City Water Usage Up

It is no surprise, but water usage is way up from previous years in the City of Groom.

City Water Superintendent Donnie Evans stated that the system is having no trouble keeping up with the increased demand.

"We average using about 450,000 gallons per day during the hottest part of the summer most years. We have been averaging around 600,000 gallons a day since the heat wave began."

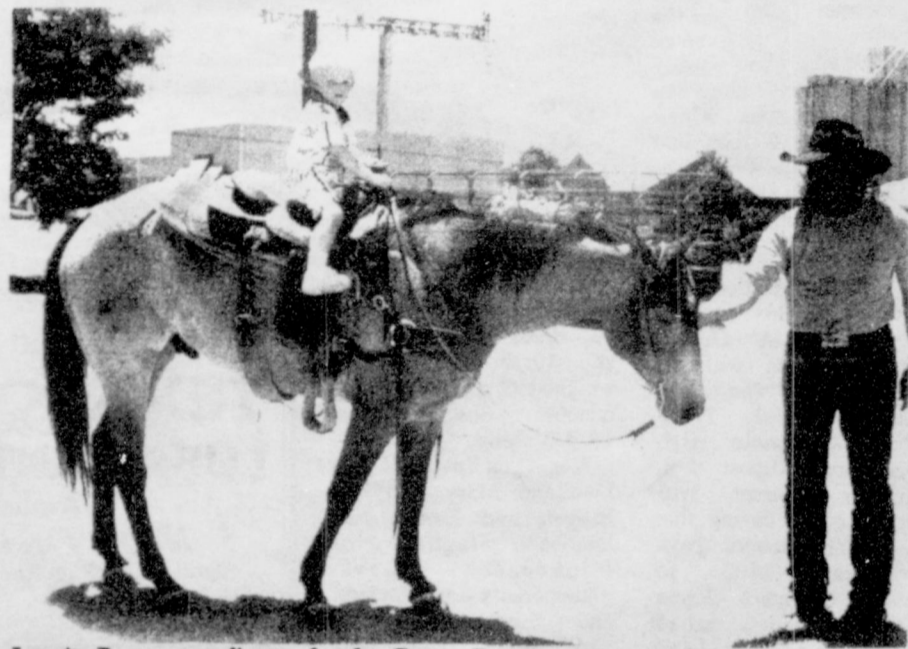
Many farmers and ranchers have been taking advantage of the water vending machine located on Main Street.

If you would like to witness a little of the wild west, this years Groom Day Round-Up is just what you are looking for! Spectators at the event will get the chance to see real cowboys doing real "cowboy-ing"!

Five person teams will work a series of events such as Team Doctoring, Wild Cow Milking, Double Mugging, Team Penning, and Team Branding.

Coordinator, Lonny Brown, stated that they already have nearly enough teams.

"We have opened it up to outside teams this year. Our local teams have so many other responsibilities on Groom Day, that we felt we could allow outside teams to enter and not keep anyone who wants to participate from doing

Groom's School Scheduling Hours Begin On First Day Back

More scheduling changes are in store for students and teachers at Groom I.S.D. The Site Based Committee recently came up with a new plan that will include more block type scheduling as well as a new time schedule.

A third block as been added to a schedule that included two last year for each day. Tutorial classes will be eliminated from the time frame of the regular school day. Classes will be on a continually revolving schedule, meaning that the "Red" schedules and "Black" schedules will simply alternate. One week the Red classes will meet three times, the next week the Black classes will meet three times.

The first bell will ring at 7:55. Students who need extra help in a certain class will need to be at school at 7:30 for a tutorial meeting with the instructor of the class.

Classes will begin at 8:00. 1st period will be a 55 minute class that will stay the same every day. It will be followed by two 1.5 hour block classes. Lunch break will be from 12:01 to 12:33.

In the afternoon, students will have one 55 minute class period and one 1.5 hour block class. The children will be dismissed at 3:03.

One of the biggest changes that may be noticed is that boys or girls athletics will not be held every day. They, too, will alternate, with all high school athletics being held during the last block period each day. Some weeks the boys would have 3 practice periods of 1.5 hour each, while the girls would have only 2 practices. The next week the girls would have 3 and the boys would have 2.

"It all works out well on paper," stated Superintendent Ingham. "We really think it will

work well, but it is not completely set in concrete. We may have some bugs to iron out."

