ARE YOU READY- to do business in the year 2000?

The year 2000 problem will affect many business-essentially any business or entity using a computer system. your computer will not work properly after December 31, 1999.

The year 2000 may seem to be a long time away, but it will be here in less than two years. Now is the time to consider whether your computer hardware and software is year 2000 ready.

The Problem: Two-Digit vs. Four-Digit Years

For years programmers were able to save storage and computer processor cycles by using the last two digits of the year date. The century was ftware and databases support four-digit year dates rather than two-digit year dates, and as a result, many systems are incapable of supporting the century change.

and why is it so important?

Computers and related software used in all types of businesses rely on dates and date processing. If the computer does not recognize that one date is greater than another, the computer may not be able to process properly and could produce erroneous results. If a computer (and/or software) does not store the century digits, then year 1999 is stored as 99, year 2000 is stored as 00, year 2001 as 01. etc. This becomes a major problem for programs that must subtract one date from another to determine the number of years between dates. For example if you subtract 98 from 05 you get - 93 years rather than 7 years. This problem may put a business at risk because it can affect its cash flow, inventory, taxes, interest calculations, financial forecasting, customer relations, accounts receivable, accounts payable and many other areas.

How big a problem?

This worldwide problem not only affects computers and their programs, but also every piece of hardware that contains a microchip, including:

Manufacturing control systems Telecommunications Money transfer and other financial systems Gas, water, and electrical utilities Stock Markets

National Defense Home Computers, Security Systems Home Computers, Security Systems Farm Sprinklers

ANY OBJECT THAT IS DATE SENSITIVE IS AT RISK

Beyond your own business computer systems, the problem may affect you through the "business supply chain." You buy goods and services from some businesses and you sell goods and services to others. If your trading partners fail, your cash flow can suffer critically.

SOME QUESTIONS TO HELP ASSESS SYSTEM READINESS

1. Can the system perform projections through time? For example, can it calculate interest or payments or make inventory projections?

Does the system allow for entering dates? If yes, is the year 2 or 4 digits? What happens if you enter "00" or "01"?

3. Will the system operate differently depending on the day of the week? Will it operate differently at month-end, quarter-end, or vear-end?

4. Can the system put things in order by date?

Does the system allow you to retrieve things by date?

Can the system perform date-based calculations?



Freedom To Farm Act Looked At By Farm Bureau

Responding to dismal economic conditions in agriculture, delegates at American Bureau Federation convention here recognized the need to recognized the need to reexamine the three year old "Freedom to Farm Act" at the organization's 80th annual convention recently.

Texas Farm Bureau Texas Farm Bureau delegates, led by TFB President Bob Stallman, supported the motion, which placed the nation's largest farm organization on record in favor of a second look at the FAIR Act also known as the FAIR and the second look at the FAIR act also known as the second look at the se Act, also known as "Freedom to Farm."

Stallman stepped forward during the debate, praising certain aspects of the FAIR Act, stepped of the stressing the serious farm families. He helped farm families. He helped forge a coalition of Southern and Midwest states to put Farm Bureau clout behind a reexamination of the current farm law. Stallman and other delegates recounted examples of a deepening delegates recounted examples of a deepening farm crisis in the U.S.

The resolution said, in part, "AFBF will seek a complete reexamination of the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 (FAIR Act), to assure that adequate economic and natural disaster assistance is available."

The AFBF delegates, including those from Texas, rejected a return to the supply management programs of past farm bills.

"There is a lot we like about the FAIR Act," Stallman said, "The

problem is that promises were made when we agreed to support it. We were promised expanded trade and an easing of the enormous regulatory burden on agriculture. Unfortunately, the opposite has happened.

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

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Dear Ms. Burton: As an educator, I could not have been could not have been more appalled than when I received the news that a teacher/counselor in your school system had been re-suspended for the spring semester. I watched quietly in the fall when the events began to unfold, thinking that this could not this could not pen to a fellow cator, that a school board could not be so unethical, and that with time and investigation into the truth, that this matter would be resolved.

