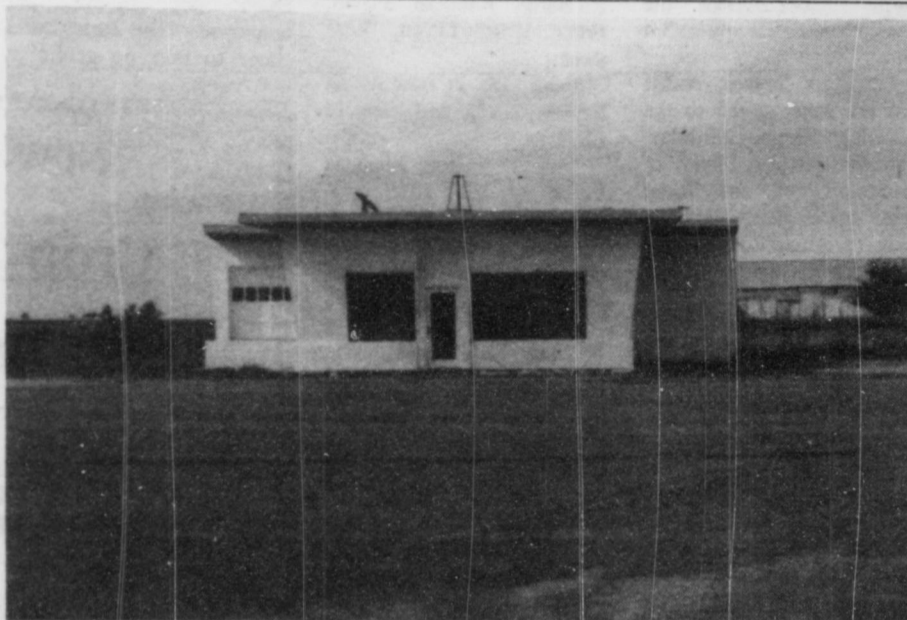

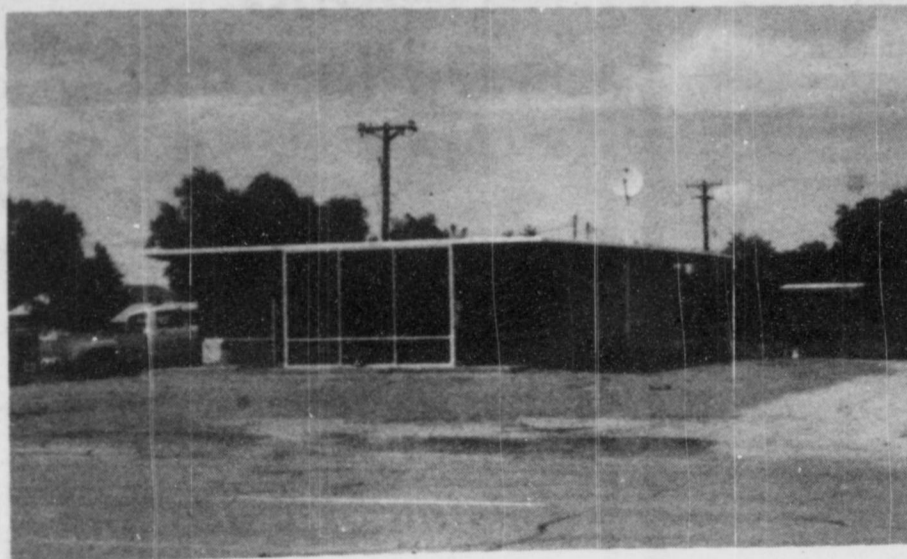

Cornett Appointed To City Council

Bobby Cornett was appointed to fill the unexpired term on the city council, created by Jimmy Britten's election to the mayoral seat. The council had a wide field of interested citizens respond to the need of the councils empty position. In their regular meeting Tuesday night they voted by secret ballot between the following people: Arnie Kuehler, Martin Hermesmeyer, Mary Sue Lyles, Donald Burgin, Donnie Conrad, Steve Anthony, Bobby Babcock and Bobby Cornett.

In other business the council upheld their recent resolution of expansion of the Pantex Plant. Several pro and con letters were passed around. Although the consensus was that there definitely is a lack of information as to the safety of such a plant. Greg Lamb stated, "Seems like we would be hasty if we rescind (our resolution) now. We would be over-reacting at this point."

The commission heard a proposal from Groom Committee representative Karen Brown and Bobby Cornett.

Brown gave a brief description of plans for Groom Day '91.

A fireworks display on Friday night was the issue as the Groom Day Committee must pay around \$3,000.00 for a 20 to 30 minute display. The committee will pay \$1,000.00, the rest of the money must come from donations or fund raisers.

The annual celebration is put on each year with only one fund raiser each year, the Groom Day Raffle. The barbecue only pays for itself. Members of the committee do not wish to raise the price per plate to pay for anything additional, like a fireworks display. A slow pitch tournament is being organized to fund this special project.

