Doyle Lee inquired as to why the garbage rate for a business was higher than residence rate and had the same smount of pick ups as the residences. The Mayor explained that it was because a business
generally generates more rash than residences so therefore the rate is higher.
Mary Basham, Executive Director of the Housing Authority asked the council to appoint Butch-Kirkland as the resident board member of the Housing Authority. All voted in favor, except for Ray Kirkland who abstained from voting.
Ginger Haynes, secretary for the EDC, asked the council to appoint Pam Skipper as a board member to the EDC. All voted in favor to appoint Pam Skipper as a board member.
Fred Smith brought up the fact that several new sprinkler systems had been installed in town and they have been using a lot of water, but that what concerned him was that there was a lot of the water being wasted and running down the streets for long periods of time. Commissioners Meet
Carson County Commissioners Court met on August 16, 1999 with the following members and officers present: Judge Lewis Powers, Commissioners, Mike Britten, Kenneth Ware, Jerry Strawn and Kevin Howell.
Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
It was decided to approve fee adjustments determined by the state legislature for county and district court costs. Adjustments include increases of \$5 for marriage licenses, and court case increases of $\$ 15$ for law library, \$10 for records management, and $\$ 1$ for judicial and court personnel training
The court discussed the propossl of rescinding the proposal of rescinding the recent $3 \%$ pay raise for
the county judge, because of a judicial salary supplement that the mandatory this past session. The increase is funded by additional fees funded by additional fees that were assessed to
county civil, probate and county civil, probate and criminal cases. These include $\$ 40$ additions to probate and civil and $\$ 15$ to criminal cases. The motion carried unanimously to rescind the $3 \%$ increase.
A hearing was held on the 1999-2000 proposed budget. The court agreed to changes that included salary adjustments of soad hands Danny Farrell and Dennis Vaughn. Farrell will be moved from a 16D to a 17D salary and Vaughn will be moved from a 19A to 20A effective October 1, 1999. The motion unanimously passed to unanimously passed to accept the salary changes. The court discussed budgeted items for fire contracts with the cities. A quarterly pay schedule with the entities will be considered at a later date.
The 1999-2000 budget was accepted by the court.

The court voted to accept the proposal to increase total tax revenue by $5 \%$.

August 27, 1999 was set as the public hearing date for the tax increase. The meeting will be held at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Court Room.

Court adjourned until August 23, 1999.
