## Snow Multiplies Accidents

Well its been another week of accidents. The first occurred on 1-14-97 at 12:55 a.m. seven miles east of Groom on IH-40. A Ford Ranger pickup driven by Paul Anthon Gaebel of Weatherford, Texas was westbound on IH-40. The pickup ran off the road and hit a concrete bridge pillar at the Pampa overpass. Mr. Gaebel was pinned in his vehicle for over 30 minutes and had to be freed by the jaws of life. The Groom and McLean Fire Departments worked to free the man. Gaebel was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in critical condition. Alcohol was a factor in this accident as the roads were clear at the time of the accident. Trooper Chris Ray from Panhandle worked the accident and was assisted by Trooper's Jeremy Wallace from Groom and Ronald Shank from McLean. DWI charges are pending on this accident.

On the same day at 10:30 p.m., we had freezing rain hit the Groom area. It

started about the 109 mile marker and ended in the McLean area. I was called out at 10:40 p.m. to work an accident at the 113 mile marker. A truck jackknifed and slid down the embankment, but never turned over. After working that, I then went to the 112 mile marker where a car hit one of the large road signs. A Jessica Warbritton of West LaFayette, IN. was eastbound on IH-40 where she lost control of a 1992 Chevrolet Baretta. She slid off the embankment and knocked down the Groom Exit sign. There were truck wrecks at the 124, 139 and 140 mile markers on IH-40. Troopers from Pampa and McLean worked these accidents.

On 1-18-97, troopers arrested a Panhandle man south of Panhandle on TX-207. He was placed in jail at the Sheriff's Department. And as always happens, this is not his first. This is not a social problem, this is a criminal act. People are injured and killed every year on our roads in this state.

Just last week in Amarillo, a man hit a light post and killed his wife in the accident. He was charged with Intoxication Manslaughter which carries a 20 year prison sentence. Can you imagine going out and drinking, having an accident, killing someone you love or somebody you don't even know. I can't and I don't think anyone else can either. But this happens every day and night in Texas. When you consider how big our state is, how many miles of roads we have and that we are the second most populous state in the country. We have over 3500 fatalities a year and at least half are alcohol related. What's the difference in taking a gun or club to someone, they're just as dead. So the next time you're driving down the road with your family on a Friday or Saturday night and you meet someone weaving, bright headlights on, or worse on I-40, they're driving in your lane, they may be drunk. Till next week be safe.

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## Drivers License Renewal Requires Soc. Sec. #

The Texas Department of Public Safety will require drivers to furnish their social security number in order to process their driver license application or renewal beginning January 1, 1997. The DPS announced recently.

The Texas transportation code requires the DPS to collect the social security number of any person who applies for a driver license in this state. "The law has been in effect since 1993 and we have been collecting the number on a voluntary basis," said Jimmy Tillinghast, driver license captain, Lubbock. "However, to be in compliance with state law, we will require this information after January 1, 1997."

Tillinghast also stated that proper documentation of the number will be necessary. Acceptable documentation would include your social security card, payroll or employment records, income tax documents and certain identification cards where the social security number is used and proper identification can be made. Facsimiles and employer lists will not suffice. "Without proper documentation of the number, no license will be issued," Tillinghast said.

While state and federal law allows for the use of social security numbers for driver licensing purposes, driver license personnel will not require the number for

department issued identification cards. They will continue to request the number on a voluntary basis in those instances.

"Hopefully, by getting this information out, the public can avoid unnecessary delays by having the proper documentation in hand when they walk through the door," Tillinghast said.

Many eligible property and mobile home owners have not applied for exemptions that can lower taxable values. The homestead exemption is a ONE-TIME application. However, if you have changed your place of residence within the past year, you must reapply for the exemption, you must own or be buying the home on January 1, 1997. The home or mobile home must be your principal place of residence. A convalescent home resident who owns a home is eligible if she/he has every intention of returning to that home, even if the house is being rented out at the time of application.

The homestead exemption also applies to mobile home owners. One does NOT have to own the land where the mobile home is located in order to be eligible for this exemption.

