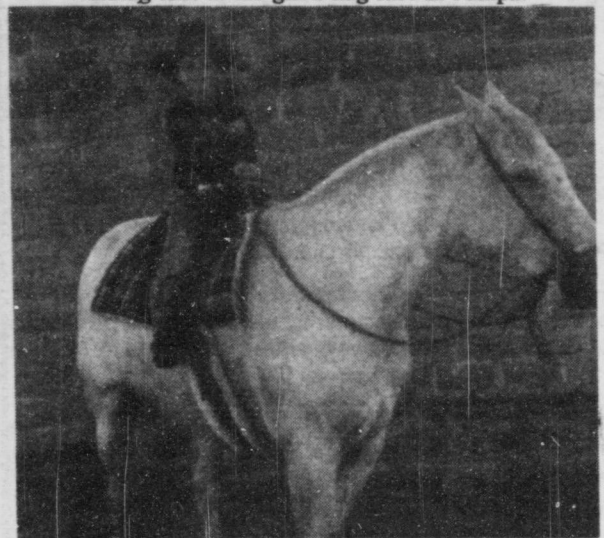
## Groom Day Bar-B-Que Serving 11:30-1:30

## WT Offers Cult Seminar

West Texas State University will offer a seminar on cults and ritualistic crimes from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, August 2. The seminar is open to educators, judges, law enforcement officers, social service workers and other interested community service personnel.

Workshop topics include freedom of religion, destructive religious cults, ritualistic abuse of children, Afro-Caribbean religions, heavy metal music, satanism and profile of a victim participant.

An abbreviated presentation is designed for parents is scheduled from 7-9 p.m. Thursday, August 3 in the Mary Moody Northern Hall on the WTSU campus. Admission to the program is \$2.00 and may be paid at the door.

"The purpose of the seminar is to educate people on the potential problems their children may face because of cult involvement," Melanie Kritser, program coordinator, said. "It is not intended to cause a panic situation but, like drugs and alcohol, is something we can't ignore."

Seminar presenters are Detective Corporal L.D. Adair, Detective T.W. Fahrlander and Detective Corporal E.A. Randleman. All three work in the detective division, juvenile section of the Lubbock Police Department and have at least 12 years of law enforcement experience.

It is estimated that as many as 3,000 cults exist in the United States and that cult membership totals three million Americans. Children and young adults are becoming increasingly involved even in small communities making it more important than ever to recognize evidence of cult participation, mind control and recruiting tactics.

Individuals interested in attending the parents' program are welcomed at the door, however, preregistration is encouraged for those wishing to attend the August 2 one day seminar and the August 2-4 school. 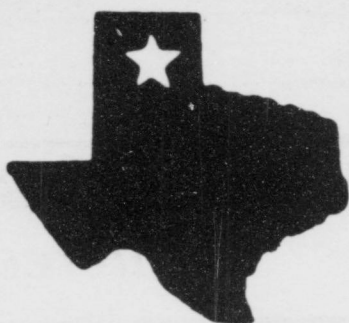

## Notice Of Public Hearing On Tax Increase

The Groom Independent School District will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1988 by 25.0288 percent. Your individual taxes may increase or decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of all other property.

The public hearing will be held on August 3, 1989, at 8:00 P.M. at the administrative offices of the School at 304 West Third Street, Groom, Texas.

