

Homeowners Need To Apply For Exemption

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Many eligible property and mobile home owners have not applied for exemptions that can lower taxable values. The homestead exemption is a ONE-TIME application. home or mobile home must be your principal place of residence. A convalescent home resident who owns a home is eligible if she/he has every intention of returning to that home, even if the house is being rented out at the time of application.

The homestead exemption also applies to mobile home owners. One does NOT have to own the land where the mobile home is located in order to be eligible for this exemption.

The following types of exemptions are available to property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District:

General Homestead

Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption for assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-tomarket roads or flood control. The county and school district may also offer up to 20% exemption of the remaining value of the homestead for 1995. This is a local option exemption.

Persons 65 Or Older

Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owing in any one year on house and yard cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979, or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later.

Persons 65 Or Older **Installment** Payment

Those individuals who are at least 65 years of age may pay at least one-fourth of a taxing units taxes imposed on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead, before the February 1 delinquency

date, and then pay the remaining taxes without penalty or interest in three equal installments. The first installment must be paid before April 1, the second installment before June 1, and the third installment before August 1.

Disability Exemption

Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only.

A property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly. Or

Disabled Veteran Qualifying Survivor

Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount depends on the percentage of service-connected disability. Documents verifying disability are required. Agricultural-Use

Land which is being utilized for agricultural purpose may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified land owners hold the option of having an agricultural or open space land valuation applied to their property.

If you have any questions about eligibility or you are just curious as to whether you have already applied for the exemption, please give the Appraisal District office a call at 537-3569 or go by the office at 102 Main Street in Panhandle.

Deadline for filing any of these exemptions is May 1, 1995.





Soil Conservation To Change Name

The U.S. Department of A griculture's Soil Conservation Service has had a name change to the N a tural Resources Conservation Service. The new agency was authorized as part of the USDA's reorganization in October by Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy.

"Our new name more accurately reflects what we do," said Paul W. Johnson, chief of the Natural Resources Conservation S e r v i c e. "Our responsibilities go further than soil conservation. They have for some time."

While the agency has focused on soil conservation for the past 60 years, it has also been the key federal agency to offer technical help on private lands for improvements to water, wildlife habitat, forest lands, grasslands and other resources connected to the land. More recently, the agency has worked with the nation's private landowners to increase acreage of grasslands, wetlands and forest lands through USDA programs.

More than two-thirds of the land in this country is privately owned. Those private landowners are the key to our environmental well-being," Johnson said. "We will continue to build on our 60 years of experience with a unique relationship between the federal government and those landowners, as well as our partnership with local conservation distircts," Johnson added.

The new Natural Resources Conservation Service will continue to have responsibility for all the programs of the former Soil Conservation Service. In addition, several other programs have been transferred to it: the Wetlands Reserve Program, the Water Bank Program, the Forestry Incentives Program, the Colorado River Salinity Control Program, and the Farms for the Future Program.

The Natural Resources Conservation Service will increasingly look at all resources on private lands as its resource conservationists help private landowners on a voluntary basis. "We will continue to be the American people's

The U.S. Department of land. But we think of land griculture's Soil itself as a core constituent.

> Land with a capital "L" -to go beyond the soil resource," Johnson said. "What's done on our vast acreage of private lands encompasses so much more -- our water, our forest lands, our wildlife, our air and our quality of life."




store until 1960. He had been a merchant, cattleman and an independent oil and gas producer.
