The watermelons were grown here in McLean and shipped off to Different towns. These were Black Diamond watermelons. The Baileys were the biggest watermelon growers, but watermelon growers, but there were several others
also.
On Saturday around maybe 5:00 p.m., people would go to the drug store and buy cokes and sit on the comer and gossip. That's mainly how nows traveled around MoLean, or they would go home and watch the boring news, watch the boning news, but some
