Education Finance Bill Passed
State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday released an analysis of the education finance bill passed by the finance bill passed by the funding between the state's richest and poorest school districts.

This bill will not solve all the problems of Texas' schools," Bullock said in the July issue of Fiscal Notes. "We don't know yet whether it will fully satisfy whether it will fully satisfy the courts. But it's a longawaited st
Senate Bill 1, the 1990 Education Finance the 1990 designed to establish funddesigned to in public funding equity in public education within a five-year phase-in period. SB 1 provides for sufficient that both poor and wealthy that both poor and wealthy
school districts have school districts have
substantially the same substantially the same
ability to raise the same ability to raise the same amount of revenue per pupil at the same tax rate, Bullock
said. said.

The Legislature has appropriated $\$ 528$ million in new state spending to pay for education reforms in fiscal 1991. Bullock said that total new spending in 1992 93 will increase to an estimated $\$ 1.4$ billion and will total at least $\$ 4.2$ billion over the five years of the phase-in.
Under the bill's plan, each school district will have access to an average of $\mathbf{\$ 3 , 8 1 1}$ per student in 1991. This average will rise to $\$ 4.009$ hy 1925 ,ne comis are they seom trivial , Bomared
