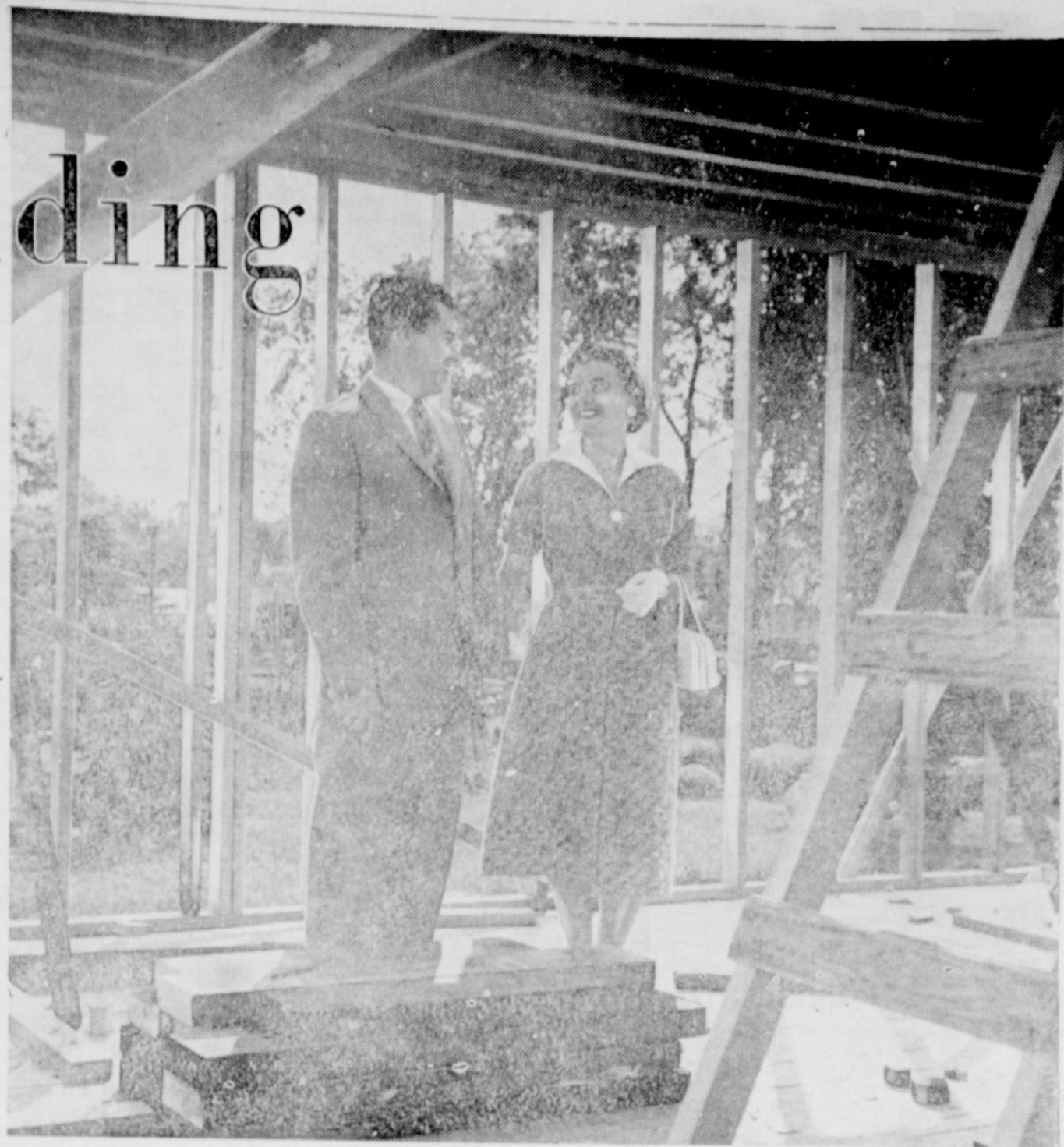






# Building

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## Group Urges Wise Uses Of Plains Water

LUBBOCK.—According to the High Plains Undergr... Water Conservation District, almost every farmer in the southern High Plains who has a well thinking of either irrigating with it or is seriously thinking about the need to water his crops.

Just as in other business enterprises, to make a profit is the motivating goal of farming operations. Economists tell us that many of our farmers have paid about \$10 per acre-foot for the water that is in storage beneath their land. They say further that when we irrigate grain sorghum as a cash crop we can expect to make a little more than \$10 in additional income for each acre-foot of water used over what we could make if we farmed dryland. To begin with, you can readily see that to raise grain sorghum by irrigation is just about a break-even proposition. If an irrigator wastes even a small amount of water, he probably is giving away the little profit that he would have otherwise made.

