## 4th Graders Go Back To November, 1910

The fourth grade class of McLean spent a day in Cheyenne Okla. at the Rolls One-Room School depicting a day, November 12, 1910. Arriving in Cheyenne we walked to school carrying our lunches in tin pails. When the bell rang the girls and the boys lined up by height. Girls went to one side of the roum hanging up their cloaks and placing lunch pails below them. Then the boys entered the room hanging up their cloaks at the back, placing their lunch pails beneath their lunch pails beneath
them and sat on the them and sat on the
opposite side of the room. opposite side of the room.
The first lesson was writing. The scholars used a quill pen and ink to write in their 1910 writing booklets which had been prepared for them. During the math lesson scholars were divided into two groups. They orally and mentally ciphered their problems, sitting when they missed one. While Mrs. Skipper worked with half the scholars reading from the McGuffy readers, the other half of the scholars wrote spelling words on their slates, and Mrs. Tracy

graded the writing booklets. At noon, after washing their hands with lye soap, the scholars were dismissed the scholars were dismissed

Sharp said the Comptroller's new Lottery Division is moving quickly to implement the voters' decisive choice in Tvesday's constitutional referendum. His timetable calls for the His timetable calls for the
hiring of a lottery director by December 1 . The licensing of ticket vendors, the hiring of additional personnel and the establishment of regional prize claim centers will take place throughout the spring.
Sharp pledged to take a businesslike approach to running the state games. ${ }^{\text {ranning the state }}$ Whe run it lice just another state zgency another state igency
