## NOTICES OF APPRAISED VALUE TO BE

 SENT TO PROPERTY OWNERSState law requires county appraisal districts to notify property owners about changes in their property's value. Around May 15, the Carson County Appraisal District will mail property owners letters showing their 2005 proposed appraised value.

Donita Davis, chief appraiser of the district, reminds property owners that the letter of appraised value is not a tax bill.

Davis emphasized the importance of this letter and the key information that it contains. "If an informal agreement cannot be made with the appraisal district, the property owner has the right to appeal to the Carson County Appraisal Review Board on any disagreement with the property's value, exemptions, ownership, and other areas," she said. The notice includes instructions on how and when to file a protest and a protest form.

What should a property owner carefully review? "Look at the proposed value for 2005," Davis said. "The letter states the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year." The letter also inchudes current year information on exemptions granted on the property. It provides last year's value, also.

Letters to property owners will also include "estimated" taxes. These taxes are based on the new taxable value and the taxing unit's tax rate from the prior year. Final tax amounts may vary from the "estimated" amounts.

Davis asks property owners to check the legal description and mailing address to be sure there are no mistakes. "If the letter has an old address, please let the appraisal district know. The post office forwards mail to a new address for a short time, and tax bills do not go out until October," Davis added.

A property owner is responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address, and is also liable for additional penalties and interest on a tax bill that is not paid on time.

Property owners are encouraged to contact the appraisal district with any questions. Please call the appraisal district at 806-537-3569.

## PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your property
- the unequal appraical of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that apphes to and adversely affected you


## Informal Review

For an informal review of the property owner's property, contact the Carson County Appraisal District at 102 S Main or call 806-537-3569.

Review by the Appraissl review Board
If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB)

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve probiems. If you file a written reques for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the Carson County Appraisal District at 102 S Main, PO Box 970. Panhandle, TX, 79068, or by calling 806-5373569

Note: You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by cenified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order

## Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

## DEADLINE FOR FLLING PROTESTS

WITH THE ARB

## Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deaclire for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

## Special deadlises

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the $30^{\text {n }}$ day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes ( the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the $30^{\text {on }}$ day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether a required notice was mailed to you.

Saturday On \$2.6 metillon Bond Indebteeness

The voters of the Claude Independent School District will go to the polls on Saturday, May 7, 2005 to vote on, among other things, a 2.6 million dollar bond issue. The estimated breakdown of the proposed funds will include a gymnasium with a price tag
classrooms for $\$ 200,000$; site improvements $\$ 200,000$ and 4 more classrooms and a science lab for another $\$ 600,000$.

Public meetings and some written discussion have brought the issue to the attention of Claude voters. Superintendent Wood weekly column in The Claude News has offered the technical information concerning how the money will be raised and what it will cost property owners, and what the funds will do for the betterment of the school system. These discussions have brought to light various opinions for voters.

The Claude ISD tax rate is currently $\$ 1.360$ per $\$ 100$ valuation. But the proposed bond, if passed, will raise $\$ 2.6$ miltion dollars. It will be repaid at a interest rate of $5.65 \%$ over a 30 year period as an increase in the tax those living in the Claude ISD School District would pay.. This would increase the rate that property owners pay to $\$ 1.50 \%$ per $\$ 100$ valuation, according to school officials. Claude
ISD had enjoyed the lower rate for many years, when most neighboring school districts have had their tax rates maxed out at the $\$ 1.50$ rate.