The trouble with the way most of us think is that we completely disregard the fact that the water in the ground cost us money, or has a definite monetary value. It is not free. We pay good hard-earned cash for it; consequently, when we pump water to the surface and irrigate with it, we have more involved than just operational costs. We also are using up a portion of our capital investment.

The High Plains Water District urges all who are watering, and all who will be watering in the near future, to use the water that is needed but to use it without waste. Water is pumped but not used to produce a crop is costly. Waste indicates a complete disregard for adequate management practices.

We live during a time when almost everyday we see more of our rights as individuals being consumed by governmental decree behind the guise of public welfare. Even so, we in Texas still maintain the right to privately own underground water. Do we like it that way? Once again, the High Plains Water District emphasizes... if we are to continue down the road of private ownership we must minimize waste. Wasteful exploitation of our underground water supply would be playing into the hands of more government control. On the other hand, to use what we need without waste is merely good common sense and conservation. The result of conservation is continued prosperity even for future generations that must look to us for the resources necessary for a more demanding tomorrow.

engaged in private business can not do this. It therefore befalls the lot of the City Secretary to do so for them by their authority.

People who run for public office and want the glory but who don't want to take time to work at the job are not qualified for the office to which elected. Call your City Commissioner about your local problem and 90 chances out of 100 he doesn't know and hasn't read the City ordinances and will therefore have to tell you, "Ask J. J." It puts the Secretary on the spot. Monthly Commissioners meeting will only permit passing on business presented to them. As it is, the City Secretary is in effect expected to run the City business for the Mayor and Commissioners. If it were required that Commissioners spend half a day at the City Hall working at the job probably men well qualified to manage City affairs would not take the job.

It would not, I think, be the solution to have a couple of thousand voters hire a man to run the City's business for the City Commission. The Secretary should rightly be responsible to the Commission for whom he works.

If we do not need or can not afford full or half time salaried Commissioners and Mayor it then seems logical that the voters should hire a man to manage the City subject to their approval.

In effect, J. J. Maxey is now acting as City Manager. Now if J. J. is qualified to the position, let's change the City Charter.

