JP, County Clerk Races Highlight Local Election

The Democratic and Republican Party Primary Election will be held Tuesday, March 13. Sample ballots appear in this week's paper for your convenience.

Locally Max Wade and Donna Burton are both vying for the position of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 5, Place 1. Nila Burgin and Dena Lambert are running unopposed for Precinct Chairman for their respective parties.

Groom voters will also vote for their choice in the

race for District and County Clerk. Sue Persons, incumbent and Mary Nell Franklin are both seeking this position.

Peggy Butler has filed for re-election as County Treasurer and Jay R. Roselius is seeking re-election as County Judge. Both candidates will appear on the Democratic ballot unopposed.

Texas voters will also decide which candidates will represent their chosen party for the United State Senate,

U. S. House of Representative, Governor of Texas, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and many other key figures in State Government.

In the Democratic primary for Governor, voters will choose from seven candidates; Ann W. Richards, Jim Mattox, Stanley Adams, Mark White, Earl Holmes, Ray Rachel and Theresa Hearn-Haynes. In the Republican Primary, voters will also choose from seven candidates; W. M. Otwell,

Clayton Williams, Royce X. Owens, Kent Hance, Jack Rains, Ed Cude and Tom Luce.

Other local races of interest is for U.S. House of Representative, 13th District where the winner of Dick Waterfield and Bob Price will face Bill Sarpalius.

Voters are allowed to vote in only one primary on March 13. The winners of the primaries will face off in the general election in November.

Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and will close at 7:00 p.m. The Democratic Primary will be held at the St. Mary's Catholic School and following the close of the

polls the Democratic Convention will be held from 7:15 to 7:30. The Republican Primary will be held at the Groom Community Center. The Republican will hold their convention from

7:15 to 7:30 following the closing of the polls. All voters are urged to get out and vote and attend the convention of your chosen party.

The Texas Legislature checked in this week to begin work on public school finance. Already, thirty-two bills have been filed relating to education. The public education committee will be hard at work for the first couple of weeks trying to come up with a bill.

The Governor's Task Force on Education made their final recommendations and this will be what we start from. I doubt we will see anything substantial until after the March 13th primary.

The Texas Education Agency has come up with the figures for each school district using the Task Force

plan. We have the printout in our Austin office and would be glad to relay some of the figures to any interested parties. The Task Force model makes two assumptions: that local districts will increase taxes to maximize state aid, and the model does not take into account future increases in student enrollment. The Task Force members agree that their plan satisfies court rulings and that it will produce equity over time.

Again, I would appreciate any comments or questions. I will try to keep the district informed as the special session develops.
