Incumbent Randall Sims

merits," stated Sims. After serving 15 months of an unexpired term, Sims faces a backlog of cases left over from the terms of Jim Shelton and David McCoy, now district judge, some of which were 5 and 6 years old. Sims has cleared the docket of 199 cases. 69 defendants were sent to the penitentiary and 130 were placed on probation.

Griffin contends that Sims has dismissed 39% of the cases in one part of the district, Childress County. Having tried 20 to 30 felony as a criminal defense

and opponent Earl Griffin attorney, Griffin feels that District their moneys worth the district needs a more aggressive prosecutor.

"The percentage of dismissals we've had is totally inappropriate and out

Sims said he has prosecuted more the 70 felony cases -including capital murder cases - in his 10 years as a prosecutor. He was the first-assistant prosecutor in the 47th district attorney's office in Amarillo for three years.

"I didn't get to that position by being a bad prosecutor," he said.

Sims questions Griffins intent to maintain his cases in his 20 year career private practice as well as give the voters of the 100th as a district attorney.

" I can see where having a private practice could cause a real conflict of interest at times." stated Sims. "The voters will make their decision. They can have an experienced fulltime prosecutor or someone who has been a defense attorney all their lives."

"My first priority will be district attorney," stated Griffin, " If that means 110% of my time, then that's what I will give."

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

According to Ralph Evans, manager of the elevator, this was the first time in his experience that grain had been delivered directly from the field to the elevator in a self-propelled combine.



Carson County Sheriff Dept. Joins Task Force

On March 1, the Carson County Sheriff's Department joined forces with the United States Marshals Service - Amarillo Division and became part of the Texas Panhandle Fugitive and Violent Crimes Task Carson County Sheriff Loren Brand and the sheriffs of Donley, Childress, Collingsworth and Hall counties signed contracts with Chief Deputy U.S. Marshal Albert Arias at the Donley County Courthouse in Clarendon to secure this agreement.

Administrators of the departments will assign specific officers to the Task Force and those officers assigned will become sworn as Special Deputy United States Marshals during their assignment to the Task Force. Each participating agency will identify those outstanding felony warran's

which the Task Force will target. Each agency may submit requests for assistance to locate and apprehend fugitives and, in turn, the U.S. Marshals Office may request assistance in locating a subject who may be in one of our local jurisdictions.

Sheriff Brand will be on the Steering Committee for the Task Force and will be involved in the policy, program involvement and direction of the effort. "This is a great opportunity for our department and one that we intend to take advantage of. The more cooperation you have between federal, state and county agencies, the less chance the bad guys have of getting away," said Sheriff Brand.

"We see an increasing number of dangerous fugitives each year and it

would be very naive of us to think that we can take care of all these problems by ourselves. Our contact with the Task Force gives us extra manpower and equipment when we need it for fugitive investigation and we can supply them with the street knowledge that comes from working and living in our jurisdictions, added Brand.

The primary mission of the Task Force is to seek out those persons who have unexecuted state or federal warrants lodged against them. The intent of this joint effort will be to remove from society these federal, state and local fugitives with violent and or drug histories and identified as career criminals, thereby increasing public safety. The policy, program and direction of the Task Force

shall be the joint responsibility of the participating agencies. Effective the first day of operation, the term of this understanding shall be for a one year period or shall be terminated by a majority vote of the Steering Committee. At the end of the one year period, depending on the success and member agency support, the Task Force may be continued based upon a renegotiated memorandum of understanding.

Mission Statement Of The Texas Panhandle Fugitive And Violent Crimes Task Force

The Carson County Sheriff's Department sponsored a law enforcement officer's training seminar on Stress Awareness and Reduction for Peace Officers Saturday

at the War Memorial Building in Panhandle. The classes were taught by Sheriff Loren Brand and Rick Nichols, M.Ed. of High Plains Health Care Systems. Officers attending the class were from the Carson County Sheriff's Office, Hutchinson County Sheriff's Office, Gray County Sheriff's Office, Tulia Police Department and the Skellytown City Marshal. The classes are accredited through the Amarillo College Law Enforcement Academy and attending officers earn educational credits for their Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education certifications.

SPS brings in a mobile transformer to provide power to the McLean-Alanreed area while maintenance is being performed on the existing sub-station transformer.

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



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

Accelerated Reader Program Implemented

The Accelerated Reader Program is an innovative way to encourage students to read. The students will be visiting the library and selecting books from the Accelerated Reader book list. The titles range in reading level from first grade through seventh grade. Plus, there are many high/low selections for hesitant and remedial readers.

Students take a computerized test after reading the book. The five, ten or twenty multiplechoice test is carefully designed to verify that the student has read the book. With the test completed, the computer instantly reveals how many questions he or she answered correctly, and awards reading points based on the book's length, reading level, and number of correct answers. If the student passes the test, the librarian can be assured he/she has really read the

Accelerated Reader is a highly motivational tool when used with incentives to encourage students to read.

There will be prizes for the students when they reach certain point levels.

The Accelerated Reader books are labeled by

reading level, and the number of points that each book provides. The more books the students read the more points they earn.

The prizes will be displayed in the hall of the Elementary School and they will be labeled with the number of points the students will need to earn, in order to choose the prize.

This program is designed for independent readers and since most children are not reading independently until the second semester of first grade, the Accelerated Reader will be used during story time in the library with kindergarten and first grade. As students are identified to be reading independently, they will advance to the next level.

The Library Coordinator, the Computer Lab Coordinator and the teachers will monitor the progress of each student by analyzing the report that is printed out following each test. Each student will be assisted in finding his/her correct reading level to make sure he/she is scoring appropriately on that level.

