A culmination of nearly a years work ended Saturday night between pride and tears for many Carson County 4-Hers and FFAers. The annual Carson County Junior Livestock Show and Sale was completed after approximately 145 animals were sold for approximately \$65,000.

Groom FFA made a clean sweep of the Beef Show with April Burton and Kori Brown taking all the top honors. April Burton took home three buckles, winning Grand and Reserve Steer as well as Reserve Heifer. Kori Brown's Heifer earned Grand Champion honors and Kori earned the Showmanship award.

White Deer FFA took home the other Grand Champion awards with Patrick Warminski showing the Grand Champion pig and Kayla Blount the Grand Champion lamb. White Deer also had Reserve Champion pig shown by Jennifer Norton and Reserve Champion lamb shown by Jonathan Warminski.

Groom also had its share of breed winners. Dara Whatley won Best of Breed with her steer. Malorie Homen earned a Best of Breed with her pig and Ricky McCoy earned a Best of Breed with his lamb. Nicholas Anthony had a Reserve Best of Breed pig as well as Cody Britten.



County Property Taxes Now Due

Carson County Tax Assessor-Collector Roselyn Watson announced Monday that approximately 84.9 percent of Carson County taxes have been paid. Taxes that have not been paid by January 31, will incur penalty and interest amounting to 7 percent in February. Slow payers should be aware that larger with each month that passes. Accounts not paid by July 1 will incur an additional 18 percent collection penalty.

Delinquent notices will be mailed in May for those who still owe the 1996 tax. Carson County residents should be reminded that only county taxes are to be sent to Roslyn Watson, P.O. Box 399, Panhandle, Texas 79068. School, City and Water District taxes need to be sent to the County Appraisal District, c/o Donita Herber at P.O. Box 970, Panhandle, Texas 79068.

Please do not add county and other tax bills together and send one check. This delays the process for both taxing entities.

Since Groom customers already pay a monthly per line charge of \$3.50 for residence and \$7.00 for business for ELC service to Arnarillo, Pampa and Panhandle, no additional charges would be assessed if two additional exchanges pass the ballot. Within the next 15 days GTE will mail ballots to all customers in the Groom exchange to determine whether support exists for expansion of the local calling area. After marking the ballot, customers should sign their name and return the ballot to the PUC. A stamped self-addressed envelope will be provided with the ballot. At least 70% of the subscribers who return their ballots must vote in favor of expanded local calling on a per exchange basis for it to be provided. If the ballot fails to all exchanges, your service will not change. Only exchanges that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area.

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



Farm Loans Available For Socially Disadvantaged

The Farm Service Agency has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Gray, Donley, Armstrong, Wheeler, and Carson counties, Larry J. Goetze, FSA Ag Credit Manager, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FSA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and qualify for an FSA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible for a farm held in our inventory

or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market. Goetze said.

FSA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farm Service Agency county office in their area.

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

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