Another problem that will be dealt with by getting out at 3:00 is the problem of leaving early for athletes. Many times a student who is extremely active in sports will always miss part of the last period of school because of the distances that must be driven in the Texas panhandle. Most of the time it was the girls who missed so many classes that sometimes the schedule had to be changed to allow last period to be first in order to keep the absences from affecting the class grades. 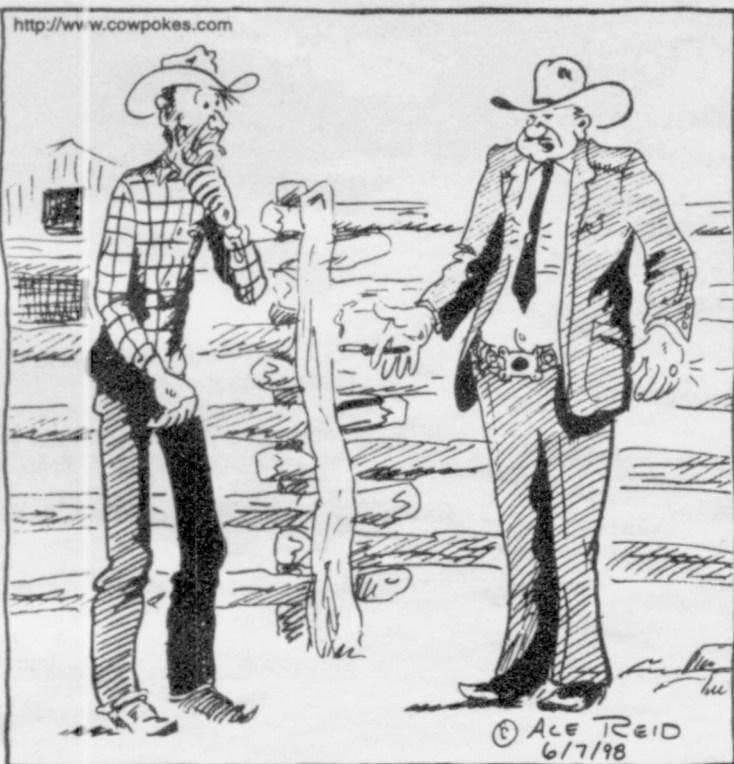

GISD Hears Progress Report On Athletic Booster's Club

The Groom ISD School Board met in their regular monthly meeting. Attending were Trustees Barry Fields, Dennis Babcock, Brad Rogers, Tony Treadwell, Tony Britten, Cliff Britten, and Tim Case.

Also attending were Superintendent Ben Ingham, Principal Donnie Carroll, Business Manager Joyce Hutsell, and citizens Marcia Conrad and Curtis Downs.

Mrs. Conrad was representing the Groom Athletic Booster Club and addressed the Board during the open forum. She made the group aware of projects that the Club has worked on in the past and updated them on future plans. She emphasized the Booster Club's desire to work with the Board's support and approval.

A resignation was accepted from teacher, Julie Couch.

Karen Reid, wife of coach Larry Reid and Linda Carroll, wife of the new principal, Donnie

Carroll, were hired as elementary teachers. Mrs. Reid will be teaching 2nd grade and was hired at Step 0 (\$21,050) and Mrs. Carroll was hired at Step 6 (\$26,360) and will be the 6th grade teacher.

In other business, the Board approved an agreement for tuition-free transfers for students attending Grandview-Hopkins ISD.

A discussion was held concerning the Lone Star Energy Conservation plan. Different options of the plan were examined. The board approved a motion to proceed with the plan by re-letting bids at a more appropriate time, targeting the winter of 1999.

Elementary, Jr. High, High School and Teacher handbooks were approved with appropriate changes.

The Trustees approved the bill and the meeting was adjourned.

The next regular meeting for Groom ISD is scheduled for August 11, 1998 at 8:00 p.m.

City Of Groom To Rebid Street Repair Job; Purchases GMC Pickup

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week with the following members present: Mayor Joe Homer, Aldermen Ellis Stapp, Don Case, Jimmy Britten, Pete Ham, and employees Mary Sue Lyles and Donnie Evans. Alderman Mary Margaret Brooks was absent.

The Council opened bids for repair of streets at 3rd and Broadway,

2nd and Ware, and 3rd and Wilkerson. The Council unanimously voted to reject the single bid and rebid the job.

A port-a-potty will be rented for Groom Municipal Park for \$75.00 per month from Panhandle Portables in Borger.

