Tex Vaughn To Discuss Cattle Marketing

The Donley County Livestock and Range Improvement committee is sponsoring a Stocker Cattle Seminar for beef producers in the area on Thursday, November 2, 1989. The Seminar is co-hosted by the Armstrong County Extension Livestock Committee. It will start at 1:00 p.m. on November 2, at the Clarendon Community Center.

The Seminar will be open to anyone interested and will cover a wide range of topics. Dr. Charles E. Deyhle, Sr., of Deyhle Veterinary Services, Inc. in Clarendon, will be on the program to discuss health related problems, symptoms and treatment is stocker cattle as well as other health related cattle problems in the area.

Dr. John W. McNeill, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will be on hand to discuss stocker grazing management, nutrition and supplementation. Dewey "Tex" Vaughn, of Pioneer Feeders, will be on the program to discuss marketing cattle. Tex will visit with producers about grouping cattle, buying cattle, culling, options,

hedging and more.

There will be several animal health industry representatives present with booths at the seminar showing their latest products. A catered meal will also be provided for participants that evening. The meal will be sponsored by the animal health industry representatives and others. Those wishing to participate in the seminar must contact the Donley County Extension Office 806-874-2141, or the Armstrong County Extension Office 806-226-3021, by October 30, 1989, in order to get a head count for the meal. The meal should be served around 5:30 p.m. that evening.

At the seminar, plans are to also have demonstrations of some of the latest technology in health care as well as other management practices.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serves people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

The group met in the home of Billie Bivens Tuesday morning, October 17, for the Baptist women meeting.

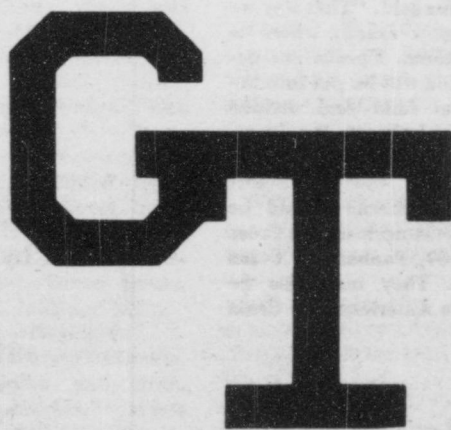

Funds For Red Cross

fund into a deficit. In addition to this, another \$10 million is needed to pay for other disasters in the remaining nine months of the fiscal year.

So read a news release dated September 26, 1989 and received by The Groom News the following week. A telephone call to The Groom News on Tuesday, October 17, said Carson County's goal in that campaign is \$55.00. That's right -- only \$55.00. "Surely we will have no difficulty meeting that goal," the editor told the Red Cross representative.

Four hours after that telephone conversation, a killer earthquake hit California in the San Francisco area. Immediately, the American Red Cross was called into action clear across the country from the hurricane-stricken area, caring not that the new fund campaign was just starting.

No new information has been received by The Groom News concerning how much

higher the Carson County goal will be, but common sense makes it quickly understood that it will increase considerable. Can it be met? The Groom News staff believes it can -- quickly and easily.

Prior to the earthquake disaster, American Red Cross Chairman George F. Moody said, "I can state flat-out that by meeting these current commitments, our entire disaster relief fund and reserves will be in a substantial deficit position."

After the earthquake, the "substantial deficit" became more acute.

As the single non-government relief agency chartered by Congress to provide disaster assistance to all Americans, the Red Cross relies totally on the generosity of the American people at times like this.

"In the tradition of neighbor helping neighbor, we urge Americans to support

the Red Cross by donating whatever they can afford to the disaster relief fund," said Moody.

Carson County Red Cross operations are handled through the County Judge's Office. Judge Rosellus said that a check to cover the county's \$55.00 goal has already been sent from the funds on hand and that other donations will be sent to the respective relief areas as they are received.

"If our people want their money sent to a specific area [Hugo or San Francisco] they should indicate that by a notation in the bottom left corner of their checks," Rosellus said. "That way we will know exactly where to send them. Checks not designated will be put into the general fund and divided equally between the hurricane and earthquake areas."

Those checks should be sent to: American Red Cross Box 369, Panhandle, Texas 79068. They may also be sent to American Red Cross

Disaster Relief Fund, P.O. Box 37243, Washington, DC 20013.

Carson County residents are fortunate in that they

The school/community drug team concluded its involvement except as resource persons at this meeting.

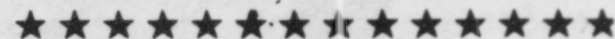
