In hand-sawing, slow strokes at a shallow angle and a soft touch produce smooth edges. Make the cut on the down stroke, disengaging teeth on the upswi Remove any saw marks with a plane, file or sandpaper as you would with natural wood.

When using a hand or table saw, cut with the exposed side

up. With a portable power saw, put the exposed side down so the teeth hit that side first. Don't crowd the saw, or rough edges





IS THERE A FAITH ?

In verse four he laments that some are choosing another God. He confesses that he utterly abandons himself to God and His keeping. In these days we need such a confession, such a faith, such courage. If the Psalmist had such an experience, so can we,

The Psalmist had a vital communion with God which encourages us to have a like experience. He points out that God is the portion of his inheritance. This figure is drawn from the apportionment of land in Canaan among the

twelve tribes, but the Levites had no land. They had God as their portion. While this did not absolve the other tribes from putting God first, it did set the Levites apart. Someone has said, "Whatever else a man has, if he has not Jehovah for his portion, some part of himself will stand stiffly out, dissenting and unsatisfied, and hinder him from saying 'My inheritance is fair to me," " His communion with God brings him counsel. His communion with God causes him to place the Lord always before him. True love always has an intense desire for the presence of its object. Since God is present at my right hand, then I am at his left, as the Psalmist points out. Thus God is close to my working hand and gives me strength. Let us determine to have a vital experience of communion with God in these days,

In verses 9-11 the Psalmist tells about his conviction of immortality. While this scripture is a prophesy of Christ, it also points out that if we have had communion with God here in this life, surely there is a life forever near to God. "Thou will reveal the path to life, to the

full joy of thy presence, to the bliss of being close to thee for ever."



Texas: Likely the biggest news in Texas griculture during September was hurricane arla which hit the Texas Coastal area on tember 10, causing hundreds of millions dollars damage and among other things stroying or severely damaging over half of the Texas and Louisiana rice crop, and in estimated 65 thousand hales of cotton. on estimated 65 thousand bales of cotton. Oh the other hand, the rains which accombined this storm benefited winter wheat, and other fall planted crops. In most cases sorghums and corn had already been harvested prior to the heavy rains which accompanied the more severe portion of the storm, but nearly two-thirds of the cotton in affected areas was still in the field. Pickng of cotton and combining of sorghums is underway in the earlier fields on the High Plains with excellent yields in prospect. Picking of cantaloupes is nearing completion

Proper Ration Essential In Calf Feeding

Drylot feeding of calves weighing from 250 to 400 pounds requires a much beter understanding of feeding principles than does the feeding of heavier ones. It takes a better ration to achieve the desired results in interest slackened. the lighter animals because they do not have their mother's milk to balance their diet.

In the first place, their stomachs will not hold as much as those of heavier calves so the small amount of feed they do consume must contain enough nutrients to satisfy their needs. explains U. D. Thompson, extension animal husbandman. Due to their small size, they have a small storage capacity for even those nutrients which they can hold in reserve in their bodies.

As an example of this storage capacity, consider vitamin A. If cattle have an adequate supply of this vitamin, they store the excess in their body fat and livers. As long as they have access to green grazing they get their vitamin A. When no green grazing is available, they use their stored supply to satisfy their needs. Here is where a calf's needs are taken care of by milk. When this calf is weaned and placed on drylot, he must be supplied these nutrients in his ration. In 250-400 pound calves vitamin A deficiency can develop within 45 to 60 days unless the ration takes care of his needs.

Either leafy green alfalfa hay, alfalfa leaf meal or pellets are good sources of vitamin A, says Thompson. Calves nearly always do better on rations which contain alfalfa than on those which do not, he continues, Also, commercial synthetic vitamin A preparations are now available for mixing in rations. These may be used if good alfalfa is unavailable or expensive.