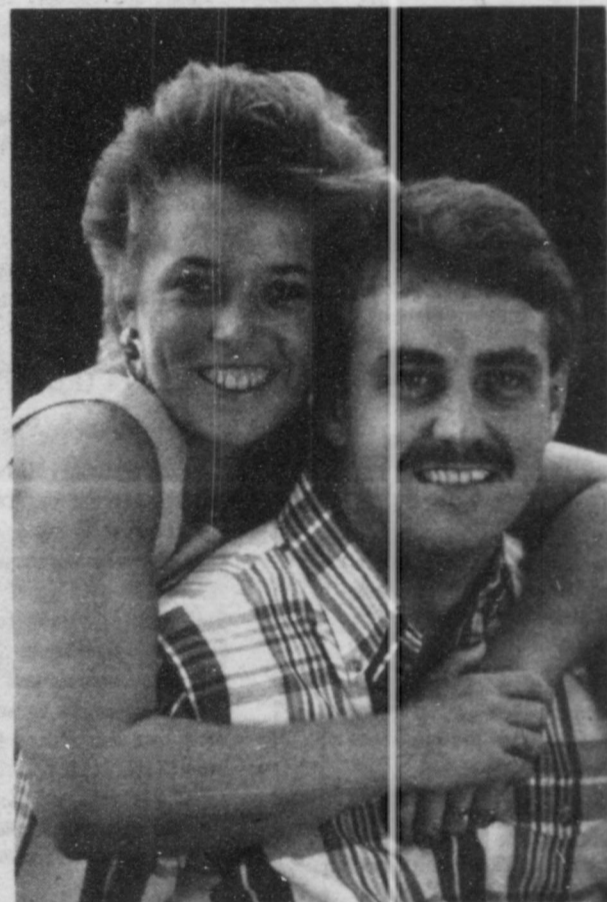

## McLean Temp Hits 100 Mark

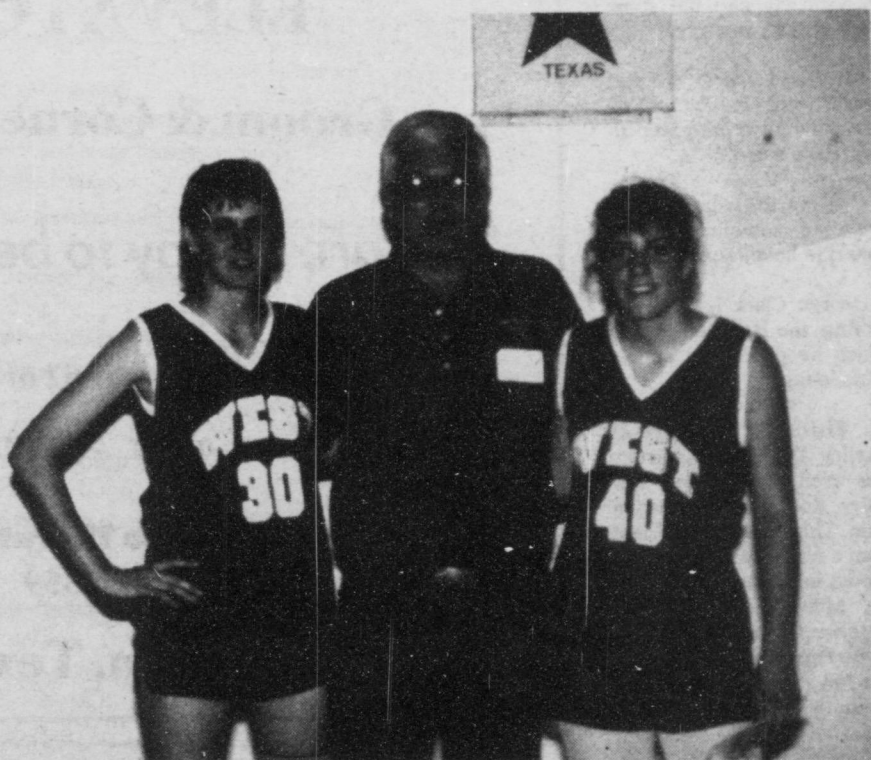

Jerry Don Cook will serve as principal for the McLean High School, he was the elementary principal this past year. The board approved Peeples recommendation with the approval of both personal.

Due to a termite problem, the board authorized Peeples to employ a qualified firm for termite control.

With the board approval Peeples can now accept resignations on behalf of McLean ISD.

Teachers salaries were an item on the agenda as the board proposed to pay teachers with a bachelor's degree \$700 above state and teachers with a master's degree \$800 above state and to remove the 2 percent and 3 percent above base pay from the schedule.

A general discussion concerning the role of the superintendent and preliminary goals for the school were also discussed. Among some of the areas of concern mentioned were; methods that could be used to raise ACT scores, development of a broad P.E. program, more involvement in scholastic UIL activities, pride in academic excellence, a means of recognizing students talents.

An injury which occurred in a physical education class during the school year was discussed, but no action was taken.

Mrs. Sue Simmons presented four proposed plans for employee health insurance for 1989-90 to the

board. She explained that the four plans had been selected by the insurance committee from all plans that were received. A motion was made by Steve Brass, that the school will pay up to \$92.00 per month per employee on employee health insurance, and that the employees vote to choose the plan they prefer. The motion carried with Thacker Haynes abstaining.

The financial statement and tax assessor's report were approved. It was brought to the attention of the board that the yearbook fund has a deficit of approximately \$500.00. The board voted to pay the deficit.

The board approved payment of association fees for administrators.

Bids were opened by the board for supplies to be used during the 1989-90 school year. Nash Oil Co. supply fuel for the school this year at 96 cents per gallon. Price is subject to change without notice. Nash Oil Co. was the only company that submitted a bid. Preston Dairy will supply dairy products, Rainbow Baking will supply bread goods. Rainbow was among two companies that presented bids. Mrs. Baird's Bakeries also presented a bid to the school.

Orin Exterminating, Diamond G. Pest Control and Cavelys Pest Control submitted bids for pest control. The lowest bidder Diamond G. Pest Control will supply their service to the school at \$72 per month.

Amarillo Linen and Industrial Service, Western Uniform and Towel Service and Mission Uniform and Linen submitted bids for mops and uniform. The board accepted the bid from Mission Uniform and Linen at \$7.20 a week.

Nine bids were received for a copy machine for the elementary school. The lowest bid was presented by Unacopy in the amount of \$3,132.25 for the Mita Model DC 3255 copier. The board voted unanimously to approve the purchase.



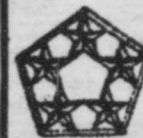
