

A concession stand has now been set up at Tiger Town under the management of Mrs. Gertrude Donaldson, youth center personnel disclosed this week.

the coming election will be the first in the Democratic election that the new form of ballots will be used.

When the ballots were used in city and county elections, it was demonstrated that many people do not fully understand how to use the new form. The old form of ballot was abandoned after the new ballot law was enacted, making the voting more secret.

At the top right-hand corner of the new ballot is a perforated square with a number written inside it. The same number is written outside the perforated square. Inside the square, are written the words, "Voter's signature to be affixed on reverse side."

The last time the new ballot was used, many people wrote their name across the entire back side of the ballot. All those ballots had to be thrown out. Although it is not very clearly stated on the ballot, your signature is to be written only within the boundaries of the perforated square. This way, your name does not appear on the ballot which is counted by the election tabulators. The square with your name on it is placed in a separate box from the ballot, so no one sees your name connected with your ballot.

Presiding judges for the election will be J. H. Brewer, precinct 26; E. N. Pickens, precinct 27; Chester Williams, precinct 28.

Voting will take place in three precincts. Those who are in precinct 27 will vote at the County Commissioner's office. Those who are in precinct 28 will vote at the Chamber of Commerce. Those who are in precinct 28 will vote at the City Secretary's office.

It is believed that the heaviest voting will be in precinct 28, but precinct 27 will run a close second.

Soon after the June 17 Homecoming celebration, the city began spraying and since then have disposed of numerous contamination points. During the past three or four weeks two fogging machines from Lubbock have been in use here, and one of these machines is expected to continue spraying here within the next week.

The city is using its own fogging machine to spray alleys in taking care of that part of the cleanup drive.

Last year was the worst year for polio in the history of the state, acording to reports. If the present rate of illness reports continues, there will be twice as much polio in the state this year than there was last year.

All Slaton citizens should work toward the goal of making Slaton a sanitary and disease-free community.



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### The Hoarding Has Started . . . .

The Hoarding Has Started . . . .

It is easy enough to stand back on ones hind legs and say that it is not fair to hoard things and to buy items that might become scarce, or exceedingly high, should war come, but there are few people who are not doing so.

Most every one has different ideas as to which items are likely to become scarce and therefore most everything that is not perishable is getting scarce. It is little consolation should real scarcities come, to be without such items and see the folks who hoarded them sitting around enjoying the use of them.

From all accounts there has been a lot of merchandise sold that is evidently going to back closets, attics and basements. Unconfirmed reports are that the sale of sheets has stocks of sheets have been frozen, that black pepper is very scarce and that most all the stocks of electric refrigerators have been exhausted. The sale of sugar has increased considerably although there has not been as much demand for it as some merchants anticipated and coffee is being bought at a very rapid rate and the women are going after nylon hose in a big way.

All of these things seem selfish and hoggish, but the timid person who holds back will get little credit for doing so at a later date. If such things are going to be scarce there should be some way devised to distribute them fairly, but as usual the man who has the ready cash can get things the man without it cannot secure.

It will cause the printing of millions of dollars worth of rationing slips, cards, etc., and make petty rascals out of a lot of merchants and business men who will be slipping things from under the counter to their favorite customers, but such are the things that war and the possibilities of war bring on.

### More Dangerous Than War . . . .

More Dangerous Than War...

If the statistics concerning traffic accidents are any where near correct then the threat of war should not throw much fear into the folks who are so used to driving our highways.

The sad part about the terrible death toll on our highways is the fact that the public accepts the loss with scarcely a second thought as if it were a necessity and should be looked upon like putting dogs to permanent sleep because there are just too many dogs.

Not only is the loss of life appalling but the loss of personal property runs into the billions and makes small impression upon those who are losing their cars and damaging or wrecking the cars of other people.

It is evident, from the fact that most all of the deaths are on the highways outside of city limitations, that the most destructive accidents are caused from speeding and yet there has been a tendency to allow speed limits to be increased as time goes by and even with the higher speed limits few motorists stay within these limits.

