
### Strong Tiger Team Hoping For Win To Start Season

The smaller towns should start planning now to make it as pleasant as possible for out of town shoppers as well as for the comfort of the home folks. Land values are not too high at present for providing parking space in the business district and all towns that hope to grow into larger towns should start making preparations.

### There's A Great Day Coming . . . .

Recent rains have benefitted the cotton on the South Plains more than even the most optimistic farmers could hope for, and now the problem of farm help looms as the dark spot on the horizon. Unless the ways of the farmers have changed there will be a wild scramble for workers and the price of cotton pulling will start up and keep going up until the major part of the crop has been gathered.

The farm labor board has issued warnings that pullers will not be as easily secured as in the past, but no answer to the problem is offered. The day of the mechanical cotton puller gets near rand nearer each year and when it comes it will mean that the smaller towns and even the larger ones will be sersiously hurt because the traffic that the farm laborers provide will not be here.
