Coach Coffee Announces Two-A-Day Plans

Coach Terry Coffee announced this week that two-a-day workouts for football players will begin August 11. Prior to the opening of workouts, athletes will need to have completed physicals. The school will provide physical exams be performed by Dr. Keith Black here on Aug. 7. All athletes will be examined that day. The schedule will be all girls junior high and high school from 1:00 to 3:00. Boys, both junior high and high school, will report for exams from 3:00 to 5:00. The location for the physicals will be announced closer to the Aug. 7 date.

Available this year will be paintings, wood paintings, country crafts, wood carvings, ceramics and doll clothing.

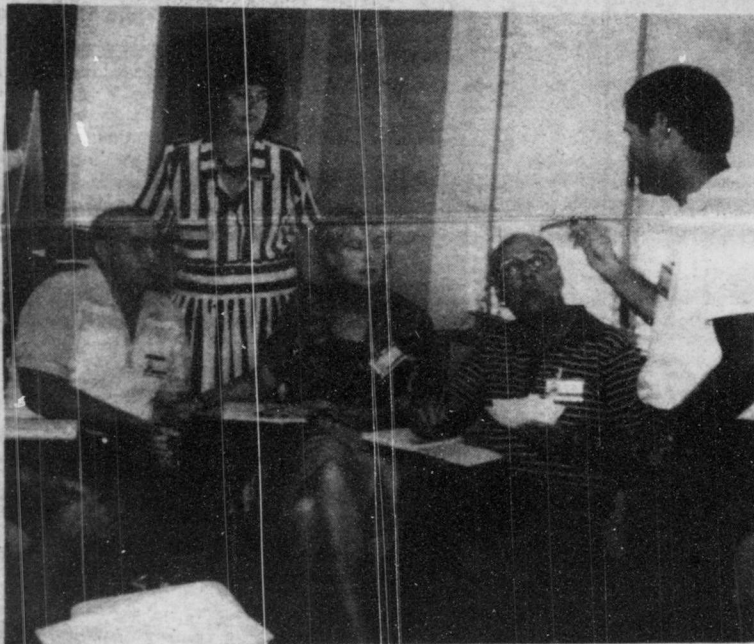
Entries in the horse race are being taken by Lonnie and Susan Brown. They report the belt buckle for the

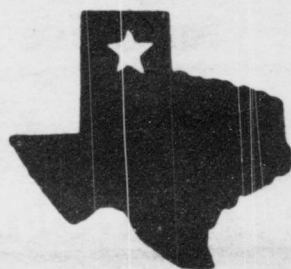

The first McLean Flea Market was a huge success, according to coordinator Sam Green. Over 1300 people from Texas, Oklahoma, Nevada, Wisconsin, North Carolina, Florida, California, Colorado, Michigan, Kentucky and Illinois came through the doors.

Also, twenty-nine vendors from McLean, Panhandle, Shamrock, Pampa, Amarillo, Canadian and Sayre were on

hand to advertise and sell their products. People attending the market could select from a variety of products ranging from arts and crafts and woodworking to poodle puppies and ornamental concrete.

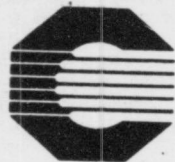

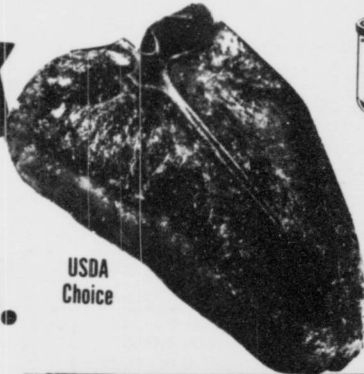

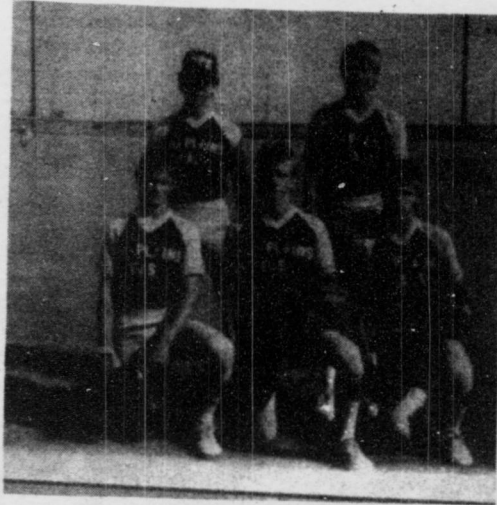

Farmers Urged To Sign-Up

Signup for the 1987 Reserve Program will be Aug. 4-15 at Conservation Service county offices.

Farmers may offer bids to place highly erodible cropland into the reserve for the third time this year.

Annual payments for 10 years will compensate farmers for retiring highly erodible land from crop production. The amount of

the payment is determined by the accepted bid per acre and the number of accepted acres.

Participants will also receive cost-share assistance for establishing grass, trees, or wildlife plants on the

acreage placed in the reserve. Hunting is allowed on the land but no crops can be harvested while it is in the reserve.