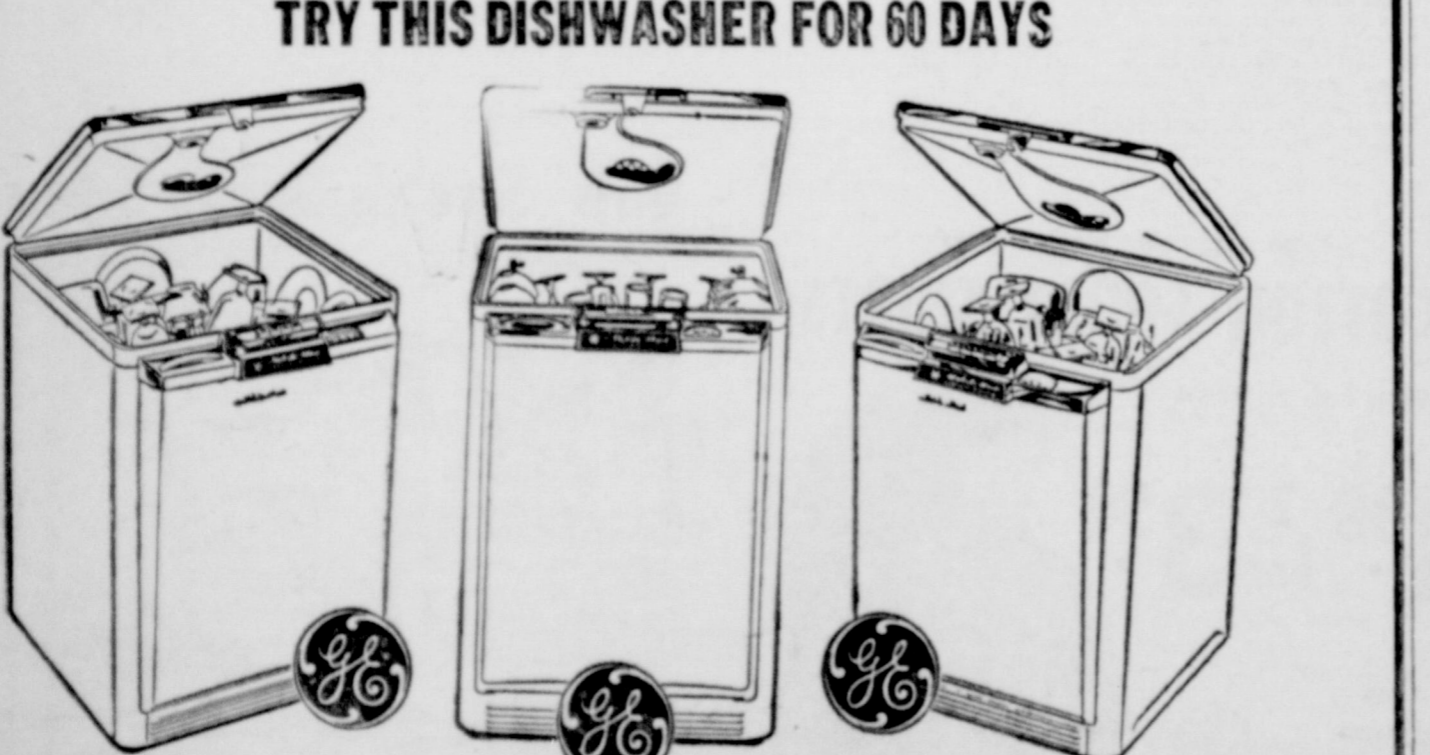

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

No. 4 of Comanche County.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the District may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the District shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations of such subdivisions or municipalities or both, including, but not limited to, the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said revenues less the cost of such improvements, five percent (5%) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the District."

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Comanche to render financial aid to the District by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system of the District (whether assumed or created by the District) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed ten cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the County but without the County Commissioners' consent. If such tax is authorized, the District shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the County in the manner and to the extent heretofore provided for political subdivisions having boundaries co-extensive with the District, and the County shall not thereafter levy any tax (other than heretofore provided for hospital purposes) for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the County."

"(c) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such laws shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District co-extensive with Lamar and Hidalgo Counties, and co-extensive with County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

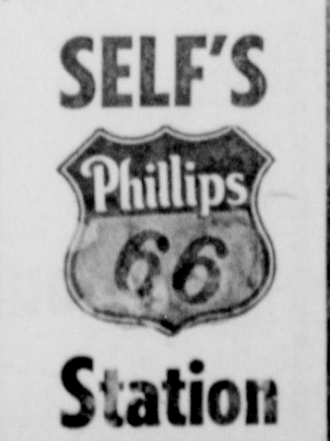

# Crop Production Increase Seen

LUBBOCK—The first estimated production total of the Texas High Plains 1960-61 cotton crop for the 23 member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers' Inc. was announced today as 1,899,000 bales. If produced, such a crop would be the second largest in history ever harvested off the High Plains, being topped only by the more than two million bales harvested in 1958. Production this past year, 1959-60 was 1,869,353 bales.

The estimated production total of 1,899,000 bales is allotments this year of 2,263,393 acres and standing acreage as of Aug. 1, totals approximately 2,175,000 acres.

Condition of the cotton crop as of Aug. 1 was given as good to excellent. Hot, dry summer weather during July enabled the crop to do some "catching up" and most agricultural observers see the crop as perhaps somewhat late this year, but still in good shape. Some dryland cotton is reported to be in the best condition in the past 10 to 20 years. One more shower or rain in late August will insure a good production. Irrigated cotton is again being watered in some areas. Thus far insects have not been too much of a problem. Control measures have kept the situation in check.

Lubbock County's estimated 1960 production is 230,000 bales as compared to 209,790 bales

