and opponent Earl Griffin have faced off in true political form.
"We're running on our merits," stated Sims.
After serving 15 months of an unexpired term, Sims faces a backlog of cases left over from the terms of Jim Shelton and David McCoy, now district judge, some of which were 5 and 6 years old. Sims has cleared the docket of 199 cases. 69 defendants were sent to the penitentiary and 130 were placed on probation.
Griffin contends that Sims has dismissed $39 \%$ of the cases in one part of the district, Childress County. Having tried 20 to 30 felony Having tried 20 to 30 felony cases in his 20 year career
as a criminal defense
attorney, Griffin fcels that the district needs a more aggressive prosecutor. "The percentage dismissals percentage of dismissals weve had is totally inappropriate and out of line.
Sims said he has prosecuted more the 70 felony cases -including capital murder cases - in his 10 years as a prosecutor. He was the first-assistant prosecutor in the 47th district attorney's office in Amarillo for three years.
"I didn't get to that position by being a bad prosecutor," he said.

Elevator In Combine
Submitted by Al Homer The change-over to modern farm machinery brought out a new version of mechanization at a local grain elevator Wednesda afternoon of last week Massey-Harris self prop. Massey-Harris self-propelled combine, lumbered up on the scales and was weighed in at the Wheeler-Evans Grain Co. The combine then made its way to the west side of the over-flowing grain elevator and the grain was dumped on the pile of wheat at the side of the building. The combine wa returned to the scales and weighed out.

According to Ralph Evans, manager of the elevator, this was the firs time in his experience that grain had been delivered directly from the field to the elevator in a self-propelled combine.
The combine, owned by Al Homer, custom harvester, was driven by Joe Homer accompanied by Greg Neumier and Bob Killian, and harvested the load of wheat on the S.K. Roach farm six miles northeast of Groom. The combine holds about 50 bushels of grain, but was not full. it was the final cutting on the wheat field.

and Violent Crimes Task and Violent Crimes Task
Force. Carson County Sheriff Loren Brand and the sheriffs of Donley, Childress, Collingsworth and Hall counties signed contracts with Chief Deputy U.S. Marshal Albert Arias at the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon to secure this agreement.
Administrators of the departments will assign specific officers to the Tack Force and those officers assigned will become sworn as Special Deputy United States Marshals during the ir assignment to the Task Force. Each participating agency will identify thace outstanding felony warran's
which the Task Force will target. Each agency may submit requests for assistance to locate or apprehend fugitives and in turn, the U.S. Marshals Office may. Marshals assistance may request subject who in locating a subject who may be in one of our local jurisdictions.
Sheriff Brand will be on the Steering Committee for the Task Force and will be involved in the policy, program involvement and direction of the effort "This is a great opportunity for our department and one that we intend to take advantage of. The more cooperation you have between federal, state and county agencies, the less chance the bad guys have of getting away," said Sheriff Brand.
"We see an increasing number of dangerous fugitives each year and

Our with the Task Force gines with the Task Force gives us extra manpower and equipment when we need it for fugitive investigation and we can supply them with the street knowledge that comes from working and living in our jurisdictions, added Brand.

The intent of this joint effort will be to remove from society these federal, state and local fugitives with violent and or drug histories and identified as career criminals, thereby increasing public safeiy. The policy, program and The policy, program and direction of the Task Force
shall be the joint responsibility of the participating agencies. Effective the first day of operation, the term of this understanding shall be for a one year period or shall be terminated by a majority vote of the Steering Committee. At the end of the one year period depending on the success and member sency support, the Task Force support, the Task Force may be continued based upon a renegotiated memorandum of understanding.

Deputy Jim Scott of the Gray County Sheriff's Department has been visiting McLean Elementary on Thursdays to present the D.A.R.E. program to Mrs. Close's fifth grade class.
D.A.R.E. is an acronym for Drug Abuse Resistance Education. It teaches our children that popularity can be found in positive behavior without abandoning values, and that self-confidence and self self-conidence from resisting worth comes from resistin destructive temptations.
The program was created in 1983 in Los Angeles to teach children not only that

Accelerated Reader Program Implemented
The Accelerated Reader Program is an innovative way to encourage students to read. The students will be visiting the library and selecting books from the Accelerated Reader book list. The titles range in reading level from first grade through seventh grade. Plus, there are many high/low selections for hesitant and remedial readers.
Students take a computerized test after reading the book. The five, ten or twenty multiplechoice test is carefully designed to verify that the student has read the book. With the test completed, the computer instantly reveals how many questions he or she answered correctly, and awards reading points based on the book's length, reading level, and number eading level, and number of correct answers. If the student passes the test, the librarian can be assured he/she has really read the book.

ational effort to highlight rural development programs, the National Association of Community Action Agencies (NACAA) the Agencies Association of National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Research Foundation, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently recognized the Families in Training program for its outstanding contributions to rural Texas.

The key to successful
employment is education. However, for low-income families, and especially single parents, it is difficult to manage the roles of parent, caretaker, wage earner and student. In addition, many of those in such households must also struggle to overcome the burdens of broken homes, poverty and abuse.

The Families in Training program focuses on providing rental assistance, prose management and other

services to low-income are AFDC recipients. persons who are pursuing Upon eligibility persons who are pursuing determination, each post-secondary education. The program provides financial assistance, emotional support and information to assist families in healing the scars of broken homes, poverty, and in many cases, abuse. Applicants for the FIT Applicants for the FIT program must be eligible for rental assistance, be a parent of dependent child(ren) and be attending or preparing to attend college or post secondary vocational education.
Ninety percent of the program participants are female, single heads of households. Seventy percent of the participants
applicant must go through an intensive assessment process to be accepted into the program. This process includes completion of an extensive application before being interviewed by a "Community Task Force." This task force is comprised of community leaders and representatives from resource agencies, and is responsible for determining admission to the Families in Training program.

Participants receive individual career counseling, personal development seminars, support from other Panhandle Community


Services resources such as energy and transportation assistance, emergency food, information and referral, information rental assistance until their training is completed. In return, participants must maintain grade point averages of "B" or better and participate in the case management provided by FIT Participants may remain in the program for two years, or until their education is completed if all program requirements are met.
