## McLean ISD Provided \$5,128.69 Per Student

Last year trustees in the 1,052 Texas school districts $\mathbf{\text { adopted }}$ budgets totaling $\mathbf{\$ 1 4 - 1 / 4}$ billion and increased local property taxes by another half a billion dollars. School budgets were 2-1/2 times as much in 1990 is the $\$ 5.7$ billion at the beginning of the decade, and school property taxes were three property taxes
times as much.
The figures come fron the latest issue of Bench Marks 1989.90 School District Budgets in Texas, an an nual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austinbased, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.
An average of $\mathbf{\$ 3 , 5 4 2}$ per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus $\mathbf{\$ 3 0 2}$ for repayment of debt and $\$ 461$ per student for capital outlay.
McLean ISD's budget provided $\mathbf{\$ 5 , 1 2 8 . 6 9} \mathrm{per}$ student for current oparations, and 160.64 per student for capital ou lay student for capital ou lay enrolled in the fall sementer of 1989 .
The average salary for classroom teachers paid by McLean ISD in 1988-89 was $\$ 23,395.00$ plus supplements for the career ladder. In McLean ISD the average salary for administrators was $\mathbf{\$ 3 3}, 405.00$ and $\$ 32,258.00$ for other professional
support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.). Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged $\mathbf{\$ 2 , 8 9 5}$ per student, as in McLean ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.
Taxpayers provided one teacher for 10.8 students in McLean ISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.6 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the high-school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many other classes have more than the average number of students.
tudents.
To fund higher school budgets with a declining tax districts have trustees in most districts have raised tax ristrict ime average school tax at the rosed a property $\$ 100$ of rate of $\$ 1.01$ per 100 of appraised value, which value averaged 97.6 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 98.6 cents ( $\$ 1.01$ times 97.62 percent) statewide. Locally, the McLean ISD imposed a rate of \$1.200 while property was appraised at 100.8 percent of its market value making the true rate $\$ 1.209$ per $\$ 100$ of market value (selling price). The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value
rather than on appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools. In 1989, the true tax rate exceeded $\$ 1$ in half of the school districts in Texas. The tax on a house that would sell for $\$ 80,000$ in McLean ISD would have been $\$ 884$. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been 5824 , and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an $\mathbf{\$ 8 0 , 0 0 0}$ house in this district would have averaged $\$ 704$, or less if subject to a tax freeze. That compares with statewide average tax bills statewide average tax bills
of $\$ 806, \$ 712$, and $\$ 543$ respectively for an $\$ 80,000$ respectively for an $\$ 80,000$
house. Last
Last year McLean ISD's revenue from the property tax increased by 4.9 percent for 1989-90 as compared to a 9.1 perce
statewide.

Local
Local property taxes plus state aid was $\$ 4,552$ per student in McLean ISD as compared to $\$ 3,386$ statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. The 153 districts with 10 percent of the students in Texas and a large tax base had 44 percent more tax funds to spend on each student than 75 property-poor districts also with 10 percent of the students.

People who have Me People who have Medicare insurace (Part B Medicare) should know about an important change in the way claims are submitted.
Beginning September 1 , 1990, the Medicare medical insurance claim must be prepared and submitted by the service provider--the doctor, laboratory, medical supply company, or other party giving the service. In the past, Medicare beneficiaries had to submit a form 1490A (Patient's Request for Medicare) unless the doctor or service provider accepted "sssign ment." (Assignment that the doctor or means service provider accepts the Medicare-approved as the total charge) But starting in charge.) But starting in September, the provider must sen service provider must send in the claim even if they do not accept assignemnt.
