## No. 1 Ranked Whitharral Next Groom Tigers Bi-Dist. Champions

For the first time in many years, the Groom Tigers won their Bi-District play-off game. Groom blasted past McLean with relative ease, taking the lead early and maintaining it throughout the game to win 60-14.

"We worked hard not to underestimate McLean," stated the now hairless Coach Larry Reid. (The team shaved his head after the district win against Follett.) "These senior boys were freshman when we beat Chillicothe in preseason and lost to them in the play-offs. They remembered and took this game very seriously."

Groom out-rushed McLean with 388 yards compared to 146. Groom accumulated 21 first downs, while McLean had 8. The Tigers chalked up 80 yards passing. McLean had 27.

Justin Ritter led the rushing and scoring with an outstanding game. He rushed for 296 yards for 6 touchdowns and 26 carries. He had 10 unassisted tackles.

Daniel Treadwell carried the ball 10 times for 64 yards. He received a 56 yard pass from Brad Sustaire for a touchdown. Treadwell also returned a

kick off for a 21 yard gain.


Toby Burgin scored a touchdown and gained 35 yards on 5 carries. He connected with a pass from Sustaire to gain 1 yard for the Tigers. He had 7 unassisted tackles.

Quarterback Brad Sustaire connected on 7 of 4 passes for 2 touchdowns. He netted 14 unassisted tackles.

Also receiving on Groom's passing game were Sean Crowell and Scott Weinheimer. Crowell connected for 12 yards. He had 13 unassisted tackles. Weinheimer received for 11 yards and a touchdown. He pulled down 10 unassisted

Adding to Groom's awesome line were unassisted tackles by the following, Leo Britten, 12 tackles (Britten also blocked an extra point attempt.) Evan Crowell 7 tackles; Jamie Shuck 5 tackles and Josh Evenson 1. Shuck earned 5 yards on a kick-off

"This was an exciting game for the boys. They were 'up' for the event and played with a lot of emotion," stated Larry Reid. 'I was very proud of our defense and our linemen.

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## Bus Manufacturer To Open Pampa Plant

The Pampa Economic Development Corporation announced that U.S. Bus Manufacturing, Inc., currently headquartered in Suffern, New York, will be bringing more than 50 new jobs to Pampa beginning early next year.

PEDC has been working on this project for about a year according to Pampa Economic Development Executive Director, Jack Ippel.

Ippel and U.S. Bus President Irv Kushner both see the project as a perfect marriage between Pampa and the New York based bus company.

"We're happy to welcome U.S. Bus to Pampa," Ippel

"Pampa is a manufacturing town and this company plays to the strengths of our workforce and our experience with metal fabrication. At the

same time, though, diversifies us away from our dependence on the oil and gas industry.

"We feel that this will be a reciprocal relationship beneficial both to Pampa and the U.S. Bus," said

Kushner was enthusiastic about the responsive and enthusiastic attitude he found in Pampa.

"We've been looking to expand for several years," he said. "Costs of land and labor are prohibitive in New We found the people in Pampa to be excited and cooperative. The competency of the local workforce and the strong work ethic we discovered were also very attractive to



The City of Groom is considering petitioning G.T.E. to add two more towns to the local expanded calling plan. When expanded calling was passed When this last year, only three towns; Amarillo, Panhandle and Pampa; were on the ballot. By law and regulation up to five towns can be in the expanded calling network.

Groom's officials want its area residents to get their money's worth by adding

two more towns to its network. Phone customers are already paying an additional \$3.50 for the service. This fee will NOT increase by adding two more towns.

Input is needed on which two towns would most benefit the majority of the people in the area. Keep in mind that a reason is required to show need for these additions, Amarillo and Pampa were added

#### Wheeler Man Arrested

223rd Judicial District Judge Lee Waters on Tuesday, November 12, granted the request of the District Attorney's Office to deny bail for Gray County

Jail inmate James Clifton Walker. Walker, 53 years old, of Wheeler County, was arrested in McLean on the afternoon of November 6 as a result of police officers identifying the passenger in Walker's vehicle as being wanted on a felony warrant out of Gray County.

Conversation with the passenger and Walker resulted in a consent to search being given the officers by Walker. The search yielded an amount of controlled substances believed to be both methamphetamine and crack cocaine.

Walker had previously been indicted in Hemphill County on drug-related charges and was out of jail on bond.

The request of the District Attorney's Office came about as the result of a recently-passed amendment to the Texas Constitution permitting courts in certain circumstances to deny bail to persons already free on bond pending resolution of another indictment.

Walker's case has been set for trail January 7, 1997.







### Gray County Sheriff's Report

By Sneriff Randy Stubblefield

Hello and welcome to the Sheriff's summary. I have been asked to write a weekly column to report the activity of the Gray County Sheriff's Office for the preceding week. As you know this comes a little late in my term but I am happy to do this and I wish that I had been doing this in the past. Hopefully our new sheriff, Don Copeland, will keep this column going and keep you informed of the office and other information.