In the fall, I In the fall, I encouraged Miss Addy to stand on her beliefs, but not before I investigated charges of breaking of not before I investigated the charges of breaking of confidentially of TAAS by releasing to teachers the names of students who need to retake the test via a visiter. written memo. I teach in a large school district in Texas; our school advises teachers via a written memo in our faculty boxes of students who need to retake the TAAS. It serves three purposes: (I) alerts us to those who need special encouragement or

last name and classification and test section to administered; and, (3) allows us to adjust our absentee markings. When I related Miss Addy's suspension to our administration, the guidelines regarding TAAS were reviewed; I was told: 'the intent of

guideline of confidentiality is to insure that names of students are released by professionals professionals to facilitate the best testing situation for each student. Knowledge of released names may not be used to hinder a student. to hinder a student's performance or adversely affect his/her score on the test'. I called fellow educators and asked how they were notified of students who needed to be released for retesting of TAAS; without exception, each received a written memo listing student names. Our counselors and others in the state are not observed. the state are not charged with breaking of confidentially; how can Miss Addy be?

In our school system, as well as many

well as many esses, due process is a major concern when job-related behaviors are not acceptable. I doubt not acceptable. many people would work for a business that

suddenly decides to punish a person for performing a job in the same way that he/she has ed that job for If an employer years. If an employer wants the job done differently, the employee is advised, usually in writing. If an employee is not performing the job according to standards, according to standards, that employee is usually warned, even retrained if necessary for situation. If the the employee still does not perform the task according to instructions, due process has already ome form punishment. begun for termination or some form of punishment. But, no smart business person would terminate duties of

long-term employee without due process, not if he valued his reputation, his employees' morale, and wanted to be able to afford his liability insurance. Where was due process followed in Miss Addy's suspension?

People in larger cities often look the other way when someone needs help; we hear it on the news, and wonder why or how this could happen. It happens because someone thought that another person would take care of it. Having taught in several smaller districts during my thirty. districts during my thirtyschools, I know one of the greatest gifts from a small-town environment is the caring atmosphere is a priceless commodity that allows people to live and grow in one of the best best

environments available.

As Plutarch said: "No one ever wetted clay and left it, as if there would be bricks by chance and fortune." Don't expect fortune." Don't expect someone else to resolve what happened in your school system. Pick up the phone and call someone you know that teaches students who are required to take the TAAS; ask him or her how they are notified. Question how a school, which is a business, has the right to ignore due process, even when was labeled 'an in-hous decision'. And when it And. question, specifically, how prospective new teachers prospective new teachers
to your system will view
Groom's teaching
community when they
learn how a nineteenyear term teacher was
treated.

Carson County **Farmers Increase** Efficiency

Many farmers area are starting to realize that in order to succeed in the post Freedom to Farm world, they must increase their efficiency; i.e. become the least cost producer. the least cost producer. Carson County farmers wanting to become the wanting to become the least cost producer are turning to a South Dakota farmer for the key. The key to becoming more efficient according to Dwayne Beck, the manager for the farmer owned Dakota Lakes Research Station in Lakes Research Station in Pierre, S.D., is to diversify and intensify farming operations. The name of the game is to store enough soil store
moisture to
different crops, diversity,
a grow them with
intensity.

and grow them with more frequency, intensity. The theory behind traditional summer fallow is to keep the soil cracks closed, thus keeping soil moisture from wassesting. That is also evaporating. That is also the reason farmers work ground during the season, to protect their moisture. One problem though traditional farming methods in normal years only save enough moisture to grow summer However, Beck has found that by leaving the crop residue in a low-disturbance no-till system keeps the cracks closed too. "It covers them up, lets the water go down and doesn't let it come back up."

Rotations have been key component to Beck's system; "the key word is diversity."

Diversity enables them to use their

equipment and labor "so more efficiently," Beck. "We harvest says Beck. from the first of July to last week November; we seed from the last week of March the second week growing so many erent crops. With different crops. such a variety of crops, there have not been too many years everything goes bad; sometimes everything hits, but that is rare, also." By spreading out " By spreading out workload and risk, some crop is working all the time. The use of a variety of crops also keeps both diseases and weeds better under control, increasing both


