In conclusion, the Council voted to pay all bills and adjourn until the April

City Of Groom **Awarded Grant**

The City of Groom has been notified by the Texas Department of Commerce of the awarding of a grant in the amount of \$205,276.00. The City will match funds of \$20,528.00. The grant will be used to upgrade water lines from 3/4 inch and 2 inch lines to 6 inch lines with the laying of 8,620 linear feet of PVC pipe, 92 residential service connections and 8 fire hydrants. The City was competing against 41 grants applied for in the Texas Panhandle. Applicants receiving grants are Texline, Adrian, Higgins, Happy, Groom and

Incumbents Wade, Persons **Hold On To Positions**

Carson County voters turned out 1,729 strong (including 355 who voted absentee) for the Tuesday Primary Elections and re-elected Sue Persons as the County-District Clerk. Mrs. Persons received 1036


votes to 558 for her opponent, Mary Nell Franklin. Richard Robinson (310 votes) led over incumbent Choc Smith (261) in the Precinct 2 Commissioner's race. Dwight Jackson captured 77 votes in that race. Robinson and Smith will face each other in the

Democratic Primary Run-Off on April 10th.
In the Precinct 4 Commissioner race, Tracy Kotara defeated Don Elledge (265-125) in the Demo-cratic Primary and Kevin Howell downed Bob Lemke (129-33) in the Republican Primary.

Two county races for Justice of the Peace posts were also determined. Phyllis Tyler won the Precinct 1, Place 1 seat with 660 votes to 147 for Kim Weller and 157 for Darrell Forbes in the Democratic Primary. Incumbent Max Wade was re-elected Precinct 5, Place 1 JP with 134 votes over Donna Burton's 97.

Carson County supported Dick Waterfield for State
Representative (253 votes) over Bob Price (119).
In the Gubernatorial races, the majority of county
Democrats favored Ann Richards and Republicans
gave the nod to Clayton Williams.





NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

CTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

Groom ISD Meal Program

Patrons of the school food services division are reminded that the school policies, including the child nutrition policies, are monitored for accreditation by the State and by the Federal Government. One portion of any audit by the state or federal government involves investigation of methods by which a school district enforces its policies.

Current policy concerning meals was adopted by the Board of Trustees on April 8, 1985. The policy calls for prepayment of all meals eaten and allows for a maximum of two days' credit before a parent makes other arrangements for the child's

Food division personnel send reminders home with students when the prepaid meals balance is nearing expiration, so that more meals can be purchased before the child has been extended more than two days' credit. Cooperation from all patrons of the food services division is required to keep the school policy in compliance with all rules and regulations set forth. Parents are urged to monitor the status of the students' meal payment plan and to keep in compliance with the two-day maximum rule of the policy.

Parents are also encouraged to check with Joyce Hutsell at the business office of the school at 304 West Third Street for assistance with meals. The Federal Program guidelines are made available to each student at registration and families who may qualify for the Federal Program should investigate the possibilities for participation in the program.

Families who pay full or reduced prices are reminded to observe the pre-payment rule of School District policy.



Helping When Health Fails

The increasing frailty of a parent can be a daily reminder of his mortality as well as that of other family members. As health fails and the parent is no longer able to accomplish everything himself, both the parent and adult child's perception must change. Loss of independence and control can be a blow to an older person's self-esteem. This is why older people fight to keep their independence as hang as possible, says Donna Gallin, County

Extension Agent for Carson

County. What can adult children do to make life's transactions easier for the aging parent and themselves?

1. Disc uss "what ifs" with aging parents before a crisis occurs to get their input on how to handle various situations.

2. Involve all family members in family conferences and in making decisions.

3. Allow aging parents as much independence as possible in decision-making. 4. Communicate openly to

build trust.

5. Avoid promises such as "We'll never put you in a nursing home." Circumstances change and chances are if you are forced to break these promises you will feel very guilty.

6. Balance your responsibilities so that you will have time to spend with other family members.

7. Plan time for yourself in order to prevent sickness and exhaustion.

8. Get involved in a family support group if you feel the need to share with others who have common concerns.





Weed Control Needed On CRP

Farmers and ranchers, for better results on CRP grass seeding, controlling weeks is the key.

There are a variety of chemicals that can be used to control or suppress the weeds in the conservation reserve program. Another method of controlling weeds is mowing or shredding.

Cost-share is set up in the CRP contract for two seed bed preparations before the grass is established. This can be either plowing or applying chemicals. One weed control after the grass

is established and set up for cost-sharing in the CRP Contract.

Weedy conditions on CRP must be avoided. Weeds that can blow and damage adjoining fences and property are prohibited. To prevent weeds blowing, shred each year by September 15th.

How To Tape

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service and the National Association of Conservation Districts have produced a "how-to" videotape to help farmers carry out · their conservation compliance plans under provisions of the Farm Bill.

"Over the next 5 years, we'll be helping farmers carry out their conservation plans on nearly 140 million acres of highly erodible land. Many farmers will be doing the work themselves and we feel these tapes will be helpful," said SCS Chief Wilson Scaling.

"With the December 31, 1994 implementation dead-line for farmers to stay farmers to stay eligible for USDA farm program benefits, our SCS personnel still have an enormous workload. We appreciate the many farmers who will be applying their own conservation practices. We encourage them to call their local Soil Conservation Service (SCS) or conservation district office first for information we feel may help in adapting the practices to their land.'

The hour-long tape, entitled "Conservation on Your Own," features eight segments on widely used soil conservation practices: (1) how to measure and manage crop residues; (2) how to lay out contour lines and use field borders; (3) how to lay out contour buffer strips; (4) points to consider in contour stripcropping; (5) how to lay out wind strips; (6) how to control small gullies with grass; (7) how to plant and maintain a field windbreak; and (8) how to keep your

working.
"Each SCS office in Texas has a copy of the videotape," says Harry w. Oneth, state conservationist. "The videotape will be available for loan from local SCS or conservation district offices. Landowners are encouraged to view the tape at their convenience."
