## Carson County Elevator Grant Turned Down

Carson County Commissioners, in regular session Monday morning, learned that the County's third application in as many years for a grant to help fund installation of a elevator in the courthouse had been turned down. The application for 144,000 to
cover the cost of handicap accessibility failed to meet what Panhandle Region Planning Commission officials thought was necessary funds, compared
to other counties funded for to other counties funded for
flood control, water and sewer requirements.
Realizing that meeting accessibility standards is a requirement, the
commissioners discussed various ways the project could be addressed, using reserved county funds. More discussion will be held in furure meeting until a fersible funding method can be established.
Judge Roselius explained that moving polling places in recent past years from the courthouse to the library and the War Memorial Building ha; been successful in complying to the acceessibility rule at those times, but the courthouse must be used by handicaped throughout the year and it is necessary to comply with government rulings on this matter.

## Farmers Invited To Participate

Pointing to the imporiance of recognizing and reriem bering the pioneer farm and ranch families in Texas, long time farming families are invited to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Agriculture's Program.

Registration, which racognizes families who have had land in the agricultural production for 100 years or more, is now open and will extend through July 15.
To date, no properties in Carson County have qualified for the Family Land Heritage Program. Since Carson County celebrated its Carson Coul in 1988 and Pan Centle's Centennial was in 1996, families could be elig 1986, families could be elig. ible for the Family Land Program. Since the program was established in 1974, over 2,000 piont ering families have been hor ored.
The basic requiremeats of the program include continuouse agricultural production on the farm or ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family coniplete within the family, conipiete the farm/ranch prodiction the farm/ranch prodiction by family members who are Texas residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum income of $\mathbf{\$ 5 0}$ from farm or ranch products. If the farm or ranch is smaller thin 10 acres, sales must total $\$ 250$ per year.

These families are iving
productive symbols of our family farm unit. We celebrate their past achievements, and acknowledge the importance that such family farms hold for us in the future," according to Mrs J. B. McCray, Carson County. J.B. McCray, Carson County Historical

This year's certified registrants will be honored at a state ceremony to be held in Austin in the Fall. Honorees will receive a certificate with an official sign/marker to be placed on the recipients gate or home designating their property as a "Century Froperty or "Century Ranch." ## Rural Health

Rural health care could be a life or death matter to any citizen of Texas who had an accident or medical emergency while traveling through the state, members of the Texas Chamber of Commerce and legislators were told at a breakfast meeting this week.

Problems with rural heaIth care delivery in Texas were reviewed at the regular
biweekly legislative break biweekly legislative breakfommerce by Larry Milner, Commerce by Larry Milner,
President and Chief ExePresident and Chief Exe cutive Officer of the cham ber, Rep. Mike McKinney and Sheryl Boyd, Ed.D of the Department of Interna Medicine of the Texas Tech Health Science Center. Both panelists were members of The Special Task Force on Rural Health Care Delivery that made its report to the Governor and the legislature this year.
The panelists zeroed in on the declining number of health care facilities in rural areas of the state. Rep. McKinney said that 72 Texas hospitals failed in the past five years, most of them in rural areas. One of the latest was the hospital in Leon County where Rep. McKinney, a physician practices. Last year alone 17 hospitals in the state closed hospitals in
Rep. McKinney pointed out that if you're driving from Houston to Dallas and have a wreck in Leon County you'll be involved in rural health care quickly.'
Dr. Boyd, a member of the Texas Chamber Board of Directors, was vicechairman of the task force. Sam Gorena, a member of the chamber staff, was the executive director. The group held eleven hearings throughout the state and geard from more than 250 witnesses.
Dr. Boyd pointed out that the economy of small towns and rural areas are severely impacted when there is inadequate health care. "Not only does a lack of doctors and hospitals make the attraction of new industry almost impossible, but health care irself is an