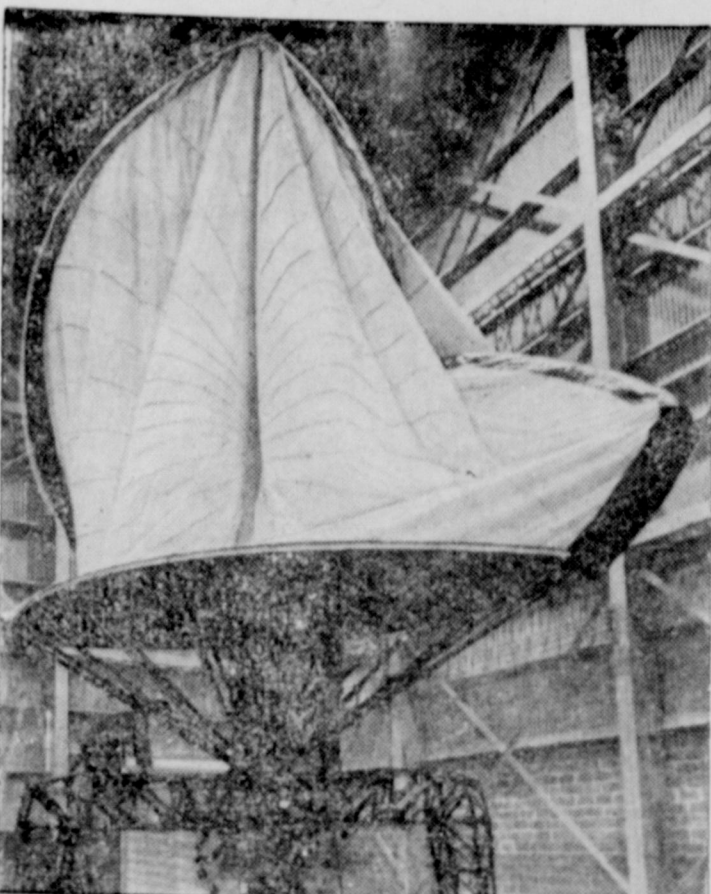

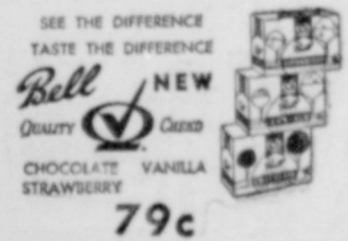

What about serving everybody's favorite, Beef Stroganoff? It is a hearty enough dish to please the hungriest of men but lends itself to informality serving because it can be served in one dish. Pickled beets and sour cream are suitable accompaniments.

To any meal served indoors or out, seasoning is important. A versatile one is Tabasco, a liquid red pepper seasoning. It is particularly good with dishes that combine meat and vegetables in one because flavors are apt to become indistinct and need spark such as Tabasco provides.

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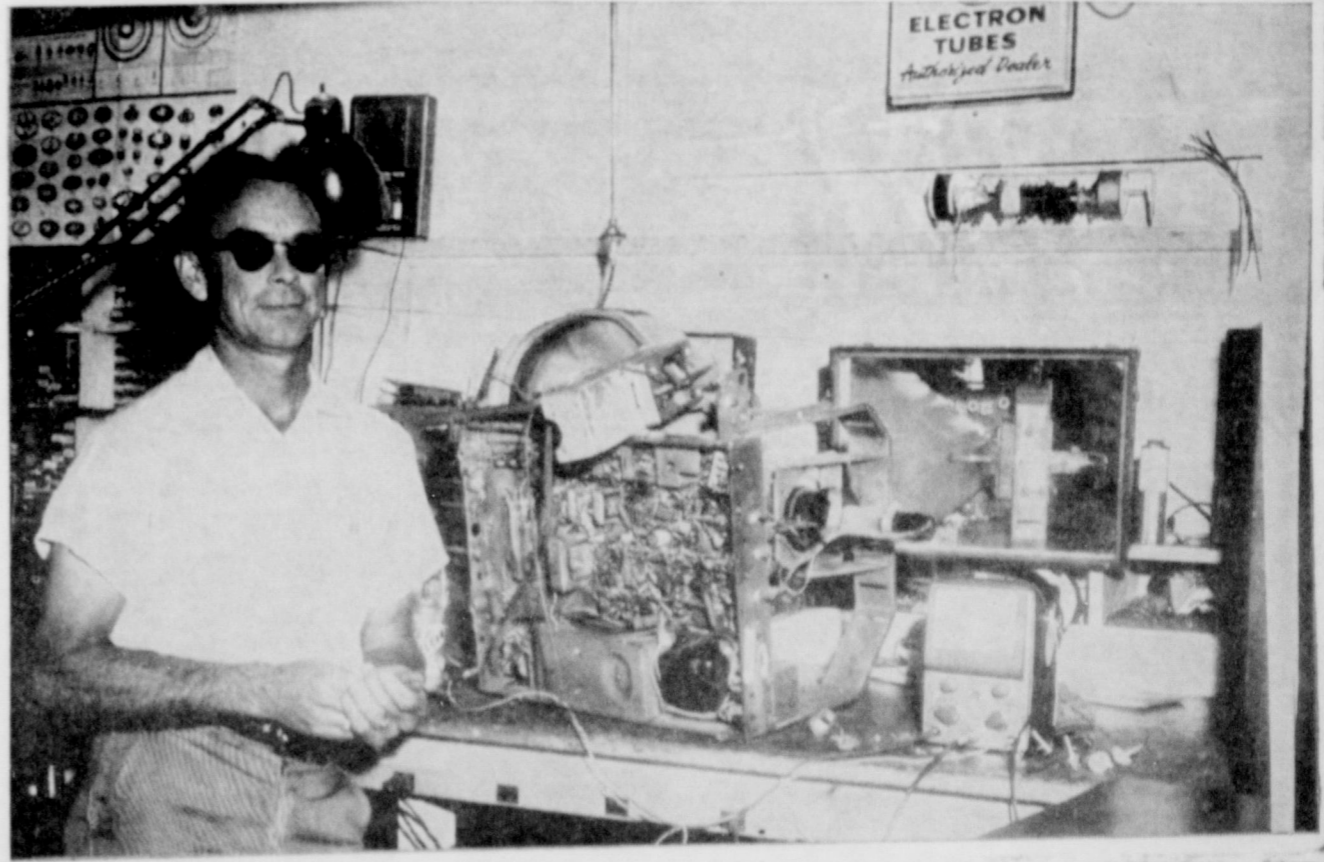
