

## **SPS** To Distribute **13 Million In Credits**

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) filed today to distribute \$13 million in credits to its Texas retail customers, primarily representing these customers' share of proceeds from SPS's sales of

**Praised Texas Lawmakers** That step will come in November, when Texas voters decide on a constitutional amendment to allow the state to lend financial backing to a new school bond program that was approved by the Legislature in

> May. SB 951, sponsored by Sen. Bill Haley, will help bring construction funding to school districts at a significantly lower cost to taxpayers by combining local bond issues into one larger, more cost-effective state bond issue, Bullock said.

"Some of our districts don't have the property tax base that other have, and these education bonds will provide extra money to school districts that need it. At the same time, by issuing bonds on a state level rather than on a local level, administrative costs will drop, " Bullock said.

Under the new law, money from the bond sales can only be spent by the school districts on certian items, such as building or renovating classrooms.

The constitutional amendment would allow the state to use the Permanent School Fund to back the stateissued education bonds, which are limited to \$750 million, Bullock said. That fund is already used to guarantee education bonds issued by local school districts.

If the amendment is approved, the state-issued bonds will have the highest rating possible at the lowest cost, since they will be

As a participant in an experimental market program, SPS has been able sell electricity to a to western utilities as far away California on as a competitive basis, said Jerry Diller, SPS's group manager of rates and regulation. Under the program, 75 percent of the difference between the cost of production and the sales price is to go to customers in the SPS service area, Diller said.

"Previously, these sales required time-consuming approvals of individual transactions and a rigid price formula established by Federal Energy the Regulatory Commission, Diller said. "Under the experimental program. utilities are able to buy and sell electricity in what amounts to a daily auction."

The credit also represents proceeds from SPS sales to other utilities made in the traditional regulated manner.

SPS has been successful in the bulk-power market because it is a low-cost producer, Diller said.

Demand has been high because several power plants in the western United States have been out of service for various reasons," Diller said. "Also, hydroelectric power from the Northwest was Pacific limited due to relatively dry conditions."

These circumstances will change, Diller said, so it is difficult to predict if SPS sales at past levels will continue.

SPS filed the requested credit with the Public Utility Commission of Texas

credit would be recognized in August electric bills.

"We also are requesting that the PUCT establish a procedure whereby we can ass on any future credits rom such sales on a periodic basis as they accumulate," Diler said. "Under present **PUCT** procedures this is not possible."

The proceeds from these bulk-power sales to other utilities are treated as a fuel-cost credit. The \$13 million credit requested by SPS included approximately \$2 million in traditional fuel savings resulting from lower costs for coal and natural gas. The credit also includes interest at 11.7 percent.

## **Early Data**

## **Agriculture Census**

Early data from the 1987 Census of Agriculture show that the U.S. had 2,087,759 farms, 1,059,573 of which had annual product sales of \$10,000 or more. Land in farms totaled 964,470,625 acres, 86 percent of them in farms with \$10,000 or more in sales, the Commerce Department's Census Bureau reported.

The census showed that the U.S.'s farmers and ranchers sold \$136 billion in agricultural products and that farms with \$10,000 or more in sales averaged \$125,187 per farm.

Other findings: \$58.9 billion or 43 percent of total agricultural sales were for crops, while \$77.1 billion or 57 percent came from the sale of livestock, poultry and their products.

The agriculture census obtains information on all identified farm and ranch operations in the United State. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place where \$1,00 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold or normally would have been sold during the census year. Sampling is used to collect data for selected items and to account for nonresponding farm operations. Reports for individual

states may be obtained by writing the Information Office, Agriculture Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, or by calling 301-763-1113. The printed reports also are available from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Data on computer tapes and disketts are available from the Census Bureau; call 301-763-4100.





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

selected large cities to verify residential address information and the number of housing units at each address. This operation will end in late June.

Another address check will begin in mid-June and last for about eight weeks. During this period, temporary census workers will visit small cities, towns, suburbs, and rural areas to list residential addresses for these areas.

Finally, a third operation, called Advanced Post Office Check Reconciliation, will be conducted in many small cities, towns, suburbs and rural areas. In this operation census workers go through neighborhoods verifying those addresses that were added or marked as duplicates or undeliverables during an earlier address listing check completed by the U.S. Postal Service. Census employees also will update the address list and check for

any additional living quarters.

All Census Bureau workers will display official red, white and blue identification badges. Residents are asked to cooperate with them. Public cooperation will mean a better, more accurate, and complete address list will be available for the delivery of the 1990 census questionnaires.



Courthouse

Renovating the Carson County Courthouse to make to handicap accessible has been a thorn in the side of commissioners for several years. Since the County has received revenue sharing funds, this project is required by the federal government.

The County's application for a PRPC grant to help fund the renovation has been rejected for three consecutive years. Therefore, today's commissioners Court is eyeing how the job can be done to comply with regulations and at the same time be done in the most economical way.

John Ward of Ward, Brown and Associates, an architectural firm, met with the commissioners Monday to review those plans and discuss changes that would need to be made to modify the original plans. Mr. Ward was asked to meet with the Court again on July 11 with an updated estimate of costs so the County can decide on the best possible avenue to take toward the completion of the project. Earlier in Monday's session, the Court approved a \$846 amendment to the Sheriff's Department budget to complete the purchase of new uniforms.