Several area schools have been using Accelerated Reader for years and have had great success with the program. The facts that their test scores have come up significantly

a part of a joint sational effort to highlight rural development programs, the National Association of Community Action Agencies (NACAA), the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Research Foundation, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently recognized the Families in Training program for its outstanding contributions to rural Texas.

The key to successful

employment is education. However, for low-income families, and especially single parents, it is difficult to manage the roles of parent, caretaker, wage earner and student. In addition, many of those in such households must also struggle to overcome the burdens of broken homes, poverty and abuse.

The Families in Training program focuses on providing rental assistance, case management and other

services to low-income persons who are pursuing post-secondary education. provides The program financial assistance, emotional support and information to assist families in healing the scars of broken homes, poverty, and in many cases, abuse. Applicants for the FIT program must be eligible for rental assistance, be a parent of dependent child(ren) and be attending or preparing to attend college or post secondary vocational education.

Ninety percent of the program participants are female, single heads of households. Seventy percent of the participants

Upon eligibility determination, each applicant must go through an intensive assessment process to be accepted into the program. This process

includes completion of an extensive application before being interviewed by a "Community Task Force." This task force is comprised of community leaders and representatives from resource agencies, and is responsible for determining admission to the Families in Training program.

Participants receive individual career counseling, personal development seminars, support from other Panhandle Community

Services resources such as energy and transportation assistance, emergency food, information and referral, and rental assistance until their training is completed. In return, participants must maintain grade point averages of "B" or better and participate in the case management provided by Participants may remain in the program for two years, or until their education is completed if all program requirements are

Copeland Offers Experience, Dedication And Honesty

Veteran law enforcement officer Don Copeland, a Republican, believes a change is needed in the Gray County Sheriff's Office and says he is the person to make that

Copelan 1 has 31 years in law enforcement experience. He retired in August 1995 as a state trooper for Texas.

He holds the distinction of a master's certificate with Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE). Of 57,107 total peace officers in the state of Texas, only 3,318 have earned a master certificate with TCLEOSE.

Copeland has accumulated 2061 hours of TCLEOSE training hours which includes courses in Penal Code, Code of Criminal Procedure, Rules of Criminal Evidence, Vernon Civil Statute, United States Constitution, Texas State Constitution, and many other fields of law enforcement training. "With the amount of training and the continuous years of service I am certainty qualified for the responsibilities of the Office of Sheriff," Copeland said.

Copeland, who opposes incumbent Sheriff Randy Stubblefield in the March primary, says he can provide better management of the present sheriff's office.

*Excluding the nine people not rehired there have been 45 personnel turnovers under the current administration, which is during the last three years," Copeland said.

*Of those 45 turnover, 12 people were fired and 33 quit. 'Is that good management?' Copeland asks. That will be your decision (in the election)." Copeland said the facts of the turnovers are public record at the Gray County

Courthouse, available to anyone. Another area of questionable management is the number of comp time hours which have been accumulated. These records are also available for public inspection at the

*The total comp time hours remaining on the books as of February 29, 1996, are 3980.40 hours, which equals \$37,383.31 total liability to the Gray County citizens and taxpayers, Copeland said.

In the year 1995, 2996.90 hours have been carried over for \$28,274.88 worth of liability and in the first two months of 1996 there have been 983.50 hours that are still on the books totaling \$9,108.43 in liability for citizens and taxpayers of Gray County. Copeland, with his vast knowledge of law enforcement, says he is qualified to deal more effectively with managing the Gray County Sheriff's Office, which would save the

taxpayers money. Copeland cited his qualities of experience, dedication and honesty as being reasons that he is well qualified for the office of Gray County Sheriff. Copeland also stated

that if elected, he will assume full responsibility for his actions as Sheriff. He was born in 1938 in Shamrock. He graduated from Shamrock High School and gan his career with the Shamrock Police Department in 1963 and went to the Theeler County Sheriff's Department in 1966. In July 1967 he became a Texas State Tooper with the Texas Department of Public Safety. Upon successful completion of



the DPS recruit school, he was stationed at Wichita Falls with the Texas Highway Patrol. During his career with the Texas Highway Patrol he also was stationed in Electra, Shamrock and Pampa. He possesses a special Texas Ranger Commission as an honorably retired member of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"If elected, I am going to take an aggressive stance on narcotic enforcement," Copeland said.

"I also want to expand drug awareness programs to all areas of Gray County for youth and civic organizations.

"I do believe the secret to stopping narcotics trafficking is the law of supply and demand. And as long as there is no demand, there won't be a supply. I think we need to do this through education."

In working with other law enforcement agencies, Copeland said he intends to create a spirit of cooperation with all of the agencies which will enhance the effectiveness of enforcement in criminal activities.

"I want to increase the efficiency of the department by utilizing all of the available resources," he states.

"It is my desire, if elected Sheriff, to provide the citizens of Gray County with fair, swift, and equal law enforcement services, enabling you to have the confidence in the officers who serve you."

Copeland has been married to his wife, Marilyn, for 38 years. They have been residents of Gray County since 1980. He has three children, Randy, Suzann and Ed. Randy is stationed in San Diego, California, in the U.S. Navy. Randy and his wife, Monique, have four children. Suzann is a homemaker and lives in Bristow, Oklahoma, with her husband Craig Shaull and their four children. Ed is an eligibility specialist with the Texas Department of Human Services. He lives in Pampa, with his wife, Amanda, and their two children.