For a little background before we get started, the sheriff's office is comprised of a sheriff, 14 deputies, 12 corrections officers, 4 dispatchers and 1 secretary. Our new facility is now 4 years old and designed for 74 inmates. The largest portion of our 1.3 million dollar budget goes for the operation of the jail. When I first came into office our daily inmate population was Today our inmate population is over 60. This, as you can tell is a drastic increase that represents more spending in areas of inmate food, medical and associated costs such as bedding, clothing and laundry. The major cost is yet to come and that is the increase of corrections The Texas jail officers. commission mandates the number of corrections officers per inmate population and that will soon catch up with us. With a daily inmate population of 48 or under.

we can operate with 2 officers per shift. When our population goes over 48 and under 96 we must have 3 officers per shift. increase of one officer really means that we will have to hire 5 more officers due to days off, vacation and such. As you can tell we will soon need to hire more officers and this will cost the county approximately 125,000 dollars when you add in the employee benefits such as retirement and medical.

This increase in inmate population results from several things. First, we are seeing more people on probation being revoked and sentenced to time to serve in jail. Second, the felony prosecutors are taking more cases and more warrants are being issued for arrest of persons accused of a crime not only in our county but elsewhere. Third, when the state issues a warrant for a person on parole, who violates the parole, this person stays in the jail of the county in which he is arrested until the state has a hearing and he is then taken to prison. The state does not reimburse the counties for the 60 or 90 days that they are kept in county jail so we must burden this expense.


Now back to our original purpose. In the preceding week, the Gray County Sheriff's Office has taken reports on and investigated seven new incidents. They are: 2 agency assists; 1 disorderly conduct; 1 theft of a motor vehicle; 1 burglary; 1 driving while

intoxicated; and 1 unlawfully carrying a weapon.

In this same period of time we booked into jail 38 people and answered 116 calls for service. These calls for service are calls such as motorist assist, burglar alarm calls, cattle out, suspicious persons, suspicious vehicles, welfare checks and domestic violence. Our civil officer also served 20 civil papers such as divorce, subpoenas and law suits. These figures do not reflect the hours and miles that our deputies spend on patrol or doing follow up on older cases or transporting prisoners. As you can see we stay busy here.

I'll close this first article with a piece of advice, there are many telemarketing scams going today and if you receive a call from someone wanting to sell or give you something, DO NOT give them your social security number or a credit card number until you can call and verify the credibility of the company through the better business bureau.

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

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


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## SPS Announces Price Increase For November

Escalating prices of natural gas used to generate electricity are the primary cause of a request Southwestern Public Service Company filed today (November 1, 1996) with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for increases in the "fuel-cost recovery" portion of electricity bills.

The average Texas residential customer of SPS, using 800 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, would see a bill increase of about \$1.96 on the monthly bill from January through June

1997, said Gerald Diller, SPS Vice President, Rates and Regulation. However, beginning in July, the increase would drop to 79 cents monthly.

"Even with this fuel cost increase," Diller said "SPS's residential rates will continue to be the lowest among all the investor-owned utilities in Texas."

The requested increase consists of two components, he explained. One component is an underrecovery of actual fuel costs over the past nine months, which would be recovered in

the January-June period.
The second component is
the expected ongoing
increase in prices of natural

"The actual increase in individual customer's bills will vary, depending on the individual customer's use of electricity," Diller said. "All of our Texas retail customer classes, including industrial and commercial classes, would see similar increases in monthly bills."

The trend in prices for natural gas has been "significantly upward during

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the past year, and is expected to continue upward," Diller said. "We negotiate the lowest fuel costs we can, in order to keep electric energy competitive and reliable. But we cannot totally control the costs to us of the fuels we must use to generate power and energy. Thus, this increase."

Diller emphasized,
"Despite fuel-cost changes,
we are determined to keep
our rates low. And we have
been successful. We have
dropped our prices twenty
percent in the past eleven
years. SPS rates are twenty
percent below the national
average."

Southwestern Public Service Company is a regional electric utility providing service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-squaremile area covering the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Panhandle of Oklahoma and southwestern Kansas.

Frank Sparling, Precinct 4
Constable candidate totaled
57 votes in Alanreed, 339 in
McLean and 2109 total
votes in Gray County. He
defeated three opponents
during the primary elections.

Don Copeland defeated Randy Stubblefield in the primary election and won the election for Gray County Sheriff with 61 votes in Alanreed, 352 in McLean and a total of 7328 in Gray County.

Tax Assessor/Collector winner was Sammie Morris with 54 votes in Alanreed, 339 McLean and a total of 6064 in Gray County. Her opponent, Charles Buzzard garnered 15 votes in Alanreed, 104 in McLean and totaled 2688 in Gray

County.

In the Mac Thornberry, Sam Silverman race Thornberry took 57 votes in Alanreed, 355 in McLean and a total of 7248 votes in Gray County. Silverman had 12 votes in Alanreed, 99 in McLean and a 1526 total in Gray County. Thornberry was declared the winner in this race.

Phil Gramm defeated Victor Morales overall and had 56 votes in Alanreed, 329 in McLean and totaled 6856 votes in Gray County. Morales tallied 13 votes in Alanreed, 125 in McLean

and had a total of 1889 votes in Gray County.

In the Dole/Kemp, Clinton/Gore, Perot/Campbell race for president the Republicans (Dole/Kemp) totaled 50 votes in Alanreed, 271 in McLean and had a total of 6102 votes in Gray County.

The Clinton/Gore Democratic winners won 16 votes in Alanreed, 128 in McLean and totaled 2114 in Gray County.

Perot/Campbell added up 3 votes in Alanreed, 53 in McLean and had a total of 568 votes in Gray County.



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
