# Site Based Management **Program To Be Implemented**

Groom Schools will be pioneering a new system of management this fall. Called the Site Based Management System. It was implemented to a limited degree last year.

"Essentially, it will turn the pyramid over," said Groom ISD Principal Judy Babcock, "making the broad base of students, teachers, parents and tax payer, empowered to analyze data, set goals and make recommendations to the policy making group. . .the board."

Although it does not lessen the authority of the board in any way, the plan will provide a network of information and data that

will help the board be more informed on the needs and priorities of the students, teachers, and the faculty

A team will be elected and appointed that will do the majority of the work throughout the year. The task force will include the campus Principal; four teachers, who will be elected by the other teachers of Groom ISD; two community residents, who do not have children in school, and two parents. The parents and community members are appointed by the principal.

Judy Babcock stated, "We are looking for people to serve right away. Training is provided at the Service

Center in November. Anyone interested in serving would need to be able to attend this training as well as attend meetings during the school day throughout

Anyone who fits the above criteria may call Mrs. Babcock at 248-7474.

The mission of the Site Based Management Team is commitment to improve student outcomes. Some of the objectives that were set last year were: To purchase software for tutorial use for the purpose of helping students gain skills to master the TAAS Tests; maintain a 22.1 on the ACT Test; maintain a See School, pg. 3

# Amarillo News Media Comes Knockin' Only To Find Local Support For Paramount Pictures

Word travels fast in Leven, owners and renters Groom, as in most towns, when there is controversy in the air. Last Wednesday morning Groom found itself on the front page of the Amarillo newspaper. The story depicted a couple of Groom residents very unhappy with its experie last summer with Paramount Pictures.

In particular the four column headlined story, said Bill Riley and Herman

of the motel complex where much of the movie was centered, "regrets the whole experience." "I wouldn't do it again - no way, absolutely no," said Bill Riley in the newspaper's story. Riley said that Paramount still hasn't paid him \$2,000.00 the movie studio owes him for damages to several of the motel's rooms.

Herman Leven said in the story that he is in a

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similar bind because he was leasing the motel and bar from Riley and the movie studio agreed to pay Leven \$1,000.00 a month to lease the motel and bar, \$500.00 a week for lost business, plus utility bills and any damages to the motel and

Riley told The Groom News Monday he knows he has made some local folks mad at him but he is the one that has not been paid for the damages to his motel. He has since taken the motel back over from Herman Leven and plans to have the motel in top shape in a month. He asks only for the damages he says is "out of pocket cash", \$2,000.00 on the repair of the motel rooms. He has been paid the rent amount agreed upon initially for the

three months by Paramount Pictures.

Paramount Pictures' location manager Michael Charske called The Groom News Wednesday from El Paso after the story hit the streets to find out what was going on. Charske said he ad been called from Los Angeles and it sounded like to him that Groom was forming a lynch mob.

Charske said "These folks had all signed the contracts to the payments agreed upon at the time and he was never aware of anyone being unhappy at the time Paramount left Groom on July 30. "A small office manned by Kate McCartney, also a location manager for Paramount, remained behind for approximately a week in Groom to tie up See Movie, Pg. 3


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

Jan and Howard Britten worked with Paramount and they said they were paid and had no regrets.

Jim Moraniec, owner of Mighty's, worked closely with Paramount both while in Groom and in Dallas and he said "I've received every penny."

Tony Treadwell, President of Groom's Economic Development Corporation, said then and now that the majority of the people in

Groom were satisfied with their treatment by Paramount.

Treadwell said, "It totally upsets people in Groom what Paramount might think about the article in the Amarillo paper."

Treadwell noted some of the financial benefits to Groom were thousands of dollars to various Groom programs, such as \$2,000.00 to the summer baseball program that will be used to put a roof on the baseball park, \$2,400.00 to the Groom Fire Department for use of the water trucks and Groom School was paid \$10,000.00 for the use of their facilities. Treadwell also emphasized the hiring of local people around the area and the money spent in local businesses.

The Amarillo news media particularly the Globe-News and KAMR, Channel 4 seemed upset at Paramount for the restrictions placed upon them by Paramount and the Department of Public Safety at the time of shooting the film. Cameraman for KAMR told The Groom News, "We were not allowed to come into Groom when they were shooting the movie. I was told that if I did not turn around I was going to be

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

## Carson Co Sheriff's Report

The Sheriff's Department relayed ten 9-1-1 calls to various agencies over the past week. The calls dealt with grass fires, a car fire, medical emergencies and requests for assistance.

