It is probably because the people who know how to grow these things have never tried to do so in West Texas.

The water question in West Texas, and particularly on the South Plains is something that will have to be answered before long, regardless of what happens to the Canadian Dam project. That is likely a local proposition for Amarillo and the North Plains, but Lubbock, Slaton, Post, Tahoka and other towns out here will have the problem to solve and all of these towns are stumbling along unconsciously to a crisis that will cost more, and more the longer it is put off. It will not be long before it becomes a near catastrophe.

EXERCISE HELPS CHICKS DO BETTER

Exercise has an important in-fluence on the growth and deve-lopment of a baby chick, A chick deprived of exercise often does poorly. On the other hand, one giv-en the benefit of range, sunlight, and fresh air is usually in super-ior health. or health.

or health.

There are a number of ways to provide chicks with exercise, but the main way is to keep chicks feeling "active". Then they will provide themselves with exercise. provide themselves with exercise. In doing this, a raiser should pay particular attention to brooder house temperature. By maintaining a room temperature of from 50 degrees to 60 degrees F., and keeping the house well-ventilated, a poultryman can usually keep his chicks busy and on the move.

Running Out-of-Doors

Of course, a poultry raises should not overlook the import-ance of letting his chicks out-of should not overlook the importance of letting his chicks out-ofdoors as soon as possible. In this respect, remember that it is safe for chicks to run out-side from the time they are four or five days old, provided they have a warm hover handy when they feel the need of it. This gives them plenty of exercise and the necessary exposure to the direct rays of the sun, both highly important factors in keeping chicks healthy. In addition, chicks out-of-doors, or on range, can pick their own green food.

In making an outside pen acessible to chicks, remember that chickens are bothered less by wind when the run-way hole is on the protected side of the house. Also keep in mind that the brooder house should face the south for maximum exposure to sunlight (in most locations).

Keep Old and Young Seperated

Keep Old and Young Seperated the brooder house should never be situated so that old and young stock mix on the range, because old stock is usually the principal source of coccidiosis, respiratory disease, worms, and other diseas-es. If this is inconvenient, it is advisable to keep the old hirds advisable to keep the old birds confined, giving the young stock access to the range without the danger of contact with the older

Adding emphasis to the above point is the fact that better liva bility may be expected when chick ens are raised in isolation. Experi farms and colleges bear this out


