Scholarships, Awards Presented To Seniors

Several Seniors received special awards Friday during graduation ceremonies at Groom High School.

Valedictorian Kristi Jackson received the PTO Scholarship in addition to the scholarship for being at the top of her class. The PTO award is based on post secondary aspirations, citizenship, leadership and service.

Jowannah Ruthardt in addition to her salutatorian scholarship was given the State National Bank Scholarship which is based on citizenship, athletic ability and scholarship.

Jami Duke was awarded the Most Outstanding Student award for citizenship, scholarship and service. She also was recipient of the S.S. Scott award based on citizenship, post secondary aspirations, leadership and service.

David Hinson received the Future Farmers of America Scholarship. The award is made based on post secondary aspirations, citizenship, leadership and service. Consideration is also given to work performed in agricultural fields.

All selections for scholarships are made by the High School faculty and administration.

Commissioners Agree To Pay Share Of Assistant Attorney's Salary

Carson County Commissioners met in regular session Monday in Panhandle.

The commissioners will join other Texas counties in having a stone placed in the oval walkway at the State capital which will be inscribed with the county's name and date of organization.

Recent machinery purchases by the county in regard to insurance coverage were discussed. Judge Roselius stated that because the equipment had been obtained through lease purchase agreements that full coverage should be provided for during the term of the lease. The commissioners agreed.

Bids received for a motor grader for Precinct 2 were opened and read. The \$74,818 bid from Yellow House Machinery Co. was accepted for the purchase of a 670B John Deere motor grader.

The county agreed to purchase a new television and VCR for the museum to be used in county wide educational programs.

George Quarles was hired as a road hand, position II effective June 1 and the County/District Clerk received permission to attend the annual state conference.

The County will also allow in next year's budget funds

to pay their part of the salary for an assistant district attorney. The salary is funded by Carson, Hall, Donley, Collingsworth and Childress counties.

The next meeting of the commissioner's court will be June 8.

Highway Department Approves Work On I-40 West Of Conway

Highway work in Carson County is included in a program to improve roadways throughout Texas that was approved at the May meeting of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The program calls for an asphaltic concrete pavement

overlay on Interstate Highway 40 from two miles east of the Potter County line east 13.5 miles to 1.6 miles east of Conway at an estimated cost of \$3.3 million.

The program in the Panhandle includes 17 Amarillo area projects at an esti-

mated cost of \$15.4 million. Statewide, the \$300 million program included 325 projects covering more than 1,600 miles of highways. In the Panhandle, the program includes 99 miles of highways.

Across the state, about 140 projects involve upgrading roadways to current standards. Statewide, the majority of the projects will go to contract during the next 21 months. Locally, the majority of the projects are scheduled to go to contract during the next 12 months.
