

Paramount Pictures began production of the movie "Leap of Faith" in its Groom location Saturday. Movie buffs turned out in force to watch the filming begin. Some of the first scenes shot required the closing of a section of old highway 66. The exit number 110 from I-40 and the entire portion of the road down to nearly Allsups was shut down for short periods of time as the crew filmed "Jonas Nightengale's" trucks headed into town. "Nightengale" is the lead character played by Steve Martin.

Saturday's heat and wind showed up just in time to play it's part in the script which called for droughtlike conditions. Anyone who stood around in the sun watching the production for very long feels that it gave an Academy Award performance.

The film company is amazingly self supporting, bringing with them their own tiny village. Basing their operations at the school, they have imported dressing rooms, wardrobe and makeup rooms, equipment repair shops, kitchen facilities, and trailers for the actors and actresses. Much of the movie will take place at Bill and Sam's Motel and Robert and Alice Kuehler's field. Other locations may also be the baseball field, track and the old meat market next to the post office.

If you missed the first couple of days, have no fear, more is to come. The crew expects to film in Groom until approximately July 30th.

Many local residents have already been called to play as extras. Some of them are Dan and Pat Ashford, Donna Crump, Susan and Lonny Brown, Melvin Wills, Tim Case, James Moranic, Mike Koetting, Carol B a b c o c k, Forrest McLaughlin, Robert West, Pete Ham, Rodney Bohr and James Miller.

"It's hard work" said James Miller, "a lot of standing around and waiting, too."

Vic Heutschy, production publicist stated that the movie is supposed to take place in a small Kansas town. In the 3 ½ days that Jonas Nightengale (Steve Martin) is in Rustwater, he undergoes some dramatic changes. The original screenplay is an uplifting story that will be released about Christmas time.





Donley Co. Declared Disaster

Low-interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in 30 Texas counties that were declared federal disaster areas due to drought, freeze, flood and hail between Jan. 1 and

Dec. 31, 1991, Texas Agricultural Commissioner Rick Perry today said.

In making the declaration, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan named Cochran, Lamb and King counties as primary disaster areas due to all four weather conditions between Jan. 1-Dec.31, 1991. Baylor, Hall, Parmer and Wichita counties were named for freeze damage between Oct. 1-Nov. 30, 1991.

In addition, Bailey, Castro, Dickens, Foard, Hale, Haskell, Hockley, Kent, Knox, Lubbock, Parmer, Stonewall, Terry and Yoakum counties were delcared contiguous disaster. areas for drought, hail, flood and freeze during the entire year of 1991. Archer, Briscoe, Childress, Clay, Collingsworth, Deaf Smith, Donley, Wilbarger and Young counties were named contiguous disaster areas for freeze between Oct. 1 and Nov. 30, 1991.

These declarations allow family-size farm operators in both the primary and continguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

To be designated as a primary disaster area, the Farmers Home Administration determines if sufficient number of farmers in each county suffered losses of 30 percent or more. The counties designated as contiguous disaster were delcared so because they were adjacent to the primary disaster area, but did not have the same extent of losses.

Each loan application will be considered on its own merits taking into account the extent of losses, security available, repayment ability and other requirements.





If you sometimes wonder why some stories never make it to the paper here is a perfect example.

Tuesday morning. . .

10:17 a.m. - Back to the office to contact the kid's parent to verify this information.

CARSON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT

During the week of July 1, 1992, the Carson County Sheriff's Department continued to assist Carson County residents of Fritch in the aftermath of last week's tornado damage. Deputies continue to investigate reports of looting and of missing property in the Fritch area. One deputy, responding to a report of a vicious dog in Fritch, was attacked by another dog and had to destroy the animal. The dog which was the original source of the call was secured by the owner.

DPS Troopers and Carson County deputies assisted Pantex Security in dealing with protesters who marched near the Pantex gates. The Panhandle Emergency Medical Service and a Carson County deputy responded to a report of a man down with chest pains near Conway. The man was transported to AERC for treatment.

An incident involving Indecency with a Child which was being investigated by Deputy Joe Leatherwood resulted in the arrest of a Fritch man who had been evading arrest by Carson County officers. The subject was located and detained in Lubbock and then returned to Carson County by Sheriff Timmons to face trial on the felony charge.

Notes From Texas Film Commission

Kathryn Laurene Kemp is a volunteer with the Governor's office with the Texas Film Commission. From her experience the following is a list of do's and don'ts for extras and observers.

Do not talk to the stars. They have lines to remember and cannot be distracted.

Do not ask for autographs while they are shooting. Your children have a better chance of getting an autograph. F in d out who is directing your scene and do exactly what he or she tells you to do. Many times there will be different directors for different scenes.

Wear something comfortable with no advertisements on it. Be sure it is easy to clean because sometimes you have to wear it for weeks depending on the length of the shoot. They take polaroid shots of continuing scenes so the film editor can match the film, so keep track of your seat or position. Do not eat or move the props. Kathryn Lourene

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If you continue to work full-time past age 65, you may increase your basic Social Security retirement benefits in two ways. First, for each month that you do not receive a benefit--until the month in which you reach age 70--your benefit will automatically increase.

Second, you will be adding years of high earnings to your Social Security record, and these earnings may result in higher benefits.

Under the delayed retirement credit provisions, if you will be 65 this year or in 1993 and you continue to work, your beaefit amount will increase 4 percent per year. By age 70, your Social Security benefit will be 20 percent higher than it would have been if you began receiving monthly benefits at age 65.

WHAT TO DO IF YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY CHECK IS LATE...OR LOST

When someone's Social Security or SSI check does not arrive on time, we know about it pretty quickly. Our phones usually start ringing the same day with a call from the beneficiary who is wondering what to do.

The first thing we tell them is "Let's wai to make sure it is not just delayed in the mail." While the postal service routinely delivers benefit checks on time, there are times when mail is delayed. Our normal policy is to allow three days for late mail deliver as before we process a request for a replacement check.

The usual check delivery days are the 1st of the month for SSI checks and the 3rd of the month for Social Security checks. Social Security car process a claim, for a lost SSI check on the 4th of the month or for a lost Social Security check the 6th of the month.

If the delivery date falls on a weekend or on a legal holiday, checks are delivered on the last banking day before then. And claims for lost checks can be processed three postal delivery days later.

The- most common reason checks are late is because changes of address are not reported to us. If you move, be sure to put in a change of address form with the post office - in addition to informing the Social Security of your new address. Many people use direct deposit to have their benefit checks sent to a savings or checking account at a bank. They generally find that direct deposit is safer and more convenient than getting their checks by mail. If you want to start direct deposit call your bank, or our office at 806/669-1010. The local Social Security office is located at 125 South Gillespie. Office hours are 9:00 am until 4:00 pm, Monday through

Friday, except on national

holidays.

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