Ed Blackwell, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Panhandle, said land that is

eroding at more than three times the tolerance level is eligible to be placed in the reserve if it was farmed three or more years between 1981 and 1985.

During the first two sign-ups, bids were tentatively accepted from more than

1,200 Texas farmers on 310,000. Bids accepted ranged from \$25 to \$50 per acre.

Property Tax Base Grows Slightly

The property tax base of Texas school districts grew by 3.9 percent from 1984 to 1985, according to estimates released by the State Property Tax Board (SPTB). Preliminary results of the agency's 1985 Property Value Study show that school districts contained a total of \$718.9 billion in taxable property value as of January 1, 1985.

This 3.9 percent growth rate in the school tax base is less than half the 8.7 percent increase that occurred between SPTB's 1983 and 1984 studies.

State law requires SPTB to estimate the taxable value of property annually in each of the state's 1,063 school districts.

"A school district's taxable property value is one of the important factors that determine the amount of state education aid the district will receive," explained Ron Patterson, SPTB's executive director. The Texas Education Agency will use the values from the 1985 Property Value Study in calculating education aid allotments for the 1986-87 school year.

"The slower growth in taxable values between 1984 and 1985 reflects a slowdown in portions of the Texas economy brought on by falling oil prices," said Patterson. He noted that the price for a barrel of oil fell by about \$2 during this period, on top of an \$8 decline during 1981-84. "This price drop produced a ripple effect in real estate values, which make up most of the school tax base."

The study's preliminary results indicate that the taxable value of minerals in Texas, including oil and gas, actually declined by \$1.5 billion between 1984 and 1985.

Another factor in the difference is that state law excludes personal automobiles and the personal property of banks from the study beginning with 1985.

The 1985 Property Value Study combines the school district value study with another study required by

law. The other portion of SPTB's study evaluates the equality and uniformity of local tax appraisals performed by county appraisal districts.

"The Texas Constitution requires tax appraisals to reflect the full value of property and to be equal and uniform," said Patterson. "Our study of local tax appraisals indicates the extent to which appraisal districts met these legal standards on their 1985 appraisal rolls."

SPTB's study develops a statistical measure called the "median level of appraisal" which shows how close, overall, property is appraised to its full value. "All property is supposed to be appraised at 100 percent of its full value," Patterson explained. "A median appraisal level is a 'middle' value. An appraisal district should try to achieve a median as close to 100 percent as possible, without going over."

If a taxpayer can prove to an appraisal review board that his property's appraised value is greater than the median level of appraisal for all property in the appraisal district, the review board can reduce the property's appraised value to the median level.

"However," Patterson cautioned, "the 1985 Property Value Study is a year behind the appraised values being considered by appraisal review boards in 1986. As a result, the appraisal levels in the study don't always indicate the appraisal levels for the current year, especially if the study don't always indicate the appraisal levels for the current year, especially if the appraisal district has reappraised property in 1986."

Patterson added that other statistical measures in the study show how uniform the appraisals are. "As a whole, the level of the appraisal district's values may be close to actual value. However, if individual property appraisals vary widely, some taxpayers will pay taxes on high values while others pay taxes on low values."

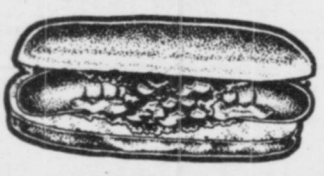

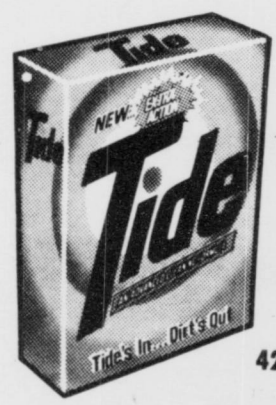

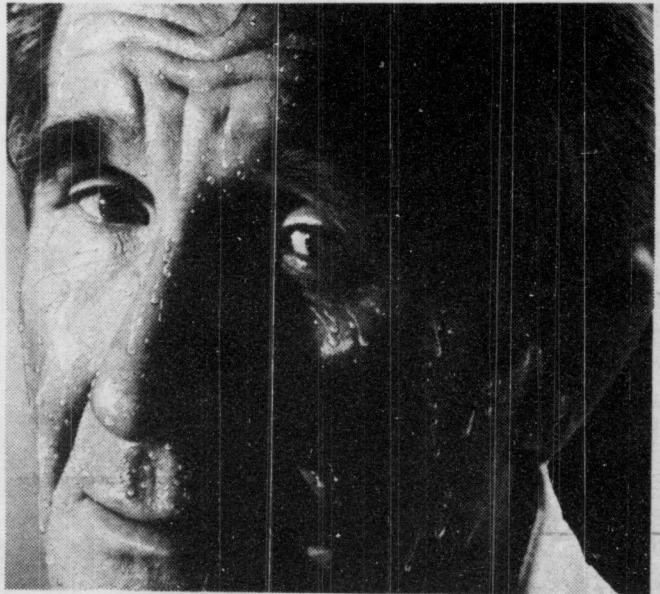
