"Repent" in its various forms occurs 73 times in the New American Standard translation. Two Hebrew words are translated "repent." One word emphasizes the emotions of repentance and the other emphasizes the actions of repentance. The Greek word, "metanoia" emphasizes both the emotions and actions of repentance. Repentance is a changed mind leading to a

Repentance is more than just feeling sorry for one's wrongdoing. It was decided to approve fee adjustments determined by the state legislature for county and district court costs.

Adjustments include increases of \$5 for marriage licenses, and court case increases of \$15 for law library, \$10 for records management, and \$1 for judicial and court personnel training. The court discussed the proposal of rescinding the

The court discussed the proposal of rescinding the recent 3% pay raise for the county judge, because of a judicial salary supplement that the legislature made mandatory this past session. The increase is funded by additional fees that were assessed to county civil, probate and criminal cases. These include \$40 additions to probate and civil and \$15 to criminal cases. The motion carried unanimously to rescind the 3% increase.

A hearing was held on the 1999-2000 proposed budget. The court agreed to changes that included salary adjustments of road hands Danny Farrell and Dennis Vaughn. Farrell will be moved from a 16D to a 17D salary and Vaughn will be moved from a 19A to 20A effective October 1, 1999. The motion unanimously passed to accept the salary changes.

The court discussed budgeted items for fire contracts with the cities. A quarterly pay schedule with the entities will be considered at a later date. The 1999-2000 budget