Cornett stated that the person will contract to handle the display is licensed by the state. He also said that they must get permission from the state and local Fire Marshall's as well.

The city agreed to put up a minimum of \$500.00.

The council also looked at some benefit plans offered by the Texas Municipal League. Under this cafeteria style plan, an employee may choose to have their social security figured on their pay after

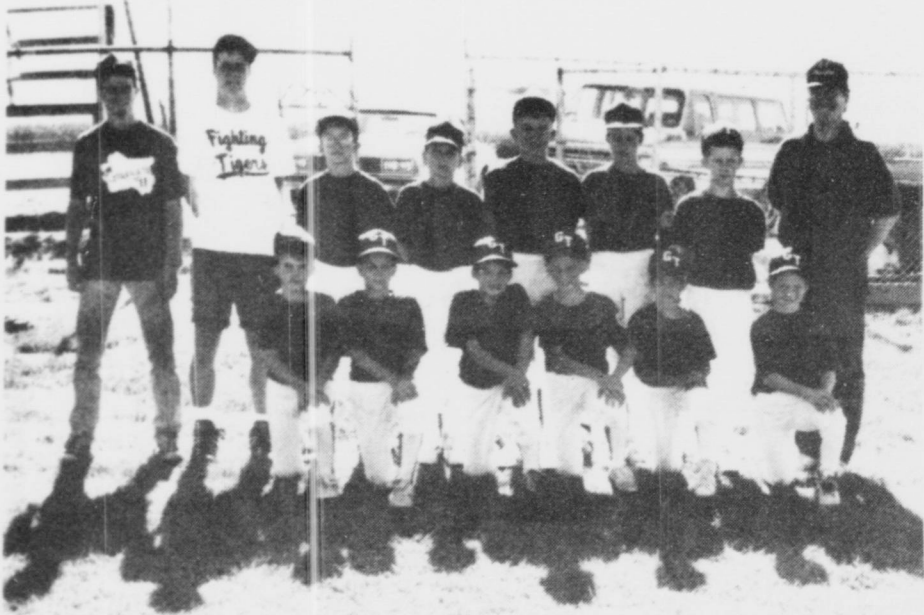

Grandview Students Win Honors In Poster Contest

Three Grandview-Hopkins Elementary School students took top honors in the 1991 Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District Poster Contest recently. Approximately 300 Gray County elementary school

students from Pampa and Grandview-Hopkins participated in the contest. Ribbons for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place and 2 Honorable Mentions were presented to students in each of the 20 participating classrooms. Also as part of the Contest,

an Eastern Red Cedar tree seedling was presented to each of the 300 students and 14 teachers who participated. Each school that participated was given 5 trees.

Placing 1st overall, out of all 200 entries, was Stephanie Ollinger, a 6th grade student at Grandview-Hopkins. Stephanie was awarded a certificate and trophy for her 1st place entry. UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY PUBLIC SCORING MEETING NUCLEAR WEAPONS COMPLEX RECONFIGURATION PROGRAMMATIC ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT

The Department of Energy (DOE) plans to prepare a Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) addressing reconfiguring its nuclear weapons complex (see Notice of Intent, Federal Register, February 11, 1991). The PEIS will analyze the environmental consequences of alternative long-term reconfiguration strategies for the DOE nuclear weapons complex, envisioned to be in place early in the 21st century ("Complex 21"), and weigh these against the consequences of maintaining the existing configuration. DOE invites interested agencies, organizations, and individuals to a public scoping meeting and to submit comments or suggestions on the environmental issues or recommended scope of this PEIS. The public scoping meeting will be held:

Individual oral comments should be limited to five minutes. Comments presented at the meeting and written comments postmarked by September 30, 1991, will be considered in the preparation of the PEIS. Written comments on the scope of the PEIS should be addressed to Mr. James R. Nicks, Associate Deputy Assistant Secretary for Weapons Complex Reconfiguration (Acting), DP-40, Room GA-045, U.S. Department of Energy, 1000 Independence Avenue, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20585. SCS ADVISES TO CHECK WELLS

The Soil Conservation Service in Panhandle is assisting irrigation farmers again with checking their irrigation wells for engine and pumping efficiency, according to Julius Purnell, Soil Conservationist.

Irrigation farmers know they must achieve greater efficiency in all phases of their operation if they continue to irrigate. The question today is can irrigation farmers adopt practices and techniques to improve their water management program? The

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answer is yes. Technology is now available for more efficient irrigation management.

The engine and pump checks that the SCS will conduct this year shows farmers what the efficiency of their systems are.

The systems checked in the past ranged from good to fair. This shows the farmer how much it is costing to irrigate per acre. This year due to very little moisture received earlier in the spring, more farmers are having to pre-water for planting grain sorghum and watering of corn and wheat. With the rising costs of irrigating, farmers need to know the efficiency of their systems. The local SCS office servicing Carson County has trained technicians and equipment available to assist irrigation farmers in assessing their irrigation management. Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for residence Custom Calling Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for certain residence Custom Calling Services.

