"We worked hard not to underestimate McLean," stated the now hairless Coach Larry Reid. (The team shaved his head after the district win against Follett.) "These senior boys were freshman when we beat Chillicothe in preseason and lost to them in the play-offs. They remembered and took this game very seriously."

Groom out-rushed McLean with 388 yards compared to 146 . Groom accumulated 21 first downs, while McLean had 8. The Tigers chalked up 80 yards passing. McLean had 27.

Justin Ritter led the rushing and scoring with an outstanding game. He rushed for 296 yards for 6 touchdowns and 26 carries. He had 10 unassisted tackles.

Daniel Treadwell carried the ball 10 times for 64 yards. He received a 56 yard pass from Brad Sustaire for a touchdown. Treadwell also returned a
kick off for a 21 yard gain. Toby Burgin scored a touchdown and gained 35 yards on 5 carries. He connected with a pass from Sustaire to gain 1 yard for the Tigers. He had 7 unassisted tackles.

## Bus Manufacturer Tro Open Pampa Plant

The Pampa Economic Development Corporation announced that U.S. Bus Manufacturing, Inc., currently headquartered in Suffern, New York, will be bringing more than 50 new jobs to Pampa beginning early next year.

PEDC has been working on this project for about a year according to Pampa Economic Development Executive Director, Jack Ippel.
Ippel and U.S. Bus President Irv Kushner both see the project as a perfect marriage between Pampa and the New York based bus company.
"We're happy to welcome U.S. Bus to Pampa," Ippel said.
" P a mpa is a manufacturing town and this company plays to the strengths of our workforce and our experience with metal fabrication. At the
same time, though, it diversifies us away from our dependence on the oil and gas industry.
"We feel that this will be reciprocal relationship beneficial both to Pampe and the US, Bus," saic Ippel.

Kushner was enthusiastic about the responsive and enthusiastic attitude he found in Pampa.
"We've been looking to expand for several years," he said. "Costs of land and labor are prohibitive in New York. We found the people in Pampa to be excited and cooperative The competency of the local The competency of the local workforce and the strong work ethic we discovered were also very attractive to us." "Additionally, the central location will be beneficial to our distribution process and the lower cost of business will also enhance our
position in a highly competitive market," Kushner said.
This agreement is a major accomplishment for PEDC and indicative of the benefits of the $1 / 2$ cent sales tax city residents have dedicated to economic development, according to PEDC Board President, Lewis Meers, Jr.
"The objective of PEDC is to provide a vehicie to attract new businesses that export goods and services from Pampa," Meers explained. "The bus explained. "The bus company will do that by being a significant employer and exporter of goods. That in turn will give Pampa a substantial net inflow of revenue. This agreement demonstrates that PEDC is viable and can attract good quality manufacturing concerns to Pampa."

## Gray County Sheriff's Report

By sneriff Randy Stubblefield
Hello and welcome to the Sheriff's summary. I have been asked to write a weekly column to report the activity of the Gray County Sheriff's Office for the preceding week. As you know this comes a little late in my term but I am happy to do this and I wish that I had been doing this in the past. Hopefully our new sheriff, Don Copeland, will keep this column going and keep you informed of the office and other information.
For a little background before we get started, the sheriff's office is comprised of a sheriff, 14 deputies, 12 corrections officers, 4 dispatchers and 1 secretary. Our new facility is now 4 years old and designed for 74 inmates. The largest portion of our 1.3 million dollar budget goes for the operation of the jail. When I first came into office our daily inmate population was 28. Today our inmate population is over 60 . This, as you can tell is a drastic increase that represents more spending in areas of inmate food, medical and associated costs such as bedding, clothing and laundry. The major cost is yet to come and that is the increase of corrections officers. The Texas jail commission mandates the number of corrections officers per inmate population and that will soon catch up with us. With a daily inmate population of 48 or under,

When our population goes over 48 and under 96 we must have 3 officers per shift This flerse of officer Teally ncrease of one officer really means that we will have to hire 5 more officers due to days off, vacation and such. As you can tell we will soon need to hire more officer and this will cost the county approximately 125,000 dollars when you add in the employee benefits such retirement and medical.
This increase in inmat population results from several things. First, we are seeing more people on probation being revoked and sentenced to time to serve in jail. Second, the felony prosecutors are taking more cases and more warrants are being issued for arrest of persons accused of a crime not only in our county but elsewhere. Third, when the state issues a warrant for a person on parole, who violates the parole, this person stays in the jail of the county in which he is arrested until the state has a hearing and he is then taken to prison. The state does not reimburse the counties for the 60 or 90 days that they are kept in county jail so we must burden this expense.
Now back to our original purpose. In the preceding week, the Gray County Sheriff's Office has taken reports on and investigated seven new incidents. They are: 2 agency assists; 1 disorderly conduct; 1 theft of a motor vehicle; 1 burglary; 1 driving while

Escalating prices of natural gas used to generate electricity are the primary cause of a request Southwestern Public Service Company filed today (November 1, 1996) with the Public Utility the Public Commission of Texas for increases in the "fuel-cost
recovery" portion of recovery"
electricity bills.
The average Texas residential customer of SPS, using 800 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, would see a bill increase of about $\$ 1.96$ on the monthily bill from January through June

1997, said Gerald Diller, SPS Vice President, Rates and Regulation. However, beginning in July, the increase would drop to 79 cents monthly.
"Even with this fuel cost increase," Diller said "SPS's residential rates will continue to be the lowest among all the investoramong all the investor owned utilities in Texas."
The requested increase consists of two components,
he explained. One he explained. One component is an underrecovery of actual fuel costs over the past nine months, which would be recovered in

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the January-June period. The second component is
the expected ongoing increase in prices of natural gas.
"The actual increase in individual customer's bills will vary, depending on the individual customer's use of electricity," Diller said. "All of our Texas retail customer of our Texas retail customer
classes, including industrial classes, including industrial and commercial classes, would see similar increases in monthly bills."
The trend in prices for natural gas has been "significantly upward during

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the past year, and is expected to continue upward," Diller said. "We negotiate the lowest fuel costs we can, in order to keep electric energy competitive and reliable. But we cannot totally control the costs to us of the fuels we must use to generate power and energy. Thus, this increase."
Diller emphasized, "Despite fuel-cost changes, we are determined to keep our rates low. And we have been successful. We have dropped our prices twenty percent in the past eleven years. SPS rates are twenty years. SPS rates are twenty percent below the national