The following types of exemptions are available to property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District:

#### GENERAL HOMESTEAD

Those persons qualifying for a residence homestead are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. An additional \$3,000 county homestead exemption for assessed value is available against the portion of the county tax rate for farm-to-market roads or flood control. The county and school district may also offer up to 20% exemption of the remaining value of the homestead for 1997. This is a local option exemption.

#### PERSONS 65 OR OLDER

Elderly citizens are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the market value of their residence homestead for school taxes. And, while an elderly citizen's property may increase in value through the years, the school taxes owing in any one year on house and yard cannot be greater than the amount owed in 1979, or in the first year the property owner qualified for the exemption, whichever is later.

#### PERSONS 65 OR OLDER INSTALLMENT PAYMENT

Those individuals who are at least 65 years of age may pay at least one-fourth of a taxing unit's taxes imposed on property that the person owns and occupies as a residence homestead, before the February 1 delinquency date, and then pay the remaining taxes without penalty or interest in three equal installments. The first installment must be paid before April 1, the second installment before June 1, and the third installment before August 1.

#### DISABILITY EXEMPTION

Citizens who are totally disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the market value of their residence homestead. This exemption applies to school taxes only. A property owner may not receive both the disability exemption and the \$10,000 exemption for the elderly.

#### DISABLED VETERAN OR QUALIFYING SURVIVOR

Certain disabled veterans or their survivors may be entitled to an exemption ranging from \$5,000 to \$12,000 from the assessed value of any property they own. The amount depends on the percentage of service-connected disability. Documents verifying disability are required.

#### AGRICULTURAL-USE

Land which is being utilized for agricultural purpose may be eligible for tax relief. Qualified land owners hold the option of having an agricultural or open space land valuation applied to their property.

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### ASCS To Switch To EFT

The Debt Collection Improvement act (DICA) of 1996 mandates that Federal payment to a recipient who becomes first eligible for that type of payment after July 25, 1996, will be made by electronic funds transfer (EFT). The act further requires that all federal payments made after January 1, 1999, will be made by EFT.]

Producers entering a new program contract after July

25, 1996, will be required to complete an SF1199A direct deposit form, in order to receive payments for that program unless the payee provides written verification that they do not have an account with any financial institution. These forms may be obtained from the ASCS office. Producers who would like to begin EFT now should complete these forms now.

#### Information Available To The Public

The Freedom of Information Act which established the guidelines the ASCS office follows in regard to releasing information to the public has recently been clarified. Under the revised rule, a producer can always obtain any information regarding their farming operation and can authorize the ASCS

office to release that information to others. However, without the consent of the producer, the ASCS office can no longer release information such as farm numbers, specific crops and acreages on a farm, names, addresses, identification numbers, or payments issued to be issued to a specific producer. Therefore, any individual needing information on a producer on their farm should contact the producer to obtain the information or have the producer call the office to authorize the release of the information.

#### CRP Information

Those producers who took advantage of the extended grazing period need to go to the ASCS office and final certify acreages and livestock numbers.



## Sharps Celebrate 60th

On Jan. 9, 1937, Wanda Geneva Blaylock, 20, became the bride of Arnold Sam Sharp, 21. Parents of the couple were Lafaeite McDuffy and Katie Louella McGuire Blaylock, and Sam Edwin and Sherita Shell Fitzwater Sharp. Both were from McLean.

The wedding was in Wheeler, Texas (for reasons long forgotten, but perhaps because there was no waiting period). Traveling in a model A Ford coupe, they were accompanied by a friend and Arnold's sister, Relia, it was cold and snowy.

After spending the night at Wanda's older sister's home, Helen Mann, they prepared to move to their new home at the Taylor Ranch, near Alareed. Being the depression and Wanda not having a "Hope Chest", the newlyweds stopped to buy a set of sheets. Wanda had just quit her job as waitress for J.A. Meador. She was to become the new ranch cook and Arnold a ranch cowboy. Having grown up the second oldest of 9 children, Wanda was used to cooking, but she was nervous about cooking on a wood stove and a hungry bunch of cowboys.