Six persons were arrested and confined in the Carson County Jail. Two were incarcerated for DWI, two for Possession of Marijuana, one for Public Intoxication and one for warrants from Amarillo.

Deputies investigated a report of a woman hallucinating at a service station on I-40. On arrival, the officer called for an ambulance and the woman was transported to Amarillo for treatment. Deputies received a report of stolen riding lawn mower in Fritch and located the property in Borger. The matter remains under investigation with regards to charges against the person in possession of the property.

Sheriff's deputies responded to a variety of motorist assistance calls and reports of suspicious persons. Deputies and the Texas Highway Patrol investigated a reported onevehicle, non-injury accident on I-40.


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

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

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone 4 on the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Thursday, October 8 at the Gray Co. Courthouse Annex, Pampa, announced Troy Ritter, Chairman of the Board. The election will be held at 7:00 PM.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old or

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone years of age, and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve fouryear terms of office.

Zone 4 of the district includes an area from a line beginning at the northeast corner of Gray County going south along the county line 7 miles, then west along the section line 15 1/2 miles, then north 7 7/8 miles to the county line, then east along the county line back to the northeast corner or Gray County.





## **Public Notice**

Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for optional Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone service, effective March 15, 1993, unless otherwise determined by the PUC.

These proposed rates will not increase or decrease the Company's overall revenues; the net effect will be neutral to the Company's annual revenues.

The Company proposes to decrease the rates for Touch-tone service for residential customers from \$1.00 to 68 cents, and also to reduce the Touch-tone rates for business customers from \$1.75 to \$1.70. In addition, the Touch-tone rates for business PBX trunks will be reduced from \$3.15 to \$2.18.

This proposal to decrease the rates for Touch-tone service does not change the commitment that the Company made in the Docket No. 8585 Stipulation to reduce the rates for Touch-tone service in 1993.

The Custom Calling Services affected by the Company's application are optional telephone service arrangements that provide the following features: Call Waiting, arding, Three Way Calling, Speed Calling-8 and Speed Calling-30. 
It is expected that the restructuring of Custom Calling Features will result in a rate increase for approximately 2.9 million residence customers and 280,000 business customers. The reduction in rates for certain Custom Calling Services and Touch-tone Service will affect approximately 4.3 million residence customers and 1.7 million business customers.

This rate restructuring is expected to have a "revenue-neutral" effect on the Company's annual revenues. 

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# **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has asked the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer new optional call management services called Caller Identification Service (Caller ID) and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR).

Caller ID is a new optional phone service which allows subscribers to see the phone number and/or name of most local calls before they answer the phone. Caller ID also allows the recording of the date, time, name and/or phone number of calls. Currently, Caller ID would work only on most local calls, not long distance calls. It would also require that a separate display unit be connected to the telephone. These units that attach to the telephone will be available from various retail vendors, including Southwestern Bell, at a cost starting at approximately \$50.

Southwestern Bell is also proposing that all customers be able to "block," or stop their name/number from being transmitted and displayed on a Caller ID device, free of charge. You would have this option of "blocking" your name/number on each call free of charge. There would be no need to subscribe to this service. All customers would have this capability when Caller ID is introduced in their area.

If you want to block your name or number, you need only press \*67 on your touch-tone pad (or dial 1167 from a rotary phone) before dialing the telephone number. The person you're calling would see displayed a message such as "private" or "anonymous" on their Caller ID display unit.

Southwestern Bell also proposes that qualified domestic violence and law enforcement groups have the option of free per-line blocking, or free per-call blocking.

Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR or "block the blocker") allows subscribers to automatically reject all calls that have been marked anonymous, or "blocked" by the person calling. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID Name/Number to subscribe to ACR. With ACR, your telephone will not ring if the person calling you has "blocked" his/her name or number. The person calling whose identification is blocked will receive a message to hang up and call back with caller identification unblocked. Following are the proposed monthly rates for Caller ID and ACR.

### McClellan Creek SWCD Election

An election of a soil and water conservation district director to serve in Zone 4 on the McClellan Creek soil and Water conservation District is scheduled for October 8th at the Soil Conservation Service office, announced Aubrey Russell, Chairman of the Board. The election will be held at 10 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil water conservation district director election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in

the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil water conservation

district directors serve fouryear terms of office.

Zone 4 of the district includes an area beginning at a point in the southwest corner of Carson County; thence east along Carson County line to Highway 15; thence north along State Highway 15 to U.S. Highway 60; thence southwest 1 mile along U.S. Highway 60 to the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railroad; thence west along FM Road 293 to Carson County line; thence south along Carson County line to southwest corner of Carson County which is the point of beginning.