The City Council unanimously voted to purchase a 1994 GMC Pickup from Texas Trucks for the amount of \$10,500.

Cost of the pickup will be divided between the general fund, the water works fund and the road fund. Jimmy Britten, Pete Ham and Ellis Stapp voted in favor of the motion. Don Case voted against.

Aldermen voted unanimously to solicit bids for property, automobile and general liability insurance using the same specifications as

last year. Cox, Allen and Co. of Dumas were hired for the second year in a row to do the city audit for the 1998-99 year.

An investment policy was approved by the council with Mary Sue Lyles as it's manager.

A discussion was held concerning the setting of provisions for street and alley repairs when the repairs require making cuts in the pavement and on city right of way. Don Case and Donnie Evans were asked to prepare some guidelines to present at the next regular meeting.

An agenda item to change the time of the city meetings died for lack of motion.

In other business: the council decided to

continue to provide workers compensation insurance coverage for volunteer ambulance service members and volunteer firemen.

The cost of a chlorination system leak detector will be looked into by the water superintendent.

In their final item of business the council approved a motion to put signs prohibiting motor driven cycles on ball parks, around the sewer plant or other city property.

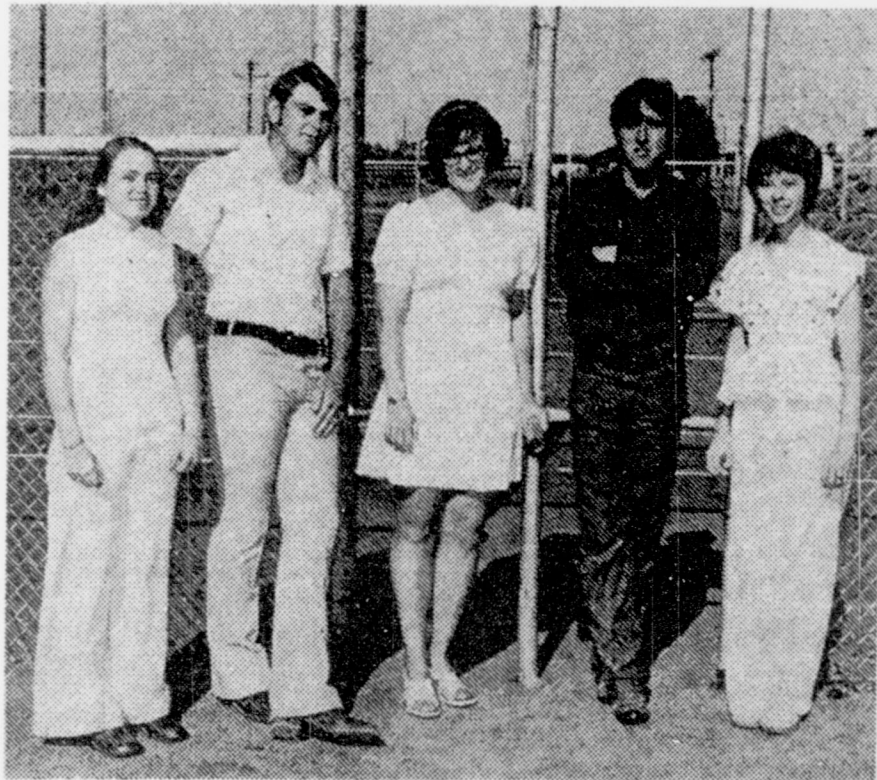



School Offers Free And Reduced Priced Lunches For Students

The McLean School cafeteria will serve nutritious meals every day. Students in K-5 may buy lunch for \$1.75, and grades 6-12 for \$2.00. Breakfast is 50 cents for all grades. Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the income scale are eligible for either free or reduced price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. Meals may be paid for in advance. Charges will not be allowed without the consent of the parents and all charges must be paid weekly.

Household size and income criteria to be used in determining eligibility are included in

the chart in this issue of The McLean News.

Application forms are being sent home with a letter to parents and guardians. To apply for free or reduced meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school at the earliest date possible.

The complete schedule for the determination of benefits is available at the school and should there be any questions concerning the program, contact John Griffin at the business office. An income guideline is listed.

In the operation of the child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, national origin, age, sex, or handicap.