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling 8 and Speed Calling 30.

The Company's proposal would increase the monthly rate for the individual Call Waiting feature from \$2.10 to \$3.10 for residence customers. Also, the rates for certain combinations of Custom Calling Features (Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling-8) would increase or decrease depending upon the combination of features. In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Following are the feature combinations and their current and proposed rates.

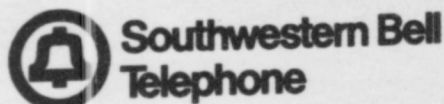

**Southwestern Bell's application proposes to obsolete residence Speed Calling 30 except for existing customers at their existing locations.

Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

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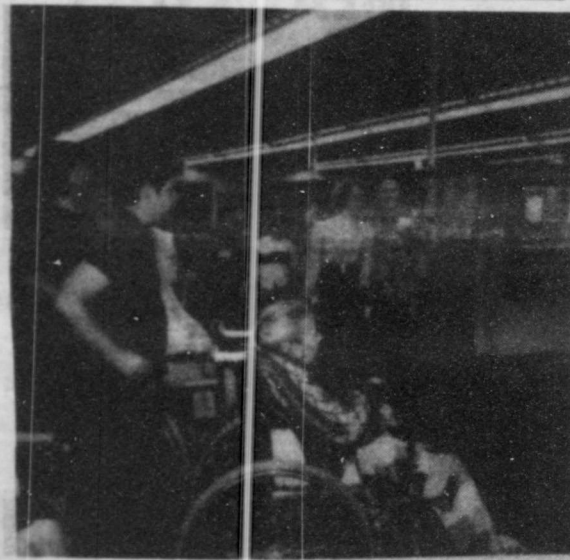
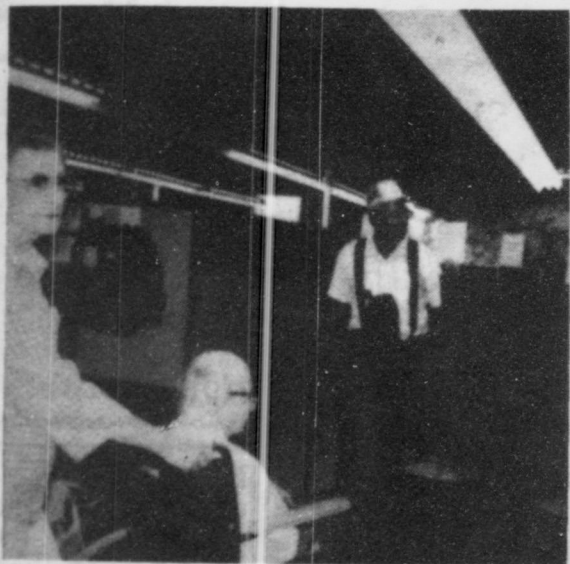

Voters Decide On Consolidation

In a special called meeting last week Rex Peeples, outgoing superintendent, recommended to the McLean School Board that they pursue consolidation with Lefors and Alanreed. His reasoning was that with the deficit of the 1990-91 and even the additional funds expected in 1991-92 the deficit will continue to grow. By consolidating the three schools they could compile the three budgets and continue operating with existing buildings to start and possibly add new facilities down the road.

The legislation, dubbed the "Robin Hood" plan, creates countywide property districts throughout. The legislation is designed to shift hundreds of millions of dollars in local property tax revenue from wealthier to poorer school districts within the new education taxing districts.

The "sweet 16" school districts in County Education District 14 are from Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill and Gray counties.

Both Lefors and Alanreed would lose money under the legislation, while McLean would gain some the first year.

Chisum told school board members last Thursday that their "window of opportunity" would shut on Sept. 1 as far as choosing consolidation options. He said after that date, the State Commissioner of Education would have full

power on telling school districts who to consolidate with if the school districts came out of compliance.

Any consolidation can only be approved by the voters of the separate school districts. Petitions, asking that an election be called for the consolidation issue, must be signed by at least 10 percent of the registered voters in each school district. The petitions would then be taken to the county judge who would set an election date for the voting.

James Hefley, president of McLean School Board, said, "I was a little skeptical, but I came away with the feeling (Thursday night) that it's probably time to look at consolidation."

Peeples said it looked like the "magic" number of students that would keep a school alive would be somewhere around 300. Lefors has about 145 students, McLean has about 220 students and Alanreed has about 20 students, for a total of about 385 students.

If a consolidation of the three school districts occurred, a negative aspect would be that some teachers would lose jobs. There are now 45 teachers in the three school districts and it is estimated that 33 would be needed under a consolidated system.

Positive aspects of consolidation, school board members said, would be more efficiency, enhanced curriculum and extracurricular activities.

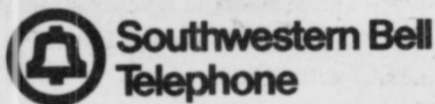
Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible.
