## **County Position Filings Begin December 3 For Open Seats**

December 3rd is the first day to file for candidates for several county offices. Positions to be voted on are Tax Assessor-Collector, currently held by Roselyn Watson; Sheriff, now held by Terry Timmons; two County Commissioner places held by Mike Britten and Jerry Strawn; and County Attorney, currently Ed Hinshaw; District Judge, which is now John Forbis and District Attorney, now

Filing fees for the county offices is \$600.00. Potential candidates can get a percentage of voters to sign. a petition in lieu of the filing fee. The county clerk can give more information on this procedure. Offices for District Judge and District Attorney have a more expensive filing fee. Interested parties can also contact the county clerk for more information.

Salaries for the local offices are as follows: Tax

Assessor Collector, \$26,794.00; Sheriff, \$26,794.00; Commissioner, \$21,857.00 and a \$3,600.00 annual car allowance; the County Attorney, \$26,794.00. The District Attorney and District Judge are paid by the state.

Again, the filing opens December 3rd and closes January 2nd. The primary election will be held March 1st and the final election on November 3rd

#### Sales Tax Rebate Running Ahead Of Last Year

"Local sales tax rebates to Texas cities and counties are running \$123 million or 10.6 percent ahead of total state Comptroller John Sharp said.

"That's real money that's going into city and county treasuries for vital services to local residents," Sharp

The city of Groom received a 9.27 percent increase in sales tax rebates, from this period last year, netting \$2,295.97 for the Payments to date totaled \$22,997.14, making the yearly total down slightly from 1990.



## 4th Graders Go Back To November, 1910

The fourth grade class of McLean spent a day in Cheyenne Okla. at the Rolls One-Room School depicting a day, November 12, 1910. Arriving in Cheyenne we walked to school carrying our lunches in tin pails. When the bell rang the girls and the boys lined up by height. Girls went to one side of the room hanging up their cloaks and placing lunch pails below them. Then the boys entered the room hanging up their cloaks at the back, placing their lunch pails beneath and sat on the opposite side of the room.

The first lesson was writing. The scholars used a quill pen and ink to write their 1910 writing booklets which had been prepared for them. During the math lesson scholars were divided into two groups. They orally and mentally ciphered their problems, sitting when they missed one. While Mrs. Skipper worked with half the scholars reading from the McGuffy readers, the other half of the scholars wrote spelling words on their slates, and Mrs. Tracy



graded the writing booklets. At noon, after washing their hands with lye soap, the scholars were dismissed to eat their 1910 type meals of biscuit, egg and bacon, or peanut butter sandwiches made from homemade bread or hard boiled eggs, fruit and water dipped from the bucket which they poured into tin or enamel cups.

Two scholars had been sent earlier to pump the water.

As the scholars finished their lunches, they played games such as drop the handkerchief, walk on stilts, roll rings along the road with sticks, marbles, and jump rope.

At 12:45 the scholars returned to the room for a history lesson on early McLean, Texas, and Oklahoma. The day concluded with a spelling bee covering the words written earlier in the day.

We arrived back in McLean around 3:15 ready to return to November 12, 1991. All the scholars and parents accompanying them really had an enjoyable day





#### **Businesslike Approach To Lottery**

want a fun and efficient state lottery up and running by July 1, and that's just exactly what we're going to

give them," State Comptroller John Sharp

Sharp said the Comptroller's new Lottery Division is moving quickly to implement the voters' decisive choice in Tuesday's constitutional referendum. His timetable calls for the hiring of a lottery director December 1. licensing of ticket vendors, the hiring of additional personnel and the establishment of regional prize claim centers will take place throughout the spring.

Sharp pledged to take a businesslike approach to running the state games. "We will not run it like just another state agency program, because it isn't one," he said.

"The lottery is an operation the size of a Fortune 500 company. We project first-year sales of nearly \$1 billion, equivalent to a corporation as big as Texas Instruments. have no choice but to run it like a business."

"By July 1, Texas will have its first home-grown lottery winners playing the scratch-off, instant-winner games," he said. "Within another six months, we hope to start phase two of the lottery. These are the so-called on-line games, such as Lotto, where players pick their own winning

"By Aug. 31, 1993, the end of the current two-year budget cycle, here's what will have happened: more than \$1.2 billion in tickets sold; more than \$550 million in prizes awarded; and, most important, \$461 million in state revenue

"We will make that happen. The Texas Lottery will be on time and on target."

The Comptroller's Lottery Division, with just 186 extremely lean operation," Sharp said. "We expect to contract out for much of

our sales force, much of our telecommunications project and much of our computer

"In fact, the most important task for much of our staff will be the strict supervision of these outside companies. This approach will save us money and prevent us from building yet another state bureaucracy."

The Legislature appropriated \$12 million to the Comptroller as seed money for the lottery, or about 71¢ per capita. "Based on the size of the state, Texas clearly will have the most-efficient lottery start-up in recent history, Sharp said.

"All of state government, from the Governor down, must support the lottery for it to be successful," he said. "This is our chance to prove that state government works in Texas."

Mr. Waggoner served in World War II and said he "fought the war with a pair of scissors," as he was a barber for the soldiers on the front line. When he returned home, he and his wife owned and operated a small cafe called the Wag-Inn for 13 years. They were well known for their 10-cent hamburgers and the best chili this side of the Rio Grande.

Mr. Waggoner and his brother, Cecil, leased The Claude News from their father, Thomas T. Waggoner, in 1946 and purchased the paper after brother, Thomas Waggoner of Vernon; two granddaughters; and a great-granddaughter.
