

# **Water Conservation District Defines Precincts For Coming Elections**

Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District 3 will be electing four District Directors in the January 18, One 1992 elections. director will be elected in each of four precincts.

Directors in Precincts 1, 3, and 5 will be elected to 4-year terms. Precinct 6 will elect a Director to a 2year interim term, due to redistricting of the District. That precinct will go to 4-year terms in the 1994 elections.


Incumbent directors in precincts where elections are to be held are: Precinct 1, Phillip Smith;

# **Area Elevator Operators Reporting Good Harvest**

Local farmers are either very busy or waiting for the weather to clear, after a very cool autumn and rain have slowed down the harvest of milo this year.

Area grain elevators are reporting excellent yields on grain harvested last week. Tony Treadwell of RGM Ag & Grain said,"The test weight has been averaging 57 lbs per bushel."

Nadine Thornton of the Wheeler Evans Elevator said,"We have been very busy, although the moisture content has been running high, around 19%, the yields have been very good.

In the surrounding area, the harvest appears to be about half done, as the Texas Panhandle awaits another arctic blast that is expected to, once again, bring moisture in the form of snow or rain. Bob Byrd of Attebury Gain said, "All we need is time to dry this milo out and NO WIND!"



# "Phone Company Glitch" Says Timmons Concerning 911

The 911 phone system is about 6 weeks old in Groom and is still working out the bugs.

Sheriff Terry Timmons, stated "Most of the problem is in the phone lines. Sometimes a call will be routed to the wrong dispatching system. The phone company is working on it. Now that we know this our dispatchers double check by staying on the line to see that the right entities are connected."

Some of the problems also occur because of understaffing claims Timmons.

people don't realize is that we must cover 940 square miles out in the field. Our dispatcher handles 8 lines on 911 and 4 lines of sheriffs phones. They also dispatch for the city of Panhandle's police department as well as the DPS officers, the fire and ambulance services. addition to answering the phones and radios the dispatcher also acts as jailer. They must tour the jail to check on prisoners at least once per hour."

According to Timmons the Texas Department of Public Safety contributes to the salary of the dispatcher by fines imposed on tickets issued. However, the City of Panhandle police department nor any of the fire and ambulance departments around the county do not.

"We just have more than we can say grace over" said Timmons. "In addition our officers must handle transportation of prisoners and witnesses to other regions."

Timmons felt that it would take a good year to iron out all the wrinkles.

"I can't tell you how many times I have called 911 from out in the field and got a recording that my call could not be completed as dialed," complained Timmons.

The system is designed to link all emergency systems in the county together for a quicker more accurate response. Coordinated by P.R.P.C., the system is expected to be throughout the panhandle sometime in the next year.



### Be Aware Of Holiday Traffic

Major V. J. Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety stated, "We know that the potential for injury and loss of life is greater during the holiday periods, especially a high volume holiday like Thanksgiving. We are asking people to drive defensively."

Many motorist have heard the term 'defensive driving', however, it seems few know what it involves. "Most of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedures make these senses more effective," Cawthon explained.

Defensive driving can and should become a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience according to safety experts. Don't assume the other driver will make the right move. Be prepared for anything. Defensive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies as well as the road. They are ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But, some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions; daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer nistakes.

Drivers on the average

make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is speeding. Most people a don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions", Major Cawthon added.

Once, again, all available Troopers will be on the highways this holiday as they have in the past to try to make the roads as safe as possible for all of us. This holiday give safety a second thought.

### U I L BASKETBALL RULE CHANGES

Several rule changes for basketball will go into effect for the 1991-92 season. In order to enjoy and understand the game more fully, fans need to know:

- Technical fouls now count in the total of five for disqualifying players from the game.
- Compression shorts (also known as biker shorts) similar in color to the game shorts, are permitted.
- Bonus free throws now start on the 7th foul (not the 5th) and the technical fouls are combined with the personal fouls to reach seven.
- Ali team fouls count for bonus free throws and for disqualifying players from the game.
- Lack of action is no longer called, but 5 second closely guarded is still called.

- Two technical fouls disqualify from the game except for head coach.
- Three technical fouls disqualify the head coach from the game.
- Three free throws if fouled on an unsuccessful try for three points and one free throw if fouled on successful three point attempt.
- A player may grasp the basket at any time to avoid injury.

### INSURANCE COURSE OFFERED FARM ADVISERS

Changes and prospects for multiple peril crop insurance in 1992 will be examined during a one-day workshop here Nov. 21. In addition to providing farm advisers and insurance agents an update on provisions of the 1990 federal farm bill, most of the course is to provide hands-on experience with two computer decision models for selecting crop insurance.

The workshop will be in the Texas A&M University System Computer Training and Education Center at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station facility here, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70. It will be taught by specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX). sponsored by TAEX, the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. (FCIC) and the Federal Extension Service-U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"The 1990 farm bill enhanced the role of multiple peril crop insurance (MPCI) as a production risk management option for crop growers," said Dr. Ashley Lovell Extension Service economist at Stephenville.

"This workshop will look at the latest prospects for MPCI within the context of the 1992 farm program provisions," he said. "And it will offer hands-on computer experience which should enable participants to determine which yield and occurred between January 1, 1991 and June 1, 1991, are
