

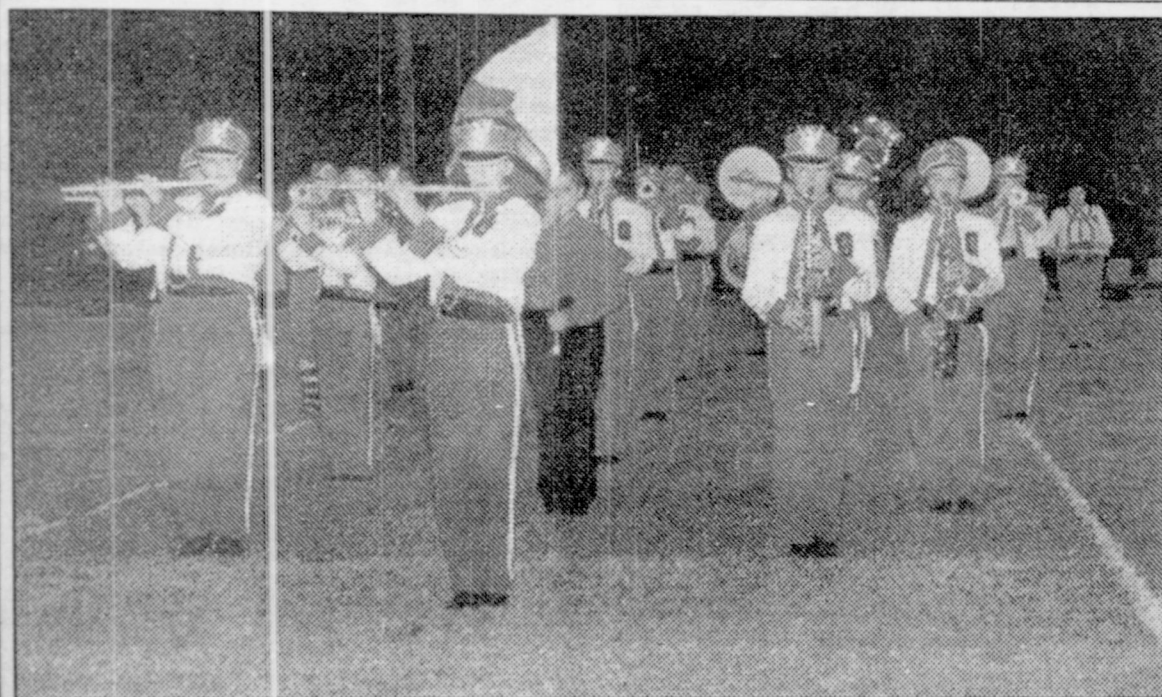

Britten Named Diocesan Woman Of The Year

Lucille Britten was chosen as Diocesan Woman of the Year this past week by the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women. The meeting was held at St. Vincent De Paul Catholic Church in Pampa.

The following letter was written by the Immaculate Heart of Mary Christian Mothers' Organization in Groom to the committee to nominate Lucille for this honor.

To Whom It May Concern:

We have worked with Lucille for years. This woman is an extraordinarily gifted and passionate Christian. Some residents of Groom, Catholic and Protestant, refer to her as an 'Angel in our midst.' Still others claim she is the 'Mother Theresa of the Panhandle.' Lucille has earned both of these highly esteemed titles.

Lucille, born in 1922, lives each day of her life to its fullest, as if it were the only one she has. She attempts to give her whole day to the Lord by doing for others. If she has not been asked by someone for assistance, she takes

the initiative to seek out and help a person in need. We have witnessed this time and time again.

She has cared for the elderly by transporting them to doctor's appointments, shopping trips, and parish functions. She carries from the Senior Citizen Meals on Tuesdays and Fridays trays of food to shut-ins. Lucille recently spent 6 to 7 weeks making daily visits to the hospital in Amarillo, then ultimately to hospice, feeding and caring for two elderly friends who died, first one then the other.

Whether making countess quilts for new mothers, or collecting gifts for the Amarillo Women's Center, Lucille, a retired nurse, has shown herself to be a strong pro-life advocate. After attending the recent diocesan Right to Life workshops and banquet, she wrote about them in *The Groom News*. She serves our parish as a Eucharistic minister, and also as a lector, attending daily Mass, praying the rosary etc.

