

ARB To Hear Taxpayer Complaints On July 1

Taxpayers in the Carson County Appraisal District will have an opportunity on July 1 to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests at 9:00

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property values, local governments will use these

values to assess property taxes to property owners for 1987.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productive valuation are properly granted.

Property owners appear before the ARB and may protest any of these seven specific actions of the appraisal office:

—the appraised or agricultural value of the property;

-unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district:

--inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;

--denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption; --denial of agricultural-

use, open-space or timber productivity valuation; --identification of the taxing unit or units in which the

property is located;
--determination that the
taxpayer is the owner of the

property; and
--any other action of the
appraisal office that
adversely affects them.

Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps for a property owner to file a protest. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by June 30 or within 30 days after the taxpayer receives a notice of appraised value from the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, the property owner has only 10 days to file a



Commander Petty Gets Promotion

Lt. Commander Robert Harold Petty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold C. with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence or argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protests of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the schedule appearance date. Lavake said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 1, 1987. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20.

After the ARB approves the records, it can hear a protest only if an error substantially affects the owner's tax liability.

TENSION HEADACHE

If you're bothered by headache that seems to have its origin at the base of your skull, you may be suffering from tension headache.

Tension headaches can be caused by an irritation of the nerves in the area of the spine immediately under the skull. These are called the suboccipital nerves. They pass through small openings in the spinal column to muscles in the surrounding area. Any abnormal pressure or dysfunction of neck and muscles can irritate the nerves, causing tension.

The tension doesn't cause the headache. To treat this form of headache, attention should be paid to the bone and muscle structures. They should be returned to normal balance so they can func-

tion properly again.

Medication is not the answer to tension headaches. Aspirin and other painkillers may give you temporary relief - but they won't solve the problem. Once the source of the problem is found and treated, THEN you can get the re-