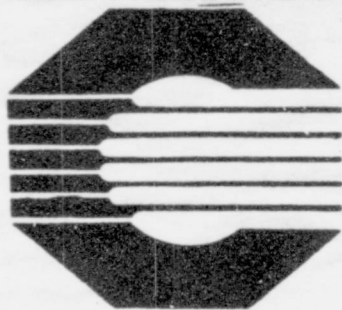

Hepatitis B is one of the viruses that attacks the liver. It can cause permanent liver damage and scarring, severe illness and, in some cases even death. Texas Department of Health offers Hepatitis B vaccine. All children from birth through 19 years of age, are approved to be vaccinated with the vaccine supplied by the Texas Department of Health, TVFC. It is no longer necessary to be included in a Hepatitis B high-risk group to be eligible for state supplied vaccine. Children who begin the series before their 20th birthday, are eligible to complete the series in later years. Individuals who are 20 years of age or older will require the adult formulation of Hepatitis B vaccine.

Governor Bush Asks For Drought Aid For The Entire State Of Texas

Governor George W. Bush is asking the federal government to grant disaster status to an additional 176 counties stricken by drought. If the U.S. Department of Agriculture grants the Governor's request, all 254 Texas counties will be under a drought disaster declaration.

In a letter to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman, Governor Bush describes the economic emergency caused by above normal temperatures and severe drought conditions. If the request is granted, Texas farmers and ranchers will be eligible for emergency loans to cover losses suffered under the drought. The

Texas Agriculture Extension Service estimates total losses will be \$1.5 billion statewide. "I'm asking the federal government to expedite the declaration for all Texas counties because Texas needs immediate assistance," Governor Bush said.

As of today, two Texas counties, Terrell and Glasscock, have been designated disaster areas by the federal government. Requests from seventy-six counties are pending.

Carson and Gray counties along with the surrounding counties of Armstrong, Donley, Potter, Randall are among 176 counties to be requested for USDA Drought Assistance.

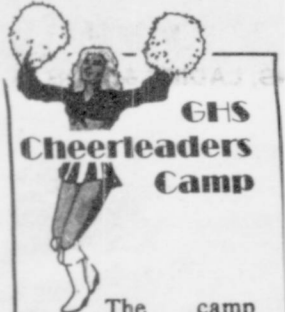

Letter To The Editor....

Fire Works Ban Substantiated

I need to make a correction in my letter that was printed in the July 9th edition of the newspaper. I misunderstood the fire chief when I stated he had made a written request to the county judge for a ban on fireworks. I called the chief the next morning and was told he had gone to talk to the judge. When his request was denied, he asked the judge to write a letter of denial. The letter was not written.

On July 1st a letter was printed in the *Borger News-Herald* citing the Hutchinson county judge and commissioners as being "real patriots" for banning fireworks.

On July 2nd a story was run about a fireworks dealer making arrangements with a

Fritch man who had ten acres of land in Carson County and was to let people set off fireworks since there were no bans in Carson County. Judge Roselius was quoted several times in the story. The judge ran a notice concerning the ban.

A story on July 3rd said the Hutchinson commissioners enacted a ban after Governor George Bush declared Texas a disaster area due to the extreme heat and lack of moisture. Residents of the Antelope Creek area and Fritch contacted Judge Roselius who again denied the ban. Several of the residents were very upset and were afraid to go to bed until 4:00 a.m. because of potential fires

on their properties and the war zone noise.

A July 9th story in the *Miami Chief* stated the outdoor burning and fireworks ban will continue until Roberts County receives enough rainfall to alleviate the dry conditions.

KVII TV aired a story July 3rd that Carson County was the only county in the area without a ban. This was like an invitation to come here to set off fireworks. We would probably have had numerous fires had not farmers and ranchers and firemen been driving around to keep people from shooting their fireworks near our properties.

The *Amarillo Daily News* ran a story on July 17th on the extension of the ban in Potter and Randall counties. On July 18th the paper reported the Texas Sheriffs' Association passed a resolution


seeking authority for all Texas Counties commissioners to ban the use, sale, and possession of fireworks during extreme conditions.

The 1991 legislature banned aerial fireworks and provided that counties provide a "safe area" for discharging fireworks. In 1997, state lawmakers struck the "safe area" provision.

The Texas State News Network reported on KGNC radio early morning news on July 18th that the State Fire Marshall said over two-thirds of Texas' 254 counties have banned outdoor burning and all fireworks. The 170 counties with bans far exceeds the judge's quote


of "only 21 counties having banned fireworks" and that "only aerial fireworks have been banned."