Not long ago one woman boasted that she drove from Slaton to Colorado Springs, Colorado, in nine hours. Colorado Springs is nearly nine hundred miles from Slaton, and yet she was not even stopped by a motor cop. A great many people driving through the country drive at 80 miles per hour as a regular cruising speed.

To lay the blame upon the highway patrol would be

To lay the blame upon the highway patrol would be to put it in the wrong place. To enforce any law, the law must be acceptable to the majority of the people and most motorists seem very willnig to risk their lives in order to go above the high speed limits of 60 miles per hour.

While it is not likely that such a thing could be done about the only sensible way to be sure that speed limits would not be violated would be to have manufacturers make cars that would not go over 60 miles per hour.

Some concerns have experimented with putting governors on trucks in order to reduce the consumption of gas and to insure that their vehicles were not driven at destructive speeds but most of the firms found that such controls did not do what they hoped would occur. Drivers objected that the governors stall-their cars at critical times and that they were handicapped. These things were probably true, but it has not been so many years since cars were not geared up to the high speeds that they are capable of today, and folks got along better than they do now so far as accidents are concerned.

The motor problem today is just about as serious as the threat of war in this country nad there is less being done about it than there is to protect the country against the community.

### It Will Cost Money For Slaton To Grow . .

Regardless of what the shortcomings or the obstacles are that face the average community, about the only thing that can be blamed is some form of the Government. The city, the county, the state and national governments get the responsibility of most all of the grievances and their efforts to solve these problems are seldom appreciated, nor are the problems solved to suit anyone including the Governments.

In the first place any efforts that are made by any stage of the organizations that control our living conditions, must, if necessary, be costly and require more taxes in some shape or other and when the complicated way of getting things done has been accomplished those leaders on the Government payrolls get the blame for the taxes, but little credit for overcoming obstacles.

It is no wonder that most officials are wary about attempting many needed improvements in all stages of public accomodations. There are many things that should be done in Slaton, but if done in the immediate future, would require so much money that it would likely almost bankrupt the city government. Most of these improvements should have been made years ago. The longer they are postponed the more the cost will be, and it is probable that if the nation does not get into far flung wars that at least some of the most needed improvements should be attempted soon.

There should not be any doubt in anyones mind that the Public School accomodations for which bonds were voted up on on July 15 should be authorized. In fact the school trustees are probably a little too timid about asking for as much as should be asked for, as the Slaton High School buildings need a great many things done to make them modern.

Not only do our school buildings need attention, but our drainage problem needs attention, the marking of our streets has never been done thoroughly and the city needs better garbage controls and equipment to keep garbage collected, and if the town is to grow as much in the next ten years as it has in the past ten, then the water and sewer systems should be enlarged and extended.

That all of these things could be done in the near latture is most unlikely, but never the less it will be necessary that the most urgent needs be given consideration and when they are met it is going to cost the folks in Slaton more money in taxes.

If eggs are not handled properly, summer temperatures frequently harm their quality. During warm weather, take extra precautions to insure the quality of the eggs you market. Proper handling of eggs can increase your income by a sizeable amount over the period of a few months. An important factor in the care of eggs on the farm is cooling eggs to a safe tempture. Eggs when laid are about the temperture of the hen's body, 104 to 107 F. Because the germ in feritle eggs can grow when the temperture is above approximatel 68 F prompt cooling is essential. Cooling is also important in order to maintain the quality of thick, firm, upstanding yolk that is normal for a freshly laid egg.

Keep Eqqs Clean

Keeping eggs clean and maintaining internal good quality are responsibilities of the farmer, the egg dealer, and other handlers who come in contact with them—but the farmer in particular is in the best position to profit by good care of eggs.

A high percentage of all eggs are clean before they come in contact with the nest. Therefore, one of the best ways to keep eggs clean is to provide good nesting materials. Straw has characteristics which make it one of the best nesting materials, but shavings, oat hulls, sawdust, and excelsior also are excellent for this purpose. Whatever is used in this nest ,keep it clean, dry, and free from molds.

Here are some additional points to remember if you want to market top quality eggs:

For High Grade Eggs—

1. Gather eggs at least three times a day, using ventilated baskets.

2. Don't market dirty eggs. Re-

kets.
