, upper great lakes, Ohio-Tennessee and lower Mississippi valleys 13, 19, 24, 29; great lower lakes and eastern sections 14, 20, 25, 30, reaching vi-cinity of Newfoundland about June 15, 21, 26, July 1. Storm waves will follow about one day behind warm waves, cool waves about one day be-hind storm waves. hind storm waves. These disturbances will control crop

weather of this continent from near June 10 to July 1. and the new crop weather conditions that will occur and weather conditions that will occur and determine crop weather and crops of 1920 will be fully inaugurated but is expected to make only gradual changes. One feature is almost sure to manifest during the period June 10 to July 1; a decided change to higher temperatures and before we get through the summer we will be long-ing for cooler weather. This will be general east of Rockies crest but it is almost universally true that long general east of Rockies crest but it is almost universally true that long periods of high temperatures east of Rockies bring correspondingly low temperatures west of the great ridge. Storm forces are expected to be weaker during balance of June than they were for the three weeks pre-vious to June 10 and temperatures are expected to rise from June 10 to July

expected to rise from June 10 to July 1 more than the season suggests. Moisture for balance of this season Moisture for balance of this season will largely come from the northern part of the Atlantic and feed into the lows as they come from the north-west. In turn this condition will call for much warm air from the GGulf of Merice and Carribbean Sea to move Mexico and Carribbean Sea to move northward east of the Rockies and