Lucille has served as our parish's delegate to

your convention many times, bringing the message of your workshops back to our local meetings. Our prayer is that you will choose to honor Lucille Britten as your Woman of the Year, for she gives of herself mind, heart, body and soul, truly an "Angel in our Midst!"

Victory Over Follett Ranks Tigers Fifth

The Groom Tigers played their best game of the season last week against the Follett Panthers.

"The team showed a lot of poise and sportsmanship. They didn't let the 'big game' hype get to them," stated Coach Larry Reid. "I was very proud of the way they played and handled themselves. It was one of their best performances all year."

Groom's defense was impeccable as well as their offensive line.

"Once again it was a team effort," Reid continued. "We did have some outstanding individual performances,

but the overall performance was by all the players."

Groom had 18 first downs to Follett's 7. The Tigers had 31 rushing carries for 342 yards. Follett earned 135 yards on 22 carries.

The Tigers connected on 6 of 9 passes for 81 yards and three touchdowns. Follett completed 7 of 20 passes for 60 yards and two interceptions.

Wyatt Weinheimer had an impressive game. He earned the first points of the game on an interception return for 37 yards and a touchdown. He scored twice more

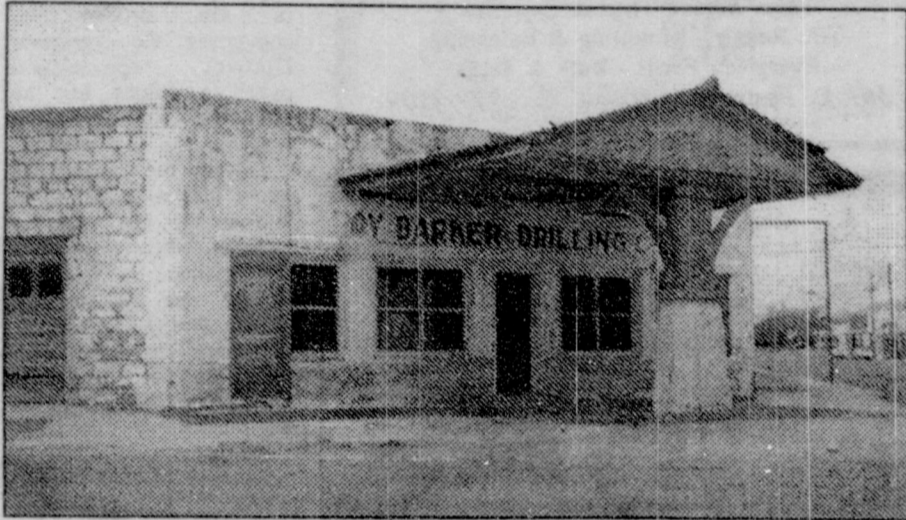
Town Sites Receive Face Lifts

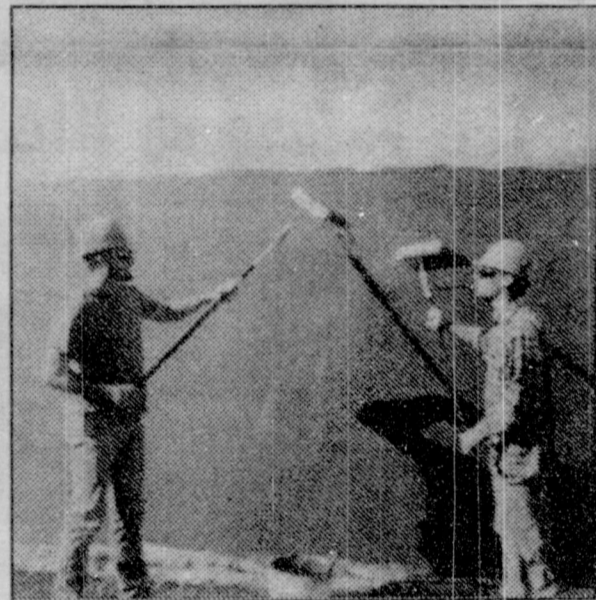
The old hospital building will be renovated soon. The Chamber and the EDC intend to clean and paint the clinic portion to use for offices and meetings. The ground area around