Arnold drove out the ranch truck and Wanda drove out the Ford coupe. With no real roads or highways, she was in fear of driving off into a

canyon or getting stuck in a creek bed. However, they arrived with no real mishaps, at least on this trip. Their new home was the cooks shack. There was a bedroom, dining room and kitchen. The first night, Arnold, who never met anyone he couldn't visit with, sat in the kitchen with the cowboys until very late. Wanda waited in the bedroom getting madder and madder. She was wearing English styled riding pants and tall, tight leather riding boots that she couldn't remove without help. Too embarrassed to call her new husband to the bedroom to ask for help, she sat for hours with swelling feet and a growing temper.

Wanda prepared breakfast the very next morning. All meals were prepared from scratch, and were mostly variations of beef, potatoes, beans, biscuits and gravy. Any fresh vegetables or fruits, the cook had to buy herself. Beef was butchered on the ranch and Arnold cut off whatever Wanda needed to prepare the meal. A young nephew, junior Mann, often stayed at the ranch with them. When he saw the hanging beef, he asked what it was. Arnold also milked, chopped wood and got up to build the fire in the cook stove.

Their salary was \$40.00 per month. A hitch occurred early

in the marriage when Arnold spent a whole month pay on a big black cowboy hat. It must have been a good hat, for it is still in the family. Wanda, however, was not at all happy about working for a whole month, for something that she couldn't wear.

In the early years they worked for the Taylor Ranch on and off and once for an isolated gas station and cafe in the Davis Mountains. WWII brought news of work on the West Coast. Arnold went ahead and got a job at a shipyard. Wanda soon followed on the longest train ride of her life. Their first child, Peggy, was born while they lived at Vancouver, Washington in 1943.

When Peggy was 10 months old, they returned to McLean and Arnold joined the Navy. He was stationed in San Diego and was assigned to drive Liberty buses and staff cars. He was away for 2 years. Wanda and Peggy stayed in McLean where the Blaylock and Sharp families lived. Like everyone else during these times, they worried about rationing and men going off to war.

When Arnold returned home, he found work at local service stations until he was finally hired by Warren Petroleum. He recalled his starting wage was 75¢ per hour, quite a lot of money, in those days. When Peggy was 4, the family grew with the addition of a son, Val. Their two room house was enlarged by a bedroom and a bathroom. They also acquired a collie, Lassie, who quickly learned to drag Val back into the yard by his diaper when he tried to escape. Neither child could be spanked in Lassie's presence. of cattle, and Val could have a horse and finally get out of the yard without Lassie coming after him.

Wanda went to work for Marie Foundations. She began as a cutter, trained as a pattern maker and was assistant supervisor to Avalee Crockett. She retired after 19 years. Both of the Sharp children graduated from McLean High School. Peggy married Gary Gordin in 1963. They had two children, Tracy Lyle, in 1964

and Val Marie in 1967.

Val enlisted in the Army in 1965 and became a paratrooper with the 173rd Airborne. He was wounded several times in Viet Nam and left a field hospital to lead his patrol as point-man. He was fatally wounded by a sniper at Dac To, South Viet Nam and awarded the Purple Heart, posthumously.

Wanda and Arnold moved back into town in 1976. He retired from Warren Petroleum in 1973 and began working for the McLean Feed Lot as night watchman. About this time, their son-in-law was critically injured and they stepped in to help raise the grandchildren, periodically for the next two years. They managed very well, although Arnold never got the knack of fixing Val Marie's long curly hair.

After their retirement, they bought the first of several travel trailers and enjoyed seeing the states. They are longtime members of the First Baptist Church and enjoy doing volunteer work for the Devil's Rope Museum. Arnold owned and rode his last horse, "Punkin" till he was in his late 70's. He taught the grandchildren to ride, handle guns, and drive. Wanda is known as a great cook and enjoys sewing for all the girls in the family. They have made hundreds of trips to attend any event connected with their grandchildren and later their great grandchildren. They saw to it that their grandchildren had bikes and later cars and experienced numerous things that they would have never known except for Grandpa and Grandpa.

Arnold has not been in the best of health for the last three years. Their 60th anniversary was spent with him as a patient at Integrated Health Service in Amarillo. They were served a private candle light dinner. As she had been for 60 years, Wanda is with Arnold every day.

When asked how they met, Wanda said that she had known him since the Blaylocks moved to McLean in 1928. She laughed and said, "I should have known better, but I married him anyway!"

Their family and friends wish them good health and many more years together.

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
