Groom FFA Chapter Advance To Area Competition

Future Farmers of America, Groom Chapter, traveled to Clarendon College Saturday, November 3, for contest at the District level. Sixteen teams participated from schools of all sizes. Mr. Buck Burk, F.F.A. sponsor and Ag. Teacher also attended.

Of the four event entered, Groom placed second in two categories and third in two categories. First and second place winners will go on to compete in the Area Contest on November 17, again at Clarendon College. Area winners will then move on to state competition.

Chy Phillips placed second in the Creed Speaking Contest. A Tascosa High School Student placed first, Boys Ranch placed third and Randall High was fourth. Chy is a freshman and a Green Hand Member of FFA.

Also placing second was the Senior Chapter Conducting Team. This team was made up entirely of sophomores, which is a bit unusual. Canyon placed first, with Boys Ranch coming in behind Groom. The team was made up as follows; President-Matt Fields, Vice President-Shannon Miller, Rhett Patterson, Treasurer-John Weinheimer, Report-Scott Brown, Sentinal-Paul McLaughlin and Junior Advisor-Todd Cockerell.

The task of the team is to hold a correct business meeting using the proper parliamentary procedure with issuance of a particular problem that comes from the judges.

The Quiz team placed third in over all competition, with Wes Hall's test score being highest in the entire contest. The team was only nine points from the first place team. Fourth place behind Groom was some thirty points lower. Dumas was first, followed by Panhandle in second, Groom third, Randall High in fourth and Tascosa in fifth. Other members of the team were Ronnie Jenkins, Joe Rae Richardson and Bronte Britten.

The Radio Broadcast team also placed third. This team had to research, write and present a radio broadcast that lasted from eight to ten minutes on an agriculture See FFA, Page 5

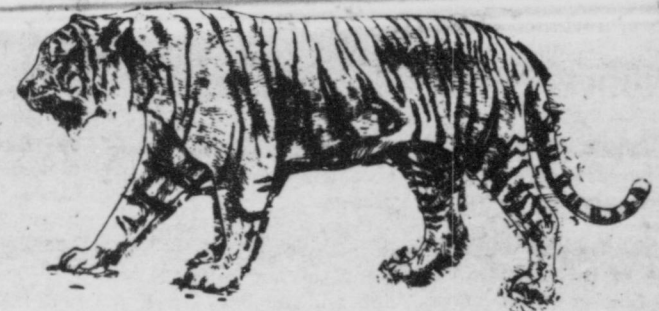



Avionics Repair

In the Saudi Arabian Desert--Sgt. John S. O'Brien stepped out of his air-conditioned van and down a few stairs to the dusty desert floor. He took two quick lefts, ducked low, and disappeared into a "Spanky and Our Gang" kind of plywood clubhouse with a drab canvas door.

"Welcome to the 'Keller Club'," said O'Brien, taking off on the German celler clubs popular around his home base at Wiesbaden.

"Watch your head," he said, barely missing a single bare bulb dangling from a low ceiling. The ceiling is actually the floor of his helicopter electronics equipment repair van. O'Brien built a room under the van so he could be close to work. He used to live in a large,

more spacious--but not necessarily more comfortable--building two miles.

He cots onto one of two army cots on a plywood floor.

As non-commissioned officer in charge of the electronic countermeasures equipment repair section for the 3rd Corps Support Command's 8-158 Aviation Regiment, O'Brien has been hustling during Operation Desert Shield.

"When my soldiers ask when they're getting off, I say 'When we're done,'" O'Brien said over the drone of nearby generators that never sleep. "I manage to get some sleep. . . actually got five hours the other night."

O'Brien who is in the all-day, all-night business of certifying and repairing ECM equipment, stuff that keeps helicopters from being detected or shot down.

There's always a rush to get a quick fix on transponders, little boxes that tell air defense people whether a helicopter is friend or foe.

"Even if there's nothing wrong, some pilots must want to know their equipment is working right," O'Brien said. "It's a matter

of survival, you know."

The ECM repairmen bench-test, trouble-shoot or repair other special electronics equipment like radar jammers which help deceive enemy aircraft and missiles, and night vision goggles which are electronic "eyes" helicopter pilots strap to their helmets at night.

"We don't care who brings 'em in; we'll fix 'em'" O'Brien said.

Like other electronics maintenance shops run by the 8-158th's Avionics platoon, the ECM shop is in an air-conditioned trailer.

"Most of the test equipment and computers require air conditioning," said WO3 Raymond Horn, 42, from McLean, Texas.

Horn, a Vietnam veteran, supervises a seven-section avionics equipment repair platoon which includes ECM, commo, navigation, radar, battery, and automated test equipment repair. The platoon also has an electric shop and a production control and supply section.

"We can pretty well do it all," said Horn. "So far, we've been into a little of everything."

Horn said there are no particular maintenance trends yet and that the workload, even in this intense training environment, hasn't changed that much compared to the unit's mission in Germany.

"It's pretty much business as usual," he said. "The equipment is a little dustier than in Germany, but I haven't seen anything out of the ordinary."

Horn said a few problems he's seen are one's he saw in Vietnam, but for different reasons.

"In Vietnam, it was because of moisture, mildew and dampness," he said. "Here, it's because of sand."

"we're doing the same basic job," Horn continued, "but we're doing it cleaner. It takes more preventive maintenance here."

If sand damages avionics

equipment. Horn's platoon can repair or replace it on any helicopter deployed here.

"We can fix almost any black box," said Sgt. 1st Class Joseph Pocher, shop foreman for the production control and supply section. "If we can't fix it, we'll get it to the right people."

Horn said soldiers are "taking it real well."

"There's alot more awareness. Everybody's just more aware and there's a sense of urgency," he said.

Soldiers are more wary of strangers in the area because the potential to get shot is real, Horn said.

Security is tight and everyone is alert for terrorist or commando attacks.

"The potential to get shot at is here," Horn said. "and everyone realizes why we're here. The soldiers take it seriously. There's alot more

awareness, and nobody shuts down at 4 p.m."

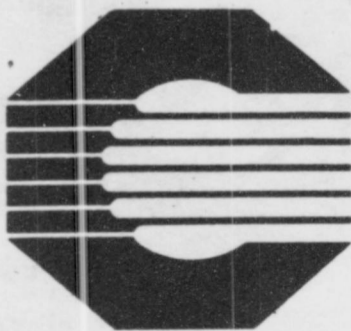
